Support grows for food charity

The proceeds from the recent Corryong Men's Shed wood raffles will help a local food charity service which is looking for a new home.

Corryong FoodShare Services (CFS) has occupied the Scout Hall for the past 15 years on the proviso it be returned

to the Scouts if the need arose and now that the group has been reformed, CFS is on the hunt for new premises.

It has been trying to secure funding of \$160,000 to purchase the former gym premises in Jardine Street from Corryong Health but is not

eligible for government grants.

"The building is fit-for-purpose and is what we need to store the food and the furniture and it's a permanent home for us," said said CFS co-ordinator, Pastor Carol Allen.

"We have widened our fundraising net

and have written letters to companies and philanthropic organisations to see if they can get on board and there has been some support so far including a donation from the Belvoir Rotary Club."

The Men's Shed has chipped in \$1242 for CFS to use as needed and a

cheque was presented to Pastor Allen yesterday.

CFS currently has 120 clients of its services which is an increase from around 30 prior to last year's bushfires.

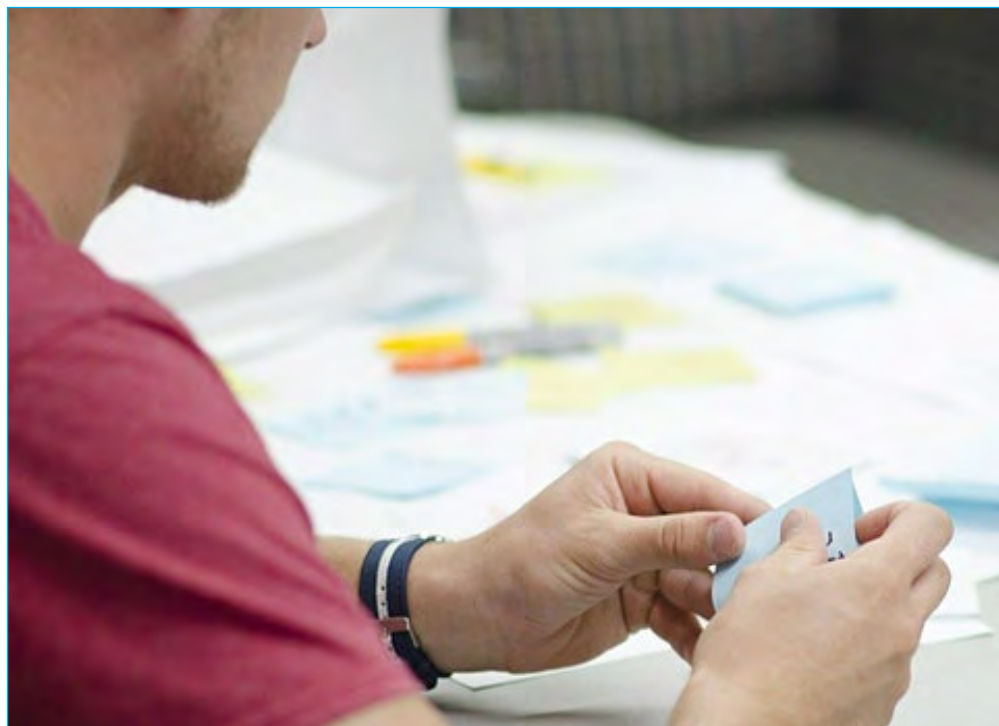

Next stage revealed for river route

Details of additional works on the Great River Road have been released following the announcement \$5 million in funding from the Victorian government's Bushfire Recovery Regional Economic Stimulus and Resilience Fund.

In 2016, Towong Shire Council developed the Upper Murray 2030 Vision Plan, following a comprehensive community consultation process, which identified and explored the implementation of 'game changing' projects for the Upper Murray, including The Great River Road and Town Trails.

Stage 1 of the river road project was completed in 2019, during

which a number of future extensions were identified and earmarked for Stage 2.

These works will build on the existing 153 kms of the Great River Road which stretches from Bellbridge to Khancoban, to make it a premier destination for drivers, motorcyclists, cyclists, bushwalkers and campers.

It involves the delivery of eight key projects identified by the council's Community Recovery Committees (CRC) to assist in the ongoing recovery process including town trails, wayside stops and a marketing campaign.

Towong mayor, Cr David Wortmann, said the project will be a huge step forward in the recovery journey.

