

# Haines plans to plug potholes

Member for Indi, Helen Haines, has vowed to fight for funding to help councils fix potholes and repair damaged roads by rebooting the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program to provide \$500 million a year in untied grants to local councils.

Dr Haines said a funding shortfall was contributing to the decline of regional roads and called on the Commonwealth to boost funding, which has dropped in recent decades.


“More than 75 per cent of Australia’s road network is owned or maintained by local governments but regional areas struggle to fund the ongoing maintenance of local roads,” Dr Haines said.

“This is one of the biggest issues people talk to me about across Indi. As drivers we need to make sure our cars are roadworthy and we need more funding to make sure our roads are carworthy.”

“Federal government support has declined as a proportion of government revenue, which means councils must compete for routine maintenance through competitive grant programs.

“Regional communities battle a number of hurdles in upkeeping local roads including small ratepayer bases, increasing cost of repairs and materials, scarcity of workforce and limited funding.”

Dr Haines made her policy announcement at the corner of Mansfield-Whitfield Road and



Towong Council would get more than \$4 million for its roads program under the plan.

Dead Horse Lane, which received \$2 million in Federal Black Spot funding for a roundabout to improve safety at the dangerous intersection.

Dr Haines recently advocated on behalf of Mansfield Council and helped the shire claw back \$73,000 that the Victorian government had tried to sequester as administrative fees.

Since Dr Haines’ election, more than \$155 million in funding has been allocated to roads across Indi.

“We have had some significant wins on road funding in Indi and I am proud of that,” she said, “but I know we must keep fighting for a better deal for roads to keep us safe as we travel to work, school and beyond.”

Dr Haines’ proposal has been costed by the Parliamentary Budget Office, which has

calculated Indi would receive an additional \$36.3 million over four years, to be shared between the councils.

“This funding would enable local government to undertake the day-to-day work of fixing potholes and road erosion, while they plan for longer-term funding priorities,” she explained.

“For communities like Towong Shire, it would provide \$4.61 million for the council to prioritise repairs, apply flexibility that suits the local context and complements other projects.”

Dr Haines is also pushing for transparency and fairness in roads funding across the nation, recently signing up for the Australian Automobile Association’s My Safety Counts campaign, which calls for state governments to be required to provide safety ratings for

individual sections of roads when applying for federal road funding.

Dr Haines said her policy would help improve the condition of regional roads across Indi.

“Regional and rural roads across Indi have been battered by severe weather events resulting in dangerous potholes and prolonged lane closures,” she said.

“Not only does it make our roads less safe but it also proves costly for people whose cars are damaged when they hit a pothole or who have their windshield cracked.

“It is increasingly dangerous for people navigating country roads at night including areas that are more remote and have intermittent mobile coverage.”

Dr Haines said if she is re-elected she would push both major parties to adopt her policy.

## Burglar strikes during festival



The supermarket was closed for several hours after the break-in.

Police are investigating thefts from two businesses in Corryong’s main street early on Sunday morning.

It is believed the first incident occurred just before 6am when the glass door of the vending machine at the Corryong Laundromat was smashed and drinks and snacks and possibly cash were taken.

There was a subsequent break-in at the IGA supermarket a short time later where it appears stocks of cigarettes were targeted.

The offender or offenders injured themselves at the laundromat and there was a trail of blood from there to the supermarket.

Police forensics services processed the crime scenes requiring both businesses to be closed for several hours.

Police have also been scanning video footage and have identified a suspect.

The matter is being investigated by detectives from the Wodonga Crim-


inal Investigations Unit (CIU).

# Hospital appeal aims high

The CFA is calling on Victorians to dig deep alongside thousands of volunteers rattling tins for the annual Good Friday Appeal (GFA) this week, supporting the Royal Children's Hospital.

From fire trucks to traffic lights, community clubs to local events, Victorians can expect to see CFA volunteers out in force this Good Friday.

## Trial boosts mental health support in farming regions

Recruitment is now open for farming community members in three key dairy farming regions across Victoria to take part in a free trial of a peer-guided, model of mental health support.

The feasibility trial is part of the Back on Track program – led by the National Centre for Farmer Health (NCFH) with funding from the Gardiner Foundation – which is aimed at farming community members who are experiencing low mood or depressive feelings.

