At Ambulance Victoria (AV), vaccination is an important part of its armour in protecting personnel against the virus, together with the use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and by taking every precaution to protect themselves, patients and their colleagues.

AV's Corryong Team Manager, Marita Harrison, said her team is celebrating as all eight of the Upper Murray First Responders (FR) including Ambulance Community Officers (ACOs) and all Upper Murray AV Paramedics have completed their course of Covid-19 vaccinations.

At Ambulance Victoria our community safe and W), vaccination is an portant part of its armour protecting personnel ainst the virus, together "Our goal is to keep our community safe and well and it is important we are doing all we can to protect ourselves and our patients," Marita said.

"If you are getting your vaccine soon, make sure you space the injection and your flu shot by at least seven days. This is just to manage any side-effects that may come from many vaccinations."

Despite the challenges Covid presented during 2020 and the continuing pandemic environment in Victoria, AV remains

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committed to ensuring that all critically-ill Victorians continue to receive the urgent, lifesaving and time-critical ambulance response they need.

In some cases, an emergency response comes from an ACO team. Members are employed on a casual basis to work at either a community or a Paramedic branch.

They are trained to provide advanced first-aid in rural and remote communities where the ambulance caseload is low or the ambulance branch is not staffed on a full-time basis.

"ACOs are trained to provide a support service to qualified paramedics," Marita said.

"They provide early interventions and can transport patients to hospital.

"ACOs are dispatched at the same time as a qualified ambulance paramedic to a Triple Zero (000) call and due to their location and proximity to the local community they serve, they will most likely arrive prior to ambulance paramedics."

ACOs attend traffic accidents, respiratory and cardiac cases and other incidents requiring emergency care which provides invaluable local support for AV.

Police seek witnesses to crash

Corryong police are asking for help from members of the community who may have information about a single-vehicle car accident in the early hours of Sunday morning near Cudgewa.

The driver of a Toyota Landcruiser tray ute travelling from Corryong lost control of the vehicle on Briggs Gap Road at around 4am, approximately 300 metres from the intersection with the Cudgewa-Tintaldra Road.

The driver, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle, failed to negotiate a sharp bend and the vehicle rolled several times down a steep incline.

The driver was discovered in the vehicle by passers-by some time later and taken to a house in Cudgewa where he became very unwell.

He was conveyed

directly by ambulance to Albury Base and has since been released.

Police are seeking details from anyone who may have seen the incident or has information about events leading up to it.

Sergeant Liam Mc-Mahon added that people should be careful about moving anyone involved in an accident.

"You don't know what type of injuries they may have or how serious they are," he warned.

"You should ring '000' straight away and wait until police and emergency services arrive at the scene."

Sgt McMahon also warned that police would be cracking down on drink driving in the district.

"There have been a significant number of offences recently and we will be ensuring that people get the message - if

you drink and drive, you will pay the price.

"Take this as fair

warning."
Sgt McMahon also

reminded drivers not to leave their cars unsecured.

In Victoria it is an

offence to leave a motor vehicle unattended with keys in ignition, motor running, brakes not secured or doors unlocked.

"We've had incidents lately where valuables have been taken from unlocked vehicles," he said.

"We will continue to monitor vehicles in the street and if they are unsecured we will be issuing infringement notices."

Sgt McMahon added that local businesses should also be more security conscious.

"There have been regular break-ins in the district including farms and business owners should review their security measures," he said.

"Police are available to help business owners conduct a security audit and advise on the best steps to take.

"In the first instance, the best thing to do is install CCTV."

"If you are interested in becoming a local ACO, you would undertake training to develop and maintain your life-saving skills," Marita added.

"The initial training is now a Certificate II in Medical Service First Response.

"Regular training sessions are provided and topics include Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), basic life support, approaching an incident, environmental

emergencies such as snake bites, pharmacology, childbirth, trauma, diabetic emergencies, fractures, head injuries, anaphylaxis and much more.

"A medical background is not required to become an ACO."

Building local skills

A lot of work can go into a grant application so to help ensure the best chance of success, a three-part grant writing workshop series was held in Corryong last month.

