# Candidate fails to do his homework on preferences

The Liberal Party has been forced to reprint the how-to-vote cards of Indi candidate James Trenery after reports surfaced of an 'unconscionable' land transfer undertaken by independent candidate, Mark McFarlane.

Mr Trenery's first how-to-vote card has been distributed on a flyer across the electorate, preferencing Mr McFarlane at number five, ahead of the incumbent Dr Helen Haines.

According to the *Herald Sun*, Mr McFarlane was involved in a civil case in 2021 that has been described by some lawyers as a 'textbook example of elder abuse'.

In 2018, State Trustees commenced proceedings

on behalf of Mr McFarlane's mother. In 2021 the Supreme Court found the transfer of the home of Mr McFarlane's mother to her son occurred by 'undue influence and was unconscionable'. It ordered the home to be transferred back into his mother's name.

"The judgment shows
Mrs McFarlane was
frightened of her son
because he was very angry
and he had two guns," Dr
Haines said.

"In evidence to the court, Mrs McFarlane said 'He got so angry I thought he was going to hit me if I didn't write that he was in charge of my residence'."

The preferences of the Liberal Party, Pauline Hanson's One Nation and Family First put Mr McFarlane ahead of Dr Haines in their attempts to return the seat of Indi to the Liberal Party.

Dr Haines said this was another example of Mr Trenery failing to do his research before making claims or decisions.

"Mr Trenery has once again failed to do his homework," she said.

"I am pleased he has decided to rectify his gross mistake. It is now incumbent on Family First and One Nation to do the same and direct their preferences to Mr McFarlane last.

"The conduct found by the court is completely unacceptable in every situation, particularly from someone seeking to represent our community in Parliament.

"The people of Indi deserve to know the true character of the people seeking their vote.

"This is a serious error in judgement by Mr Trenery," Dr Haines said.

She called on Mr Trenery to say whether he put forward the proposed preferencing or if it was a head office decision.

"If Mr Trenery put forward this preferencing, he failed to do even a basic online search before making an important decision.

"If the preferences were decided by his party office, it shows Mr Trenery has no control or influence within his own political party."

### Bush bandit bailed over burglaries

Police have charged a man over alleged thefts from two businesses in Corryong's main street on the final day of the bush festival on Sunday April 13th.

The first incident occurred just before 6am when the glass door of the vending machine at the Corryong Laundromat was smashed and drinks, snacks and cash were taken.

There was a subsequent break-in at the IGA supermarket a short time later where cigarettes valued at around \$10,000 were stolen.

The offender injured himself at the laundromat and there was a trail of blood from there to the supermarket.

### Record breaking festival marks 30 years

Now that the dust has settled on the 2025 Man From Snowy River Bush Festival, the board and more than 300 volunteers that made it successful can take a well deserved bow.

The Upper Murray was packed with visitors for the 30th edition of the festival which broke all records for camping numbers and crowd attendances.

undertaking is not possible without the support of the community and the generosity of the festival sponsors who deliver a standout event and a great experience for everyone involved, while also supporting the broader success of the region.

The festival recorded than visitations to events over the four days and the injection into the local economy is estimated at \$9.75 million.

This does not take into account the visitors who start arriving in Corryong earlier in the week and those who stay on after the event for Easter and the school holidays.

Many local traders reported record turnover for the week which is a great benefit to businesses as a traditionally quiet winter looms.

In addition, the festival supported local businesses by issuing 'buy local' vouchers for its volunteers.

The festival also catering opportunities for comm-



unity groups to raise funds at a number of events.

### Loose horse still at large

A horse involved in the re-enactment at the Man From Snowy River Bush Festival continues to elude chasers after escaping with the mob during the event.

The plan was for stockmen, led by 'Jack Riley', to corral the 11 unbridled horses and bring them back to the station.

However, the crowd of more than 5,000 watched as the horses galloped off into the hills.

Ten of the fugitives were captured but a single rogue is still at large, defying efforts to find him.

Festival organisers have been conscious of the media attention about the escapee but are using all methods available to find the lost horse.

"Our paramount focus is on the horse's welfare." said festival chair, Nicole

"We have engaged an expert tracker to locate the horse as well as using thermal drones.

"Most importantly, we have worked with nearby landowners to put food and water out on their property boundaries.

"I can give assurances that we will be continuing our efforts to recover the horse," she added.

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### Trail ride turned into more than a journey

The days, weeks and months have been very full since I received an email from Pat Leary the inspiration behind the plan to ride the General Sir Harry Chauvel Memorial Foundation's Border Light Horse Trail.

Pat wrote "I am looking into the idea of riding in light horse uniform and saddlery along the Australian Light Horse trail starting from Shepparton to Harden and then from Harden back to Tallangatta. I'm looking at starting in Shepparton on 4 March, the anniversary of General Sir Harry's death in 1945 and finishing in Tallangatta on 16 April, the anniversary of his birth

"My idea is that we can work together to bring awareness to both dates."

When Pat emailed in July 2024, the General Sir Harry Chauvel Memorial Foundation had only just published its Chauvel Border Light Horse Trail, a project taking three years. The Foundation had wanted to wait for two memorials to be unveiled - Sandy the Warhorse in Tallangatta and the Light Horse Memorial in Wagga

The Corryong Rotary Club, The Man from Snowy River Tourism Association and the Sandy the Warhorse Memorial Committee in Tallangatta supported the project with generous donations enabling brochures to be printed. This was the beginning of a venture that was to become a significant that would journey challenge conventional commemorative protocols and make us all pause to reflect in the lead up to Anzac Day.