The evidence-based program was co-developed with the farming community over the past five years to ensure it caters to the needs of rural people.

The trial is now recruiting community members in the North East, South West and Gippsland regions of Victoria. It will explore the feasibility of a new support model

that involves trained and mentored coaches providing accessible and culturally appropriate mental health services to farmers, farm workers and other people in agriculture-dependent communities, ensuring they receive the support they need during challenging times.

"When people in farming communities face multiple stressful events - whether that be extreme weather events, market or financial pressures, succession challenges or other business or personal pressures - mental wellbeing is often under threat," said NCFH Director, Alison Kennedy.

"We know that mental health support is not always accessible in farming communities and when support is available, the providers don't always have a good understanding of the challenges farmers face. This can put farmers off from accessing these important services."



**New trial takes a practical approach to improving mental health.**

The 10-session Back on Track program involves weekly one-hour sessions between a coach and participant, which can be held in-person or online.

The coaches have been trained in 'behavioural activation', a practical mental health approach focusing on how positive behaviours and habits can positively affect mood.

Coaches are living and working in farming communities themselves and understand the nature of farming, including the problems and stresses that come with working on the land.

"When people exper-

ience low mood, they generally stop doing the things that bring them enjoyment and satisfaction, the very things we need to be doing to feel good," Ms Kennedy said.

"Behavioural activation turns this around by helping people identify what activities bring them a sense of enjoyment or satisfaction and scheduling this into their day.

"We're now inviting farming community members who are experiencing low mood or depression to participate in this innovative, practical approach to help improve

their mental health.

"This phase of the trial is only running for the next few months, so we urge interested people to get in touch to find out more."

Watch out for deer on the move

With the arrival of deer breeding season, the Centre for Invasive Species Solutions is reminding communities of the heightened risk of feral deer on the road as well as increased activity and damage across Australia’s landscapes including in suburban streets.

Dr Annelise Wiebkin, National Deer Management Coordinator, said feral deer cause serious damage in farmland, native bushland and urban areas and that breeding season is a particularly critical time to notice their presence and manage their impacts.

“Feral deer activity is intensifying, so people may see deer more often or even for the first time in a new area,” she said.

“It’s important the community reports sightings on the free DeerScan app. We have a small window of opportunity to track their spread and support control efforts, particularly in areas where feral deer numbers are still low.

“Feral deer trash and eat native vegetation, ringbark trees, create wallows, trample undergrowth and spread weed seeds - all things that threaten the survival of native flora and fauna,” Dr Wiebkin said.

Feral deer threaten the survival of native flora and fauna.

The centre’s Chief Executive Officer, Shauna Chadlowe, warns that feral deer are becoming an increasing concern to communities across the country, with extreme weather events such as droughts, floods and fires pushing them into new areas.

“It’s astonishing that deer have now spread to every state and territory in Australia,” she said.

“In fact, nearly a quarter of New South Wales and Tasmania and almost half of Victoria are now home to established populations. Their numbers have increased tenfold in recent decades.

“We need everyone to stay alert. Every Australian can play a role by reporting feral deer sightings or signs, like

tracks and damage. These reports are crucial as they help drive co-ordinated efforts to control new deer populations before they spiral out of control.

“By acting now, we can stop their spread and save Australia millions of dollars each year,” she added.

Feral deer also hit the farming community hard, with Ted Rowley, Independent Chair of the National Feral Deer Action Plan Committee, underscoring the importance of control efforts.

“Farmers are fed up,” he said.

“Deer cause \$69 million in agricultural productivity losses and \$4.5 million in vehicle and train collisions each year. The Plan is key to stopping these losses.”



# Communities tell their Anzac stories

Each community included on the Chauvel Australian Light Horse Memorial Ride has shared its own stories enriching the experiences of the riders.

At sunset last Wednesday at Tintaldra - one of the earliest settled communities in the Upper Murray - the riders crossed the Tintaldra Bridge from New South Wales into Victoria.

While today the state border looks benign, its historical role at Tintaldra as a pre-federation customs point, the closing of the NSW border with Victoria during the 1919 Influenza pandemic and more recently the pandemic, demonstrated that borders can be invoked with little notice.