The workshops were run by Bushfire Recovery Victoria and facilitated by Pat Grosse from the Community Entrepreneur. Pat stepped community members through Getting Ready for a Grant, Writing a Compelling Grant Application and Managing Your Project.

Below are some of the most important points discussed when preparing for a grant application.

- 1. Always check eligibility criteria before starting a grant application, are you eligible to apply?
- 2. Always contact the grant officer for clarification on any queries you may have.
- 3. A good grant application takes time. Don't leave it to the last minute.
- You need to clearly answer why you need a grant, how your project will make a difference, how many people will it impact, where is your evidence, and what will be your legacy?
- Understand the type of activities that a grant provider will and won't look

to fund.

- A grant is always about the Grant Funder's aims and objectives. There is always a policy directive behind a grant offering. How can your project help them achieve their organisations desired outcomes? With this in mind, know and plan your project so that you can.
- Unpack eligibility criteria and guidelines and read FAQs before beginning a grant application. These will tell you if the grant is best suited to your project and what you're looking to achieve.
- Consider governance who is accountable for keeping

records, submitting progress reports and do you have access to the skill set needed to see your project through to completion? You many need to consider a project manager.

- If you're successful, what does this look like?
- Don't ever assume that who is reading your application knows who you are and what is going on.
- "Chasing the yellow taxi" you don't attempt to get in every taxi that goes past. You know there will be another. Many grants have multiple rounds or there may be a better grant option for your project.

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

Senator completes comeback

Following the return of Barnaby Joyce to The Nationals leadership and the role of Deputy Prime Minister, a ministerial shake-up has resulted in the Senator for Victoria, Bridget McKenzie, returning to Cabinet.

The appointment of the Wodonga-based senator last Friday to the portfolio regionalisation, education, regional regional communications,

drought and emergency management came less than 18 months after she was forced to resign over the sports rorts scandal.

"This week marks 10 years since I was elected to the Senate for Victoria,"

"It was also a privilege to be sworn in as a Minister of the Crown virtually, from the regions, from my home base of Wodonga in north-east Victoria.

"It's a great honour to serve as the Minister for National Recovery and Resilience and Emergency Management and Minister Regionalisation, **Regional Communications** and Regional Education under the Morrison-Joyce government.

"It comes during incredibly challenging times with the Covid-19 pandemic and as our regions recover

bushfires, floods and drought I will work tirelessly to support them through the recovery. "The pandemic has also

seen a shift in workplace regions. I look forward to exploring opportunities on this front for regional Australia.

Fresh start the right time to commit

Member for Indi, Dr Helen Haines, has called on the new Nationals Ministers sworn in last Friday to begin their roles by supporting a strong, independent and effective integrity commission.

"The swearing-in of the new ministers must mark the start of a new commitment to urgently legislate an integrity

commission with broad jurisdiction, investigative powers and public hearings when it is in the public interest to do so," Dr Haines said.

"New Nationals Ministers will once again have wide discretion over large buckets of taxpayer money that should go where there is most need.

"How can Australians

trust that taxpayer money isn't being rorted without a strong Federal Integrity Commission?"

"The events of this week have shown once again a Federal Integrity Commission is long overdue, Dr Haines said.

"It is shameful that multiple decisions on funding for commuter carparks made

by press release, with absolutely no input from the relevant department.

"From sports rorts to car parks, Australians have had enough. On the 8th of September it will be 1,000 days since the government committed to introduce a Federal Integrity Commission but since then all we have seen is draft legislation that has been roundly criticised," Dr Haines said.

"My bill would create robust commission with strong investigative powers. I know my bill has support from MPs from every party in Parliament.

"It's time for the new Nationals Ministers to get on board with my bill for a strong, effective and independent Federal Integrity Commission."

Benambra may lose valley voters

Victoria's Electoral Boundaries Commission (EBC) released has proposed new state electoral boundaries for public comment

The EBC has been conducting a redivision of electoral boundaries for both Houses of State Parliament to ensure that each vote in Victorian state elections has an equal value and that each elector is represented equally in

the Parliament.

Electoral Commissioner, Warwick Gately, one of the three members of the EBC, was pleased with the level of community engagement in the initial consultation period and issued a further call for Victorians to have their say.

