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More than 200 residents and concerned citizens from neighbouring municipalities turned up on Sunday at the Corryong

Memorial Hall to protest against the redevelopment of the Albury Hospital and to continuue the fight to have a new facility built on a greenfield site to meet the future needs of Albury Wodonga and surrounding communities.

Sunday's protest is the latest step in a protracted campaign that has escalated since the NSW and Victorian governments announced a joint \$558 million funding commitment to redevelop the existing Albury Base hospital.

The rally was attended by mayors and councillors from Albury, Wodonga and Towong Councils.

Towong mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead, outright rejected the proposal for the Albury hospital redevelopment and again called on the Victorian and NSW governments to visit North East Victoria, meet with councils and listen to their concerns.

He said that invitations to the rally had been sent to 13 state and federal politicians and only one had replied - the Member for Northern Victoria Rikkie-Lee Tyrell - who also attended the rally. A letter from the Member for Indi, Helen Haines, was also received and read out.

Cr Whitehead highlighted the inadequacy of the redevelopment proposal and the urgent case for a hospital that will meet the needs of the region now and into the future.

He asked for a 'show of hands' of people who

had been impacted in some way by a negative experience with Albury Wodonga Health and more than half the audience responded.

"This is the single most important issue facing the border region and Towong Shire residents," Cr Whitehead emphasised.

Wodonga mayor, Michael Gobel, put the finanacial case for a new hospital saying that "We know we're on the right side of history here."

Albury mayor, Kevin Mack, took aim at the absent politicians who he said were treating border communities like second class citizens.

Pay dispute continues

Despite Towong Shire staff receiving the first of two pay rises last week, outdoor workers are continuing their industrial action.

Outdoor staff held a two-hour stop work meeting outside the Tallangatta Shire Offices on Tuesday to protest changes to their pay.

According to the Australian Services Union (ASU), under the proposal by council, put forward as part of the current enterprise bargaining agreement negotiations, a maintenance allowance paid to outdoor staff who work in all weather conditions would be rolled into the wages of all staff, effectively increasing pay for everyone except for those staff.

"In all my years representing workers, I have never seen a proposal like this before," said ASU branch secretary, Tash Wark

"It shows such a disregard and disrespect for the skills, experience and qualifications these workers hold and a disregard for the communities and local

economies of this region as well.

"As a result of the proposal, office-based a rise in the staff would receive a pay 1.5 per cent.

increase of approximately nine per cent but fieldbased staff would receive a rise in their pay of just 1.5 per cent. "The proposed enterprise agreement including this offensive clause, is to be put to an all-staff vote," Ms Wark said.

Council queries claims

Towong Shire Council has released the following statement regarding the ongoing industrial action:-

It is important for the community to know that while it is a right for union members to take protected industrial action, not all union members have chosen to participate in the stop work action.

What we don't understand is why the union keeps making false statements, for example that outdoor staff are only receiving a pay rise of just 1.5 per cent.

All outdoor staff will (and have) received a pay increase of at least three per cent.

On 12 May 2025, the offer put on the table by council for outdoor staff was a choice of two options, with depot staff given the choice of which option they wished to be paid under.

Option 1 was a three per cent increase to the hourly rate of pay with allowances paid separately and also increased by the same figure.

Option 2 was to include allowances in the hourly rate and increase hourly rates from 1 August to at least the same level as Indigo Shire Council's

current rates with a further two per cent increase from 1 February, 2026.

Council has provided the outdoor staff with detailed, personalised information showing what the financial impact of each option will be. The staff have also been advised that they can elect which option to be paid under.

Including allowances into the hourly rate of pay is not unusual. The rates of pay at Indigo Shire Council are inclusive of allowances.

An internal payroll audit highlighted that a number of outdoor staff were being paid an allowance that, under the criteria set out in the award, they were not entitled to.

Adopting the same approach and current rates at Indigo meant that council could formalise the allowance payment arrangement for depot staff.

The benefit of including allowances in the hourly rate is that any overtime worked is paid at the higher 'allowance-inclusive' rate and penalties are paid on top of that rate. As allowances are not paid when staff take long service leave, there

is also a benefit for staff when long service leave is paid at the 'allowanceinclusive' hourly rate.

The proposed Enterprise Agreement will also include a new allowance of \$250 per week for a maximum of two staff at each depot who are on standby outside of normal working hours.

Historically, the annual pay increase for Towong staff has always been paid from 1 August pay period. Council has confirmed that the pay increases have been implemented and the depot staff have had the increase of three per cent paid from 21 July, 2025.

The current pay offer is also in addition to the recent compulsory 0.5 per cent increase to the Superannuation Guarantee Contributions council is required to make for all staff.