"I'm excited to see

Stage 2 of the Great River Road project come to fruition, aiming to bolster tourism opportunities in the region and build on our ongoing recovery efforts," he said.

"A huge thank you goes to everyone in the community, our CRCs and council staff for working hard to move this project to the next stage - I can't wait to see it come to life!"

There will be several opportunities to be involved in the project and more detail will be provided in the coming months.

Heritage sites assessed for fire impact

During the 'Black Summer' fires of 2019-20 there were 18 historic heritage places of significance that were affected either directly or indirectly by the fires.

In addition, there were more than 80 historic archaeological sites and many more local heritage places affected or destroyed by the fires.

While there is much to do in the recovery after the Black Summer fires, heritage places remain important to local

communities.

The Heritage Victoria bushfire recovery team has commenced inspecting impacted places in Towong Shire including the Koetong Trestle Bridge and Old Tallangatta. These two sites were not within the fire footprint but are significant heritage features identified by the community.

The team has also met with members of the Corryong Historical Society and other key stakeholders.

State significant heritage places in Towong include the Tintaldra Store, Bethanga Bridge and Thologolong Homestead and various gold mining and battery sites.

The recovery team also wants to hear from the community on matters of site interpretation, heritage management and place significance.

After the loss of both the Genoa and Murrindal river timber truss bridges in the Black Summer fires, Heritage Victoria

is investigating whether other bridges in the region should be prioritised for maintenance and protection.

Head torches help high country brigades

Almost 100 head torches will help light the way for CFA brigades throughout Victoria's north east region, thanks to funds donated at a community event in the wake of the 2019/20 bushfires.

The 85 Pelican torches were the result of a \$6000 donation from the organisers of the High Country Comeback – an event that brought businesses from Bright and the surrounding areas to Melbourne to sell local products in the wake of the bushfires.

Bright CFA captain, Brett Michie, said it was fantastic to receive an unexpected gift from the community.

"We need them to work at night if there's a grass or scrub fire," he said.

"There can be mineshafts and wombat holes and so forth out in the bush and after we've put the fire out, we can't see any more so they're a very handy thing to have."

"It will also help structure firefighters who already have a torch on their uniform but the head torches really come in handy when going into a search and rescue situation at a structure fire."

"It's great for us but there are plenty of brigades around here that will really benefit from having the new torches."

High Country Comeback organiser, Janelle Boynton, said it was fantastic to help local CFA brigades in addition to local businesses.

"The brigades were really chuffed to know that

these had come from the community," she said.

"We put the event together to help local vendors in the wake of the fires but really wanted to

include a door-donation so we had money going to CFA and some local wildlife organisations."

Event organisers worked with CFA District

24 members to find out what was most needed in the region, with Captain Michie saying the torches will be helpful for many local brigades.

Check your heaters to avoid fire risk

As Victorians reach for their heaters to ward off the cold weather and single-digit overnight temperatures, firefighters are urging people to be

aware of the fire risks inside their homes.

CFA Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan, said autumn and winter are the highest-risk periods for

residential fires in Victoria due in part to the increased use of home heating.

Home heating includes open fires, wood heaters, fixed electrical and gas-

powered appliances and portable electrical heaters or those that use gas or kerosene.

"Many residential fires that result in fatalities

or serious injuries start in lounge and sleeping areas," Mr Heffernan said.

"Many of these fires are found to be caused by heating systems, appliances and equipment."

"Remember to never leave portable heaters and fireplaces unattended and turn off heaters before leaving the room."

"Ensure fireplace embers are extinguished before leaving your house or going to bed."

It is vital for all Victorians to check their heaters to ensure they are in good working condition.

Ideally, gas heaters should be professionally serviced every two years.

On average, there are around 3000 house fires in Victoria each year and most could be prevented by taking simple precautions.

"Last year, CFA found that the lounge and bedroom areas were the most common room of fire ignition for incidents resulting in serious injury or death," Mr Heffernan said.

"Most of these lounge room fires are caused by heating systems too close to combustibles."

He said poorly maintained gas heaters could also cause deadly carbon monoxide poisoning.

"There should be no greater reason to have your gas heater inspected and serviced than to ensure the safety of loved ones," he said.

"We have seen tragic consequences of this in the past."

"Another dangerous mistake people make is drying clothes near heaters and fireplaces. Clothes should be kept at least one metre from the heat source."

