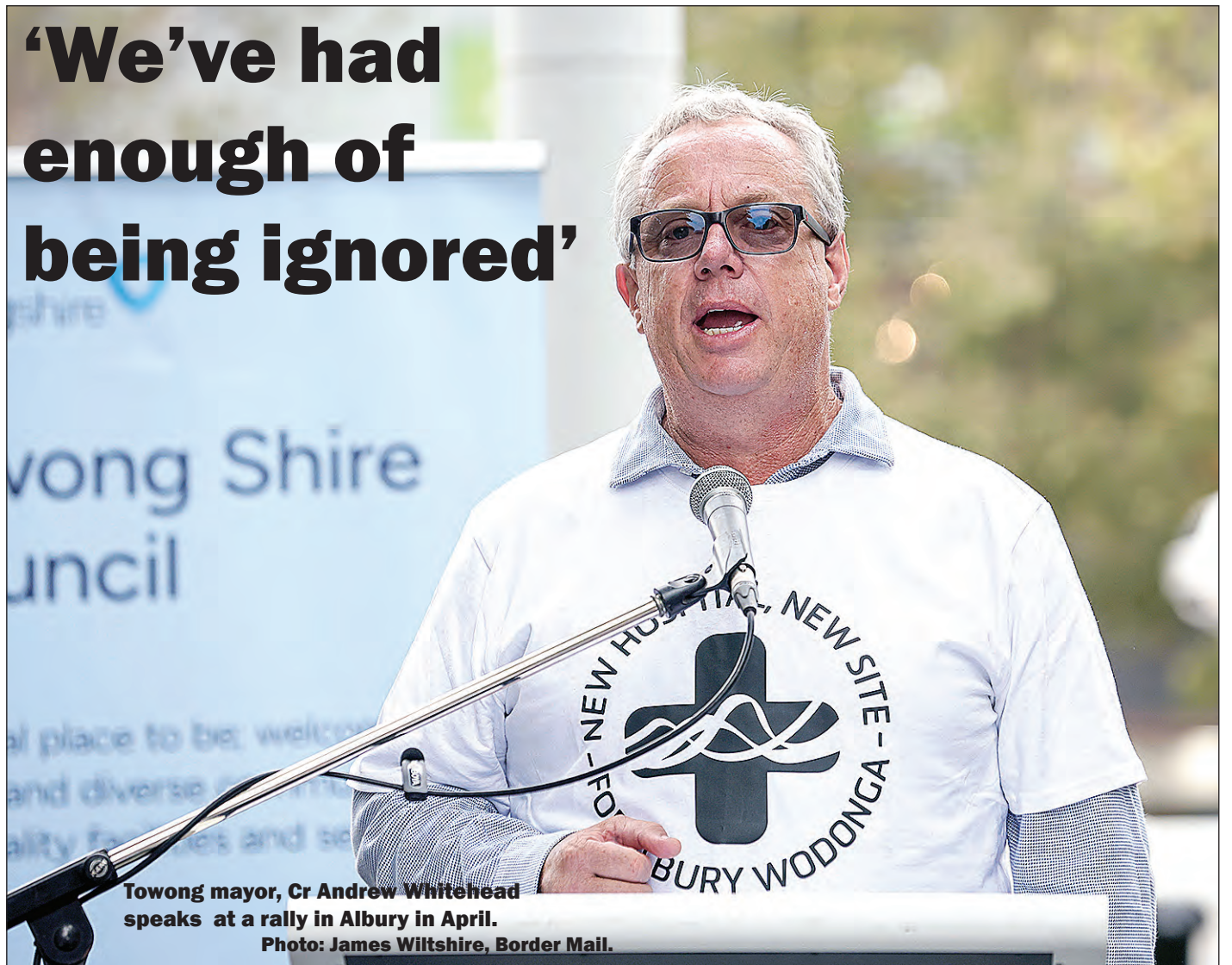

The Towong Shire Council is expecting a large turnout for the community rally in Corryong this Sunday calling for a new single-site regional hospital on a greenfield site in Albury Wodonga.

Sunday's protest is the latest step in a protracted campaign that has snowballed since the NSW and Victorian governments announced a joint \$558 million funding

commitment to redevelop the existing Albury Base hospital.