Council's offer for future annual pay increases is the higher of the rate cap or 2.5 per cent.

We are very conscious of the high cost of living being experienced by both our staff and ratepayers across the shire and we have tried to get the balance right with the pay offer on the table while keeping rate increases to a

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Mega machine hits the road

Snowy Hydro is preparing for the arrival of its fourth tunnel boring machine (TBM) on Snowy 2.0 - Australia's largest renewable energy project.

The 178-metre long machine has been purposebuilt to excavate a five kilometre tunnel through a complex geological area deep in the Snowy Mountains, known as the Long Plain Fault Zone.

The tunnel will eventually connect Tantangara reservoir with an underground power station built almost one kilometre underground.

After being tested and commissioned at manufacturer Herrenkness Guangzhou factory in China, the TBM was disassembled before its shipping to Port Kembla and is due to arrive in the coming weeks.

The large components will then be transported to the Snowy 2.0 remote work site at Marica and reassembled.

Snowy Hydro Chief Delivery Officer, Dave Evans, said transport movements had been predominantly scheduled at night to avoid disruption to road users in collaboration with NSW Police and Transport for NSW.

"Large sections of the TBM will be transported at night time through Cooma in a few weeks time," he said.

"The large over-size and over-mass loads will be pretty hard to miss coming through the middle of town!

"Our team is working tirelessly in some pretty challenging winter conditions at our Marica work front to get ready for this TBM.

"There's a lot of detailed co-ordination and planning involved in the safe transport and assembly of a huge machine on a remote work site."

The machine's name will be announced soon, following a local competition involving the Stars Foundation and Tumut High School.

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Local wordsmiths bring the heat

A well known Upper Murray bush poet and author who has embraced a relatively new genre - the Poetry Slam - has progressed to the Victorian state final.

Jan Lewis and Asha Romero were selected to advance to the final after competing in the Towong Shire heat on Saturday at Tallangatta, which was hosted by poet Andrew Cox. A poetry slam is distinct from traditional poetry readings in its competitive nature and focus on performance. The poets get two minutes to impress a panel of five judges, randomly chosen from the audience, with their original ideas in a form of spell casting called Slamming Poetry.

Judges hold up score cards using a 1-10 scale to one decimal place, with 10 being the highest. Of the five scores for each poet, only the middle three scores are counted.

Jan has been writing and performing bush poetry since arriving in the Upper Murray in 1988 and co-ordinating the poetry and bush music events at the Man from Snowy River Festival since 1997.

She is also Secretary of the Victorian Bush Poetry & Music Association and represents it on the Australian Bush Poets Association.

Someone else can wash all the dishes and dry 'em and put 'em away.


There're plenty of others to choose from, get them to answer your call,

Fodder may harbor fire ant risk

Agriculture Victoria is urging farmers to be mindful of import requirements and to keep watch for red imported fire ants (RIFA) when sourcing fodder from interstate.

Agriculture Victoria acting Chief Plant Health Officer, Stephen Dibley, said RIFA - or Solenopsis invicta - is one of the worst invasive ant species in Australia.

Native to South America, it was first detected in Brisbane in 2001 and while still largely localised to Greater Brisbane, it has also recently been detected in two separate zones in New South Wales.

"RIFA is not present in Victoria and we hope collective efforts continue to ensure that this situation remains unchanged," Dr Dibley said.

"If RIFA made it into Victoria, it could severely affect the state's economy, agriculture, the environment and the wellbeing of people and livestock.

"RIFA is mostly spread when it hitchhikes on material that is transported out of an infested area."

Mr Dibley added that with drought forcing farmers to source hay and fodder from interstate suppliers, there was a real risk they may inadvertently import RIFA.

"We know current conditions mean farmers are dealing with unfamiliar fodder sellers but we still want to protect our agricultural industry from biosecurity threats," he said.

"Hay and straw are ideal host materials for RIFA providing shelter, temperature regulation and a food source."

Dr Dibley said farmers should be aware that hay or straw purchased from anywhere outside of Victoria must come from a location with an accepted RIFA area freedom certificate.

Fodder purchased from the infested zones must meet inspection and treatment requirements and be certified by an officer responsible for agriculture in the state or territory of origin.

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Obituary:- Ronald Douglas Lewis Webb Bryceson

Family man was also a mate and mentor to many

Ron was born on Sunday November 24th, 1935 in Healesville, the eldest child of Doug and Zen Bryceson. He had sisters, Judith and Gillien.

Throughout his life he was variously known as Ron, 'Fireball' or just PA.