"The EBC in December 2020 invited submissions from the public and received 58 submissions -

five from political parties, 15 from organisations and community groups and 38 from individuals," he said.

To restore the state electorates to approximate equality, based on the last two elections, the EBC is considering transferring the Kiewa Valley from Benambra to the Ovens Valley District. The valley is part of Alpine Shire and as such, has a community of interest with the bulk of

the municipality already in Ovens Valley.

The EBC considered transferring Beechworth or Rutherglen but as both are in the Indigo Shire it would make sense on community of interest grounds to keep the whole of Indigo in Benambra District.

"Anyone interested in providing comment on the proposed boundaries should lodge a written submission before 5 pm Friday 30 July 2021."

proposed boundaries can downloaded from the EBC website. Written submissions can also be lodged via the website.

The EBC will take account of suggestions and objections and prepare final boundaries by late October 2021. These boundaries will take effect at the 2022 state election.

Communities encouraged to apply for more funding

The Australian government has released guidelines for the \$280 million Black Summer Bushfire Recovery (BSBR) grants program, providing funding direct to communities to help in their ongoing recovery after the 2019-20 bushfires.

Minister for Emergency Management, David Littleproud, said bushfire recovery is still front and centre for the Australian government.

"We have committed more than \$2 billion to bushfire recovery support, but we know disaster recovery is a long haul," he said.

"These grants will help communities continue their bushfire recovery journey.

"There is money earmarked for every eligible Local Government Area, with bigger funding envelopes for the areas that were hardest hit,.

Co-ordinator General for the National Recovery and Resilience Agency, Shane Stone AC, said the grants are for projects that boost community recovery and at the same time help minimise the impact of future natural disasters.

"We know it takes time for communities to move forward after a disaster and the impact of the Black Summer bushfires is still deeply felt," Mr Stone said.

"True to my agency's guiding principle of 'locally led, locally understood and locally implemented', we have designed this program to be as simple and flexible as possible, so recovering communities can develop local projects that make sense to them."

Grants can range from \$20,000 to \$10 million and

are open to community organisations, businesses and councils in Local Government Areas that were disaster-declared as a result of the 2019-20 bushfires.

Nationals Senate Leader and Senator for Victoria, Bridget McKenzie, encouraged local community groups and organisations to apply.

"This grants program is a great opportunity for local communities to identify and invest in recovery and resilience, through projects that address the social, economic or built environment needs of the community," she said.

"I encourage people in the North East to look at the guidelines, consider their community's needs and start planning projects – you know your local area best, so have a think about what could really benefit your community and help



with recovery."

Applications open on 22 July, 2021 and close on 2 September, 2021.

Workshops to assist applicants with the grant process will be available in person and online from mid-July.

The Black Summer Bushfire Grants program is part of the National Bushfire Recovery Fund. and Resilience Agency administers the grants. For more information and workshop details visit recovery.gov.au/black-summer-grants.

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More bushfire recommendations implemented

A major milestone was reached under the Bushfire Royal Commission last week with the opening of the Australian Climate Service (ACS).

government has now
completed 11 out of its 15
recommendations from
the Royal Commission
into National Natural

Disasters," Mr Littleproud

"Many of the recommendations require collaboration with different levels of government, non-profits and the private sector and we have been working hard to get results.

"The ACS brings together data and scientific expertise from across Commonwealth agencies, including the Bureau of Meteorology, CSIRO, Australian Bureau of Statistics and Geoscience Australia.

"The information will help to anticipate natural disasters and focus our investment on reducing those risks.

"After the Royal Commission's report, we passed the National Emergency Declaration Act, allowing us to leverage Australian government capabilities in support of state and territory governments during emergencies.

"In line with the Royal Commission's recommendations, we have cut red tape for state governments to gain faster access to disaster recovery packages under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements," Mr Littleproud added.

"This includes future call outs of the Australian Defence force to aid communities recovery needs in times of disaster.

"We have also committed significant resources for disaster recovery and resilience projects.

"The \$600m Preparing Australia Program will open in October, to reduce the impacts of natural disasters and increase resilience for households and the community.