Residents of the wider Upper Murray region will come together for the rally calling on both the Victorian and New South Wales and Federal governments to commit to a single site hospital.

It will highlight the inadequacy of the planned redevelopment of the Albury hospital and the urgent case for a hospital

that will meet the needs of the region now and into the future.

Towong mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead, will be one of the guest speakers at the rally.

Addressing 500 people at a rally against the redevelopment proposal in Albury's QEII Square in April, Cr Whitehead said that "a broken system" had contributed to his father's death.

Step up to save mountain plant



Volunteers are on a quest to save a local endangered plant.

A community-based project to re-establish a critically endangered plant in the Burrowa Pine Mountain National Park (BPMNP) is gaining momentum in the Upper Murray.

Mountain Banksia (*B. canei*) became locally extinct in the park following the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires.

Seed collected from similar populations in the Kiewa Valley and Kosciuszko National Park has been used to produce plants which are

genetically very close to the extinct species.

In 2024, a trial of 80 plants was planted at two sites in the park where the last stands of *B. canei* existed prior to the fires.

This year, these two sites will each have 400 *B. canei* planted. As well as the 800 plants in the national park, 100 *B. canei* will be planted at Playles Hill Park in Corryong as an insurance population.

Local volunteers are now being invited to help with this project.

Burrowa Pine Mt National Park planting days will take place on Thursday 14th and Friday 15th August.

A high level of fitness is needed on Thursday 14th as the planting site is 1.5 hours of steep uphill walk from Bluff Falls. The second site is a remote area accessible by 4WD vehicle.

Both days will involve digging into hard rocky ground with mattocks to plant, stake and guard the Banksia seedlings. You will also need to be self-sufficient as you will be in remote bush areas. To

find out more and register your interest contact Glen Johnson via the 'Banksia canei Restoration Project' Facebook page.

The Playles Hill Project Group has been working since the Black Summer fires to reinvigorate the community facility.

After five years, 33 working bees, and a number of successful grant applications, a lot has been achieved.

Much of the invasive, weedy vegetation has been removed and already a number of plantings of both native shrubs and exotic and native trees have occurred.

The initial plan for 2025 was to plant up to 1000 local native shrubs to re-establish diversity into the park. As well as these local native shrubs, 100 *B. canei* will be planted as an insurance population.

Support for the plantings came from Towong Shire Council, Upper Murray Landcare, Royal Botanic Gardens of Victoria and the Banksia canei Restoration Project.

Prior to the plantings, some preparation work

will need to be done on the sites in the park. Working bees and planting days will be held at Playles Hill Park on Sunday six-6 day blitz from Tuesday 26th to Sunday 31st August. I

A good level of fitness is needed for the planned work. Although some tasks will be in reasonably accessible areas, work will include digging into hard rocky soil with mattocks and working on the steep rocky site of the area surrounding the mountain bike track area.

Cr Whitehead's father Bill (88) had to wait in an ambulance for several hours before being admitted to the Albury hospital.

"My father was ramped at Albury for over five hours," he said.

"When he was eventually admitted to the ED at 3.30pm, medics performed a scan to discover blood supply to the bowel had been blocked.

"By that time, my father's choice of whether

or not to have an operation had been taken away.

"A new hospital is the single most important issue facing the Upper Murray and Towong Shire," Cr Whitehead emphasised.

"I urge everyone to be at the rally on Sunday and lend your voices to this most important issue. We are tax payers and we deserve better.

"It's not only for us but for our children and their children as well!

"They can slug us with a new Emergency Services

tax without thinking twice but won't even talk to us about the Albury hospital redevelopment and what it means for our residents.

"We've had enough of being ignored."

"Let's make sure the Victorian government understands exactly where the residents of the Upper Murray and Towong shire stand on this issue.

"It's time for the region to get our fair share of funding."

The rally will be held on Sunday August 10th at the Corryong Memorial Hall from 12.00pm and a free barbecue will be available.

Other speakers will include Stan Stavros (Director, Better Border Health) and Dr Lachie McKeeman (Deputy Secretary, Border Medical Association.