Ron's early years were shaped by the quiet resilience of rural life. The family's poultry farm in Healesville came to an early end following the devastating smoke and fallout from the 1939 fires. And so, at the tender age of six, Ron moved with Doug and Zen to Dareton in 1941, the start of many big changes in a life well-travelled and well-lived.

Ron went to school in Dareton and as he grew older, he began working on the family's dry fruit block, growing grapes with his father. That strong work ethic was part of him from the beginning.

At 18, he was called up for National Service and when he'd done his bit, he returned home and got back to the land.

But Ron wasn't a man to sit still. He trained in herd testing and when he turned 21, took up a job opportunity in Corryong. He packed up his van and set off, unknowingly driving straight into the next big chapter of his life.

Somewhere around this time, fate had other plans. Ron's sister Judith was working in the office at Mac White's in Lavington, better known as the Northside Hotel.

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And the rest, as they say, is history.

A year after that first meeting, Ron and Anne were engaged. They were married in May 1967 and started their life together in a humble cottage on the farm of one of Ron's best mates, Len Harris. It wasn't long before their family grew. On April 13th, 1968, Kerrie was born. A year later,

they moved into what would become the heart of the Bryceson family - 155 Wheeler Street, Corryong - a home filled with memories, laughter and the occasional project half-finished in the shed.

Then on January 20th, 1971, Ron finished his cream run and rang the hospital, as Anne was due to have their second child. The hospital told him he could come sit with her and meet his son, Brett.

Over the years, Ron's work was wide and varied and always handson. He worked with Ray Greschke in his garage, then at Mildren and Coysh as a welder-boilermaker for many years before building his own business - Bryweld.

If you lived on a farm around Corryong, chances are Ron built something for you - sheds, stockyards, gates or something else entirely. Whatever it was, it was built to last!

He even helped David Jewell change heavy machinery tyres at the mines - massive tyres that left quite an impression on those who got to tag along.

In 1996, when Kerrie moved back to Corryong with her husband Peter Clarke, he joined the business with Ron. The two worked side by side until Ron began to semiretire in 2006 - although anyone who knew him knows 'retirement' didn't mean slowing down.

Ron was also deeply embedded in his community. He served in the Corryong SES for more than 40 years, becoming a Life Member and even receiving a bravery award during the fires in 2003.

He was a member of the local pistol and rifle clubs and although none of his family really knew what went on inside, he was also a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Ron had a deep love for the Australian bush and the open road. He was a keen 4WD enthusiast and explored much of the country. With his good mate David Tulick, he tackled the Birdsville Track alongside the legendary Tom Cruise (not the actor!).

He also took a memorable trip with George Hobson up the centre of Australia, returning with stories and photos that captured the wild beauty of the land.

Then there were the smaller adventures - weekend trips through the hills or that unforgettable road trip up the coast to Queensland just after Brett got his license.

In 2015, Ron was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease but true to form, he met it with stubborn determination.

In 2019-2020, when the fires roared through the Upper Murray, Ron stayed behind to protect his home - even while Anne was in Albury undergoing treatment for cancer. That



was just who he was -strong, loyal and stubborn.

Anne passed away during the pandemic on July 15th, 2020 and though Ron felt that loss deeply, he carried on with quiet strength.

In May 2023, Ron moved into Mittamatite Lodge and it was there that he passed away peacefully on Friday July 11th, 2025 - not long after listening to his beloved Magpies put up a strong fight against the Gold Coast Suns.

True to character, he left the world on his own terms probably saying, "It's been a good life but

that's enough for me, time to call it."

Ron was a father, a husband, a mate, a mentor, a builder and a quiet hero. He lived a full and practical life rich with love, laughter, dirt under his nails and heart in his hands. His legacy lives on in the things he built, the people he shaped and the stories they tell.

Ron lived by simple maxims:-

Work hard. Be loyal. Never back down from protecting the people and places you love. And take the back road when you can!

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

These grants through a delivered partnership between Landcare Australia and the Victorian government's Department of Energy, Environment Climate Action - support hands-on projects that educate and inspire young people to care for Victoria's biodiversity.

Improve herd performance and value at the right price



The Glen 38 Special S20, sire of 10 bulls catalogued, is in the top 10 per cent for calving ease and the top 15 per cent for structure and docility.

The Glen's 55th Annual Bull sale on Friday 5th September will provide an opportunity for Upper Murray producers to procure herd improving genetics at commercially realistic prices.

At last year's sale, bulls averaged \$8,230 with 18 of them catalogued selling for the floor price of \$6000 and more than half of the bulls sold in the range of \$6000 to \$8000.

Mike Gadd, principal of The Glen, is budgeting for a similar result this year.

"While current cattle prices are much improved on this time last year, the reality is the Upper Murray has endured a pretty tough winter," he said.