"We have increased annual funding to the National Aerial Firefighting Centre to \$30m and will secure an additional large air tanker to boost our national aerial firefighting capability.

"We have also recently commenced a proofof-concept trial, for a national Public Safety Broadband communications capability for emergency services. This capability will improve access to critical information and real-time situational awareness during emergencies."

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Fire prevention group helps make better decisions

A grassroots community group which provides information about bushfire preparedness and prevention is conducting a series of upcoming webinars where people can gain knowledge from industry experts.

Bushfire Resilience Inc. (BRI) is a community organisation, based in the Shire of Nillumbik, whose aim is to provide bushfire information to households based on science, experience and best practice.

By being better informed people are empowered to make better decisions in preparing for and responding to the threat of bushfire.

BRI creates best practice webinars that include quality topics that are practical, helpful and relevant. The webinars involve the best presenters and panel members in Australia and include a robust audience engagement.

BRI is offering free

information sessions on fire safety topics which are presented by wellrespected scientists and academics.

There are five 90-minute webinars to be held over the next three months, with the first session scheduled for Wednesday July 21. The presenters' information is available at br.org.au/presenters.

It has been three long months without our Tom and where to begin on what we have been feeling...

Firstly, we would like to thank the community for all the love and support we have received over the past three months. On the days we didn't have the energy to cook, it was your meals we pulled from the freezer. On the days the loneliness felt deafening, it was your tyres we heard crunch down our driveway. On the days we needed to cry, it was on your shoulder.

So a deep heartfelt thank you to each and everyone of you who offered a helping hand when we needed it the most in any shape or form, your kindness and empathy has not gone unnoticed.

On the 23rd January 2003, Tom Kenneth Sheather entered the world, a chubby ball of perfection, the final piece to the Sheather family puzzle Trudy and Peter had created. Their third and final beautiful boy.

From the beginning Tom hosted a smile that lit up a room, a smile that later became his trademark. A smile that's posted in every photo that hangs on our wall.

His two older brothers often made him grin. Nick and Cameron were constantly steering their brother into mischief. Their days were spent playing cricket on the lawn at 'Hunters Plain' and their evenings were spent around the dining table, laughing together. Always as a family.

In the early days Tom quickly took to planes. Maybe it was the closeness to the airport where he grew up or perhaps his Aunty Raelene's tales of travel ignited something deep within. His career path became evident very early on.

While getting a pilot's license was no easy feat, he knew he had to be clever, book smart. He began his pilot's dream aged 14, sitting on two cushions to see over the instrument dash of the plane. Lucky for Tom, intelligence was another thing that came naturally to him. With one of his flying instructors once stating "Tom has given me a benchmark to aim for all my students, the new gold standard - the Tom Sheather standard."

He delved into school and quickly began to outsmart his older brothers. While his sporting ability was questionable and his brothers never let him



forget it, it didn't phase Tom. Like most things he just took it all in his stride.

In the past three months we have heard countless stories about our boy. How he touched your lives and had such a deep impact on people's journeys. Most stories began with that infectious smile, hit a peak with his sporting ability and ended with his quick wit. However, the main thing we heard and want to continue to hear is the deep imprint our Tom has left on your hearts and the warmth his memory brings to your day.

When Tom reached high school it became evident he was going to stick in his own lane and our family would be right there, on the side line cheering him on. He had a goal in mind, a dream of flying high and he was going to achieve it. Persistence and passion led him through his academic years.

A born leader, with that becoming obvious after he was assigned School Captain and had to lead the school through one of the hardest years imaginable a year following bushfires and a year in lockdown. Not once did Tom halt, he trudged forward and led his peers in a direction of greatness. He was a left arm to teachers and

a support beam to his classmates.

Outside of school stood Tom's biggest passion, his biggest achievement, the centre of his world - The Sheathers, his family. Trudy and Peter's shadow, Nick and Cameron's best mate. Little did he know he was the beating heart to this family and in our chest the rhythm is now lost.