Pat Leary's email came as a surprise to the Chauvel Foundation. We could not believe that someone was prepared to ride the 750km trail. The Foundation agreed to support the proposal providing it was given credit for the

authorship of the Chauvel Border Light Horse Trail, credit for its support and that the Australian Light Horse Association had to be invited to take part. In the event up to 50 riders took part in the ride, occasionally with only three riders.

Initially, Shepparton RSL was hesitant about its role in launching the Memorial feeling McLean's Pledge was too long. Yet when Ewen recited it during the service to launch the ride, everyone was won over to believing that these riders really had the determination and resilience to make their initiative work.

When Melbourne University's agricultural campus at Dookie heard about the ride, it invited the participants to address its new students. Overcoming a rather hesitant RSL in Wangaratta, the riders received a wonderful welcome in Wodonga with the RSL inviting a horse to join them briefly in the bar and donated \$1,000.

By linking the Upper Tallangatta Murray, and Wodonga in Light Horse, racing and railway heritage, the Sandy the Warhorse Memorial was key to making the trail work.

As the trail and the ride both highlight local history Wodonga City Council, commissioned a plaque to be placed near the old Wodonga railway station, commemorating the men and their horses who during came in from the Upper Murray, Tallangatta and the Wodonga districts on the Tallangatta train. In Wodonga men and horses changed to the mainline trains taking them to training areas at Maribyrnong Broadmeadows eventually to ships sailing to the battlefronts in France, Egypt and Palestine.

Sandy has been the catalyst to highlighting that rich piece of history.

Albury mayor, CR Kevin Mack, turned out in his scarlet mayoral robes

to the service at the city's War Memorial, thanking each rider in turn. I hope to find that Albury has Light Horse links beyond its two Lone Pines (one in the Commonwealth War Graves section of the Albury Cemetery, the other in the Botanic Gardens). In Albury's Pioneer Cemetery there is the grave of 125 Trooper H A Gibbons, 6th Light Horse Regiment who died

on 10 July 1974, aged 74. Rider and support crew numbers were sometimes depleted during the trek when farmers needed to return home for calving cows, to check water and feed their stock. When bush poet Ewen McLean was missing at some commemorations Pat Leary or Ross Smith stepped up to read his moving pledge.

Returning home from Albury meant that we didn't manage to attend the ride's commemorative NSW events between Albury and Harden-Murrumburrah until the ride reached Tumut. I hadn't realised that Tumut and its surrounding district was one of the largest recruiting areas in the country for the Light Horse.

In the Upper Murray Memorial concentrated on bringing profile to the smaller communities of Tintaldra and Cudgewa where each town quietly brought their heroes to light. Too often those who served in the Boer War are forgotten.

However, in the Upper Murray there is a growing awareness that these pioneer spirits who served in South Africa and during the first decade of Federation saw the

formation of the Light Horse Regiments within the developing framework

of the Australian Army. By the time the Memorial Ride rode into Tallangatta, the success of the venture was readily apparent and a crowd was forming around the Sandv sculpture to welcome the riders. The service that followed was a magnificent commemoration of the ride's aim to highlight the legacy of the Australian Light Horse as a voice from the bush in the spirit of Anzac commemorating all those who have served their country throughout Australia's service in the Boer War, both world wars, Korea, Vietnam and subsequent conflicts.

By visiting smaller communities, commemorating local light horse history and taking the story of the Light Horse into schools and aged care facilities the riders have won hearts along the entire length of the Border Light Horse

As Ewen McLean wrote in his pledge "This ride is more than just a journey, it's a commemoration of the courage and sacrifice of those who in the Australian Light Horse regiments. It's a celebration of Australian history and the spirit of remembrance."

It is truly remarkable that these riders sacrificed their time, effort and weeks of their income to commemorate a legacy that is at the heart of every community in the nation.

The success of the Chauvel Australian Light Horse Memorial Ride is a remarkable gift to our cross-border communities.

The award structure requires young people to complete a minimum of six months of voluntary service, physical recreation, skill building and two adventurous journeys in the form of overnight hikes



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# Candidates urged to support local news

Country Press Australia (CPA) wants candidates at the upcoming federal election to support a policy demanding a fairer share of government advertising be allocated to regional and local newspapers.

CPA president, Andrew Schreyer, said there was an overwhelming need for the next federal government to do more to address the challenges faced by producers of essential public interest journalism and for the government to do so more swiftly.

"It's extremely disappointing to our industry to see major city-based media entities and overseas owned tech giants such as Meta receive such a significant share of government advertising, especially when the government openly recognises the role our papers play in our democracy," Mr Schreyer said.

"It is even more alarming when you consider these same social media platforms provide a haven for misinformation and disinformation, for mistruths and for scams that have caused great distress to many vulnerable Australians".

Mr Schreyer said the more-than 240 regional and local papers that are part of CPA have rightfully earned a high level of trust within the communities they serve and that social media platforms cannot offer the same levels of truth, integrity or accountability.

With the federal election now less than two weeks away and papers focused on the issues that matter most to local communities, Mr Schreyer said it was also important to realise that local papers continue to provide a beacon of truth for local issues and candidates and in many cases the local paper is the sole provider of hyper-local place-based public interest journalism.

"Our papers have an important responsibility to report on local candidates and issues, to hold candidates and government organisations accountable and to be a voice for local communities in regional, rural and other local communities across Australia," he said.

"Local papers generally rate highly for trustworthiness compared to other news sources, with many studies confirming people tend to trust local news more than national or social media because it is closer to their communities and less influenced by other agendas."

"If our politicians truly value the important role of local newspapers, then they must also do more to ensure that this overdue support is delivered."