The Victorian Premier and Victorian Minister for Health have both been invited as well as local state and Australian government representatives.

College pleased with results

The latest NAPLAN results show improved outcomes in four areas for the Corryong College.

There was improvement in numeracy results across all year levels; fewer students showed low progress in most areas; strong results were returned in the top two bands for numeracy; and there was a drop in the number of students needing additional support.

“The reduction in additional support shows that our everyday teaching and targeted help is making a difference,” said principal, Suzanne Trease.

“There’s still more to do particularly in helping students who need extra support with reading but there’s also much to celebrate.

“These improvements didn’t happen by chance. They reflect consistent

teaching, the use of student data to guide learning and a shared commitment to helping every student grow.”

In other news, the recent school science fair showcased the investigations by students from Years 3 to 6.

Projects ranged from exploring why insects have different wing types to examining how various surfaces affect frictional forces.

Sponsored by Snowy Hydro, many of the materials and equipment used were generously provided through their support.

Throughout the day, students from across the entire school had the opportunity to interact with the displays, ask questions and be inspired by their peers’ work.

The Parents Club recently funded two

additions to the school playground - a set of colourful flower-shaped chalkboards attached to the fence near the junior area and a brand new

outdoor play kitchen.

The bright flowers are already a hit with students who have been using chalk to draw, write messages and get creative during

recess and lunch.

The kitchen has quickly become a favourite spot for budding chefs and several imaginative role-players.

Haines focuses on key issues on return

Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, has covered a gamut of key service areas in the first two weeks of the new federal Parliament.

With international affairs a heavy presence in the Parliament, so too were domestic issues with Dr Haines making key advocacy statements for Indi.

The Albanese government passed legislation on its election commitment to reduce student HECS debt by 20 per cent, which Dr Haines supported for the almost 14,000 people in Indi that have an average HECS debt of \$21,000.

Dr Haines support was not without criticism, though, citing the timing of indexation as a problem for students.

“The current indexation arrangements are unfairly adding thousands of dollars to Australian debts and should be fixed,” said Dr Haines.

She has called on the government to extend payments for practical placements for students following her successful amendment in the last

Parliament to have the system reviewed within three years.

“I hear from so many people having to choose between study or work - some putting their degrees on hold because unpaid placements are simply not possible when they have mortgages, rents and bills to pay,” she said.

Dr Haines also raised issues with changes to the NDIS Pricing Review after meeting with local service providers last month. Under new rules, the amount providers can claim for travel is halved and risks the viability of future service delivery.

“Last month I met with more than a dozen of Indi’s physiotherapists, occupational therapists, dieticians, speech pathologists and support co-ordinators to hear their concerns.

“I have urged the government to pause these pricing changes and consult with providers in order to protect these NDIS services in the regions,” Dr Haines said.

Other legislation passing the Parliament included two bills to

legislate technical changes required for aged care reforms that will come into effect from November 1.

Dr Haines reinforced concern that the delay of 83,000 new Home Care Packages was leaving nearly 90,000 people waiting for care, speaking on the bill and raising the issue in Question Time on Thursday.

“The government’s

delay to the new aged care system leaves nearly 90,000 people waiting for a home care package,” Dr Haines said.

“Despite this, the government ignored the crossbench call to fund

20,000 packages to bridge the gap to the new system and cannot articulate what they are doing to support these people in the meantime.”

Parliament resumes on 25 August.

Disability support is available locally

An advocacy organisation that originally commenced as the Disability Persons Regional Council - Upper Murray in 1990, still operates to this day, albeit they have changed names multiple times and residents may not have ever heard of them.

Regional Disability Advocacy Service (RDAS) helps people with disability who are experiencing human rights issues to speak up and have their situation taken seriously.

Each person's circumstances are different but common situations RDAS assists with include:

- Applying for the Disability Support Pension
- Appealing a decision of the NDIS including declined access requests
- Facing discrimination based on disability (for example at work, at school, with Centrelink)
- Cases of abuse, neglect, or exploitation
- Support at VCAT/NCAT or Administrative Review Tribunal hearings

RDAS also provides information and referrals to other organisations which may be more suitable for a person's needs.