A baby brother who taught his brothers about being wholesome and true. A son who taught his Dad how to love immeasurably, a bond between father and son that will forever be unbreakable. A third and final son who taught

his mother tenderness, a friend who ensured she was never left alone at 'Hunters Plain'. While Trudy never got a

In early 2019 Tom took on his proudest role, chest puffed out he was dubbed Uncle 'Moofy'. Tess quickly clung to her uncle and bathed in his natural affection every day. Quick trips to 'Ellisland' to grab Tess for afternoon jobs became a regular occurrence. Hand in hand Tess and Tom became best buddies. Tess became number one priority and unlike most of his friends he would often deny a party of a weekend and choose to be with his family instead, never wanting to miss a moment of Tess's milestones. Our regular called upon babysitter who insisted on staying for dinner but only if dessert quickly followed. Our home no longer feels like a home without him here to wake Tess up mid nap for a play.

Peter and Trudy embedded in their sons, brotherhood was the biggest. When the fire ravaged the farm in late 2019 Nick, Cameron and Tom stood strong. Beside Peter and Trudy they fought for the farm, for their home and everything it held. At merely 16 Tom's humour and capability pulled them through, Peter and Trudy held whole by their boys on a night they thought would be their worst. What our family has endured recently has proved to many that the fires were simply an inconvenience. We rebuilt, together as a family unit we built back everything we lost, Tom once again holding us all up when we needed it.

There are many things

Truth be told Tom loved life, every day. Even throughout the bushfire which was closely followed by Covid-19, where he had to study from home and captain a school from afar. He never once complained, nor did he steer away from his dream of becoming a pilot. He simply dove into everyday excited for what it was to bring and thankful for the family that surrounded him.

That's what made Tom so admirable, he simply loved life and everything it threw at him was entirely minor for his path was paved and he was going to achieve what he had to, basking in the moments with his loved ones tucked closely by his side along

the way.

In February 2021, Tom commenced employment with Oberon Aviation and took to the sky as an Aerial Observer. At 18 he had set in motion the path to his dream career, something he had always striven for.

An Aerial Observer is listed as one of the most important careers needed worldwide, a critical service which enables companies such as Essential Energy to ensure their services are safe, low flying along powerlines to inspect for any imperfections which could cause detrimental impacts such as a bushfire. Tom knew of its importance to people's safety and took great pride in going to work each day, even if it meant he had to have a dose of motion sickness tablets before he headed

In April 2021 Tom became a proud uncle again to his sweet Magnolia. As always Tom was the first to rush to the doorstep for a cuddle and the first to ensure I was okay, once again putting the needs of his family first.

The workplace accident that took our Tom will forever break our hearts, over and over again. His heroism for doing his line of work will never be forgotten. A career not enough people know of, a career so vital to communities safety and an essential service that is used every day. Our gratitude should be given to those aerial observers, thank you.

Tom was in the prime of his life when he was taken, though he fit more into his 18 years than most do in 90.





Golden fish lure anglers



Recreational fishers have the opportunity to explore regional Victoria and land a tagged fish worth up to \$10,000 as part of an expanded Golden Tag competition to boost tourism across the state.

The competition has hit several key milestones with more than \$270,000 awarded to fishers since the program began.

The Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) started the Golden Tag competition in February 2020. successfully encouraging visitation to Gippsland and the state's North East as communities recovered from bushfires.

One of the \$10,000 tagged fish - a brown trout - has been released in the Nariel Creek and currently remains at large.

healthier market competition and more competitive supply chains means fairer prices for farmers."

Water bills increase

North East Water customers will see a small increase to the cost of water and sewer services from the start of the new financial year.

Executive Corporate Services, Anthony Hernan, said the average residential bill will rise by approximately \$1.78 or 0.2 per cent for the financial year based on average residential usage.

"North East Water is still one of the most affordable water utilities in the country, and the third most affordable in

Victoria," Mr Hernan said.

"We're reducing the fixed charge component of our bills by 1.25 per cent, while volumetric charges will increase slightly by 1.55 per cent.

"The increase was approved by the water industry's economic regulator, the Essential Services Commission.

"Our aim is to make customer bills as affordable as possible and our price path over the next few years is expected to be similarly low.

"Help is available for those finding it tough to pay their bills, including short-term extensions through to long term assistance."

Mr Hernan added "With the new financial year, our major investments continue in local communities.