In her welcome to the Memorial Ride Tintaldra, resident Marilyn Clydesdale spoke movingly about her former husband's Vogel ancestors. Ernest Vogel served and survived the Boer War. From the next generation two Vogel brothers, Julius and Leopold, served in France and Belgium and the Vogel family and their names are mentioned on the Cudgewa and Tintaldra's WWI Memorial. The sunset Service for the Fallen in Tintaldra seemed the perfect way to commemorate these young men who died more than a century ago.

At Towong the Memorial Ride had other priorities. My husband Mark joined them outside the Soldiers' Memorial Hall and, although he served as a Cavalry officer in the British Army for 37 years, his experience

lay more with tanks and military intelligence than with horses.

Nonetheless, once he'd been lent a horse, emu plumes had been found for his slouch hat and he had been kitted out with gaiters, he began to look the part and was prepared for what turned out to be an immensely enjoyable day with the camaraderie of the Memorial Ride, travelling into Corryong.

When Mark served the riders with what he called a 'stirrup cup' one of the them jokingly asked if this was a Memorial Ride or a hunt? If it was a hunt, then it was a hunt for heritage.

It is now time to highlight some of Towong's Light Horse story and its rich service heritage.

One person who immediately springs to mind is Ernie McInnes who started off his WWI service enlisting in the 8th Light Horse. Subsequently, he served in many different units earning a reputation as a military handyman. It was quite correct as Ernie was an all rounder and a greatly respected, salt of the earth citizen of Towong.

Stories continued in Corryong, firstly briefly at the Man from Snowy River Museum and then at Mittamatite Lodge at Corryong Health where Keith Whitsed began his story by talking about his father who had won with his horse at the Corryong races just as WWII broke out. He then enlisted in the 8th Light Horse with his horse 'Torquay' to join the training camp. There they were told that horses were not going to be used any more and they were to be sent home.

Keith's mother, who had moved the family

to Geelong while her husband and Keith's father was training, returned to Corryong to live in Thomas Lane. After the war the family bought a soldiers' settlers block at Bunroy where with decades of hard work they turned some tough country right on the edge of the bush into a success.

Keith, one day I hope you will tell us more about your family's story.

A few days later at Cudgewa on April 14th, Pam Livingstone brought a photograph of her father in uniform to the Memorial Service for the Fallen and afterwards to the Cudgewa Hall where she proudly placed the photograph beneath Cudgewa's WWII Honour Board. The inscription on the back of the photograph records that Trooper Norman Jarvis enlisted in the 8th Light Horse Regiment in 1939 and later served with the RAAF and Bomber Command.

Having survived WWII, you would think that a brave RAAF serviceman might have been rewarded with longevity. Having returned home to Cudgewa tragedy struck and he was killed in a farming accident, leaving Pam fatherless.

In 2012 Pam visited the Bomber Command Chapel in Lincoln Cathedral, reminding me that I had also visited it many years earlier when my car had broken down on my way north to our then home in Newcastle upon Tyne.

For some years I had a pamphlet with a map showing all the English WWII airfields. It made England's east coast seem as if it had been one huge wartime airfield and Lincoln was just one of many destinations

and airfields on the map. Norman Jarvis had done his bit in that enormous defence effort and in doing so, had risen through the ranks by 1945 to Warrant Officer. Thank you Tony and thank you Pam for driving down from Grenfell and sharing your story.

Had it not been for the Chauvel Australian Light Horse Memorial Ride coming to Cudgewa and Tony Jarvis bringing his cousin Pam to the service, I would never have heard the story and learned that Cudgewa has its own very own Bomber Command story.

I can only imagine that having found that the Jarvis family is well represented on both Cudgewa's WWI Memorial as well as the WWII Honour Board, that Norman's story is one of the family's many significant stories.

There are many other family names whose

names recur on war memorials throughout the Upper Murray and beyond. For the 110th anniversary of the Anzac landings on Gallipoli we can still only see the tip of the iceberg of many more stories.

Our thanks go to the teachers and Years 5 and 6 students at Corryong College whose research in 2018 not only re-invigorated but became a catalyst for the commemorative conversation with their book *Light Horseman of the Upper Murray*; and the General Sir Harry Chauvel Foundation which picked up the theme and created the Border Light Horse trail that in turn inspired the epic Chauvel Australian Light Horse Ride.

Keep the stories rolling from our hills and valleys and into our part in the spirit of Anzac.