Obituary:- Hazel Dawn Pepper (nee Wools-Cobb)

7/9/1927 - 12/2/2021

Legend always put family and community first

Hazel was the daughter of Merchant Navy officer, Albert Wools-Cobb and Jessie Wools-Cobb (nee Hanslow), of Bellerive Tasmania.

They travelled and lived between Hobart and Sydney depending on where the ship 'Sydney' was deployed during WWI.

Hazel was the second of four children, her siblings being Betty Marmion (dec.), Keith and Stewart.

Her father was the only survivor of the crew of the 'Sydney' after he was transported to hospital with chronic asthma and pneumonia, a week before the light cruiser was bombed. He died a week later as a result of his illness.

After the early death of their parents (Hazel was only nine when her father died and 13 when her mother passed away), her siblings were separated to live with relatives. Hazel relocated to Dandenong and her siblings remained in Tasmania.

Hazel had a somewhat challenging childhood and yearned to be with her siblings. At 16, she left Victoria to work for Barnett's Photography Studio as a colour artist in Tasmania. When WWII broke out, her future husband Lance Pepper required photo identification which is when he first met Hazel.

When Lance went to serve his country (albeit under age), Hazel kept in contact with him during the war while he was based in Papua New Guinea and Darwin.

Hazel at 17 also decided to serve her country and joined the Australian Women's Land Army in Tasmania with a number of other young women at the Longford Eske Farm near Launceston, driving tractors and doing a multitude of various jobs on the farm. She was also chauffeur for many High Command Army Officers.

She stayed in contact with Lance and after WWII ceased they married in 1946.

Lance and Hazel worked together on the Pepper farm - comprising orchards, packing sheds, a market garden and sawmill in the Huon Valley - where Michael was born in March 1948. Due to Hazel's chronic asthma, her doctor suggested a change of air could help and told them about a town in North East Victoria. He must not have known about the fogs!

Lance was already a qualified butcher having finished his apprenticeship in Franklin and he quickly found work at Tallangatta where they lived with relatives Garth and Bobby Butler for a short while.

They knew of a town nearby that was looking

for a slaughterman, so after meeting a local 'Pop' Barber, they headed to Corryong where they lived in Room 4 at the Bottom Pub.

After some months they moved in with 'Pop' Barber in the original boarding house in Wheeler Street, before it burned down many years later.

Hazel and Lance took care of 'Pop' Barber and helped manage the boarding house where some 22 different nationalities had lived during the construction of the Snowy Hydro-electric Scheme.

Hazel had the task of feeding the multitudes, domestic duties and running the boarding house and also took upon herself to teach English to all the New Australians. Apparently, her teaching skills proved to be superior to her cooking talents at that early stage!

Lance was able to help improve her culinary skills and between them they produced the best chutneys, sauces, relishes and jams from the fruits and vegies from their own extensive garden.

In December 1955 their daughter Evette was born, while Lance and Hazel were busy with the boarding house, still volunteering for many clubs and helping with the foundations of the Memorial Hall, which were dug by hand.

They also pruned fruit trees for extra income and still found time to hand make more than 12,000 concrete bricks to build their family home in Jephcott Avenue, which Hazel designed.

The couple resided there until they passed away - Lance in June 2020 and Hazel in February 2021.

In September 1958, their second daughter Deidree (Deed) was born but not before dinner was cooked for the multitude of Snowy boarders - Hazel was in labour while preparing the meals!

A few months later, the

Peppers were able to move into their new home which Lance had built, with tradies' help.

Their son, Leon, was born in November 1962 and life was busier in the ever-growing town and they were constantly working, volunteering and eagerly playing sport.

Lance played football, was on committees and even had time to be Fire Brigade Captain in the 50s, while training to be a PMG linesman.

Hazel found her joy in art, taking her turn as president of the Craft Shop in its early days, fishing where lifetime friendships were formed with the Blakes, Blooms, Buddies and Lyons families and many others.

Hazel loved to see Corryong going forward and was a foundation member of the tennis, fishing and snow skiing clubs. Her talents didn't stop there. She taught swimming and helped Lance with cricket coaching while Leon was growing up.

Hazel worked for the medical clinic from 1970 after many years of doing night duty at the old Corryong Hospital. She had some extraordinary and versatile talents and was asked to show high ranking political heads around the district and in doing so, created the maps of the Corryong township and the Upper Murray which were valuable assets for the Corryong Information Centre which began in 1982 in the former town library. Hazel and Lance had financed the production of the maps themselves. They saw a need and followed through helping stranded tourists and those looking for activities, hiking, camping, fishing etc in the area.

Lance was always bringing home stranded tourists for a meal, a shower and sometimes a bed - never to Hazel's surprise. The family lost count of how many overseas tourists he

bought home!

Hazel was one of the organisers of the Corryong High School Annual Art Exhibition and a founding member of the Man From Snowy River Bush Festival Art Exhibition which she ran for many years.

She was awarded Man From Snowy River Legend Status in 2010, of which she felt very proud.

After working tirelessly alongside Tony Hayes for many years, Hazel knew her 'baby' was in great hands and that he would continue her work. In later years her daughters Evette and Deed helped with the art exhibition on many occasions and will continue Hazel's legacy where they can.

Over the past eighteen months, Hazel rediscovered her love of photography, art and sharing the beauty of this area when she started painting/pastelling again with Evette in the Riley's Arcade studio/gallery.

This is just the tip of the iceberg with her achievements but she will always be remembered for her volunteer efforts, her zest and her quiet faith in life for 93½ years.

Hazel was a walking miracle over the past 20 years having battled with a stroke, short term memory loss, serious heart issues and an ever painful ankle replacement. With Lance, Deed and Evette and family to give her support, Hazel managed with determination to keep going and be active.

Nothing much could slow her down for long. She was still a keen gardener in her 90s and no weed was safe anywhere!

A favourite family story involved Hazel and the escapologist goat:-

"One day our 'big brother' Wim Wubben bought home a goat to milk, to help with Leon's eczema. The goat turned



out to be a 'Houdini' and couldn't be kept in the paddock.

"On one occasion Mum caught it eating her favourite plants! She grabbed a broom, chased the goat out of her garden and it took off up the road. Forgetting she was wearing Dad's dressing gown and his ratty old garden boots, hair in rollers and makeup only half done, she took off chasing the goat up the road."

"We kids were cheering Mum on, when the next minute the goat turned around and started chasing her back down the road. She sure could run for someone who had chronic asthma! We were all laughing that hard, that nobody can remember what happened to the goat!"

Both Hazel and Lance had strong constitutions - a generation that had given their all, survived the war years and tough times. They loved their families, always appreciated what they had and were always willing to give someone a hand.

Hazel and Lance leave behind their children Michael (Atlanta USA), Evette and Deed (Corryong) and Leon (London) and 17 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren.

Lance and Hazel were married one month short of 74 years when Lance died. Now, after seven months apart, they are together again.

FUNDING TO PUT YOUR PRIVATE OVERHEAD POWERLINES UNDERGROUND

The Victorian Government has announced the expansion of its \$5 million Private Overhead Electric Line (POEL) Scheme across all high bushfire risk areas of the Alpine, Towong and East Gippsland Local Government Areas (LGAs).

- The POEL Scheme is fully funding the replacement of eligible overhead electric lines on private properties in these areas.
- Replacing old bare-wire powerlines with underground connections in those areas of Victoria most impacted by the summer 2019/20 bushfires will help reduce powerline bushfire risk and increase community safety and resilience.

Lady Eileen embraced the Snowy Scheme

The recent commission-ing by Snowy Hydro of the first tunnel boring machine (TBM) for the Snowy 2.0 project - the 'Lady Eileen Hudson' - has put the spotlight on the contribution of the 'first lady' of the scheme.

Lady Eileen was an important Snowy Scheme ambassador and the wife of inaugural scheme commissioner, Sir William Hudson; both of whom worked tirelessly to



promote its construction and give the public an understanding of its

progress.

Lady Eileen hosted many Australian and overseas visitors at her home in Cooma and at other locations.

- Lady Eileen, who cut the ribbon to formally open the Guthega tunnel in 1954 (pictured), was a huge support and ally for her husband, who was responsible for co-ordinating the construction of the biggest civil engineering project ever undertaken in Australia.

Lady Eileen was also an independent, strong woman with a deep love for gardens and gardening.

When touring the Scheme in the early days, she would always bring her gardening gloves and tools to tidy up around the work sites.

Later, she helped establish the Lady Hudson Rose Garden in Khancoban.

Lady Eileen was also a keen single figure handicap golfer and a member of the Cooma Golf Club from 1953-1966. During this time, she was club captain from 1962-1964 and Club Champion on eight occasions.

In 1959 Lady Eileen was awarded an OBE in recognition of her commitment as an ambassador for the Snowy Scheme.

The Lady Eileen Hudson TBM is set to excavate the 2.6km main access tunnel of Snowy 2.0 and provide access to the site of the underground power station cavern.

Fun fact:- Lady Eileen and William Hudson once hosted the Royal Family at their home for dinner and served lamb chops, followed by tinned peaches and ice cream.

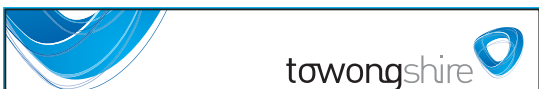

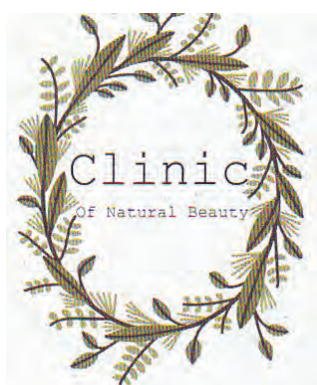

It's game on after a tough year

After a hiatus of a year because of the Covid pandemic, five clubs will kick off the 2021 Upper Murray Football League (UMFNL) season this Saturday.

Border-Walwa had indicated that it would go into recess prior to the 2020 season and that is still the case, leaving Bullioh,

Corryong, Cudgewa, Federal and Tumbarumba to do battle.

However, all clubs are looking forward to the upcoming season and there is a positive buzz around the Upper Murray community.

"The league has taken some hard knocks in the last two years but we

are back in action this weekend," said president, Gordon Nicholas.

"It seems like a long time since footy was last played here and the clubs are enthusiastic and are looking forward to the season opener with optimism."

Newly appointed UMFNL Club Support Officer, Chandan Kulkarni, said "I am thankful to all the clubs which have welcomed me in my new role."

"It is good to have so many positives going into the season opener with regards to increased participation and community engagement."

"There seems to be renewed hope and spirit among all the stakeholders involved after a hiatus last year."

Defending premier Bullioh will open its

campaign for a hat trick of flags on Saturday when it hosts Corryong and Cudgewa will travel to Tumbarumba. Federals have the bye, meaning there are no matches in the Upper Murray this weekend.

The Swans and Corryong will meet the following Saturday in the local derby, when the Upper Murray Events Centre will debut as the new venue for football and netball.

During the coronavirus lockdown, the Upper Murray Football Netball League (UMFNL) commissioned a working party to develop a proposal to merge clubs and enter a combined entity in the Tallangatta & District league.

All clubs except Federal rejected the proposal and the league now enters a new era with a five-club competition.

Bullioh will start as premiership favourite but all clubs have spent the enforced layoff spreading the recruitment net far and wide. The Bulldogs have lost two of their prime movers in league best and fairest Hamish Clark and champion goalkicker Ash Murray to Howlong. They have not been overly active on the recruiting front and will rely on keeping the nucleus of their flag side together as well as natural improvement from their younger brigade.

Cudgewa will be smarting over its loss to Bullioh in the 2019 decider after only dropping one game during the season and has attracted more than 20 players to the club including the return of sharpshooter Kylin



Bullioh will miss the goal kicking prowess of Ash Murray who booted 135 majors in 2019.

Morey, midfield gun Jake Vinge and the evergreen Michael Voight, along with youngsters Sam Harrison, James Whiteley and Darcy McKimmie from Tallangatta.

With few player losses, the Blues will be in the box seat to avenge their shock loss in 2019.

Corryong has appointed key forward Mitch Harris as head coach and he has been hard at work bringing talent in, headlined by former player and Thurgoona premiership star, Sam Cross.

Hard nut, Matt McNamara, returns from Barnawatha and the addition of several Tallangatta league players will ensure that the Demons are in contention at the pointy end of the season.

Gerard Midson has taken the helm at Federals again and will place his faith in the development of

a young list which includes Jack Miller and Travis Bandy who have come back from Tallangatta. After a slow start, the Swans have been active in the market lately and added up to 10 players to the list from neighbouring leagues, augmented by some experienced heads.

Tumbarumba has focused its recruiting on the Riverina area again and brings in some valuable additions with Ovens & Murray experience. However, there has been an equal exodus from the Roos and their expected improvement will be tested in the first fortnight when they take on Bullioh and Cudgewa.