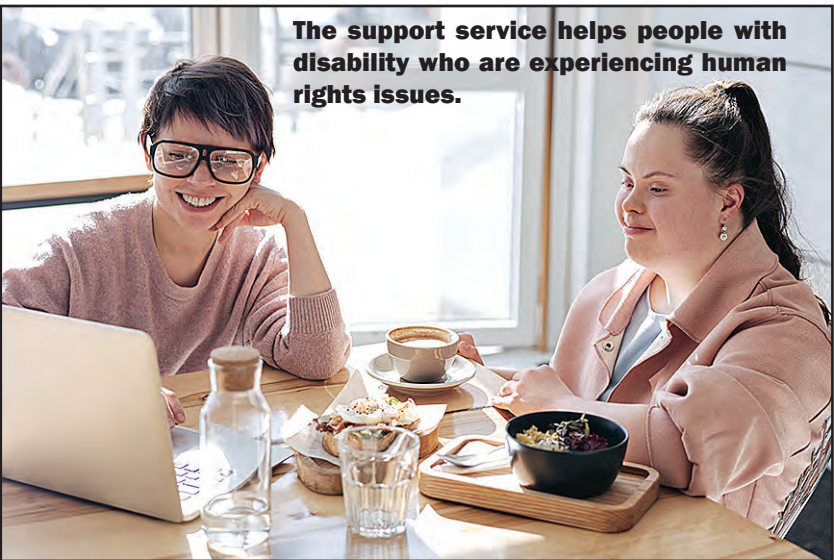
Anyone with a disability or caring for someone with a disability can access support from RDAS (no formal diagnosis required) who is experiencing a human

rights issue and lives in the local government areas of Towong Shire, Alpine Shire or Snowy Valleys Council.

The service is free as RDAS receives funding from the Victorian and Australian governments.

The head office is in Wodonga, however if someone is unable to travel there for any reason, their advocates can visit you in your home or another mutually agreed location in the community.

RDAS is not a crisis support service, nor can it provide legal representation, mediation or medical advice. However, it can provide referrals to organisations that deliver these and similar services.



The support service helps people with disability who are experiencing human rights issues.

Workshop provides coping tools

A powerful and practical one-day workshop on how to build resilience, navigate crisis and adapt to change during times of drought is to be held in Corryong.

The workshop - 'Decisions that Drive Drought Recovery' - will equip producers with the confidence and the tools to make the decisions necessary to navigate their farm business through the current seasonal challenges.

Participants will:-

- learn how to navigate competing priorities for limited resources (family, farm and business)
- identify key resource issues, stressors, risks and opportunities for your farm business
- learn improved decision-making skills and how to manage key priorities - especially when under pressure and stress
- learn skills to rebuild capacity after battling personal/health and business challenges
- connect to networks that support recovery and resilience

The workshop will be held on 19 August at the Corryong RSL Hall from 9am - 3:30 pm. Morning tea and a light lunch will be provided.

Farmers call for immediate drought support

Regional farming leaders made an urgent appeal to government ministers at the Southern NSW Drought Summit on Monday, calling for immediate financial and practical support as worsening drought conditions continue to impact farmers across Southern New South Wales.

The summit - organised by Council mayors from Snowy Valleys, Greater Hume, Cootamundra Gundagai, Wagga Wagga and Yass Valley - brought together government representatives including NSW Agriculture Minister, Tara Moriarty, and seven members of the NSW Parliament alongside local farmers, agronomists and rural support services from all drought-affected regions across southern NSW.

Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) mayor, Cr Julia

Ham, said 49 per cent of NSW was now affected by drought and that even the most resilient producers were reaching breaking point.

"The summit highlighted that NSW farmers are being left behind compared to other states offering direct drought subsidies and the mental health of our communities is deteriorating under the pressure," Cr Ham said.

"There is a clear disconnect between government policy and on-ground reality, and we're calling for drought to once again be recognised as a natural disaster in NSW."

During the summit, local farmers spoke passionately about the growing toll of fodder and water shortages, record-high freight costs and widespread pasture loss not just on their livestock and livelihoods but also

on their mental health and family wellbeing.

A key outcome of the summit was the proposal to establish a NSW government-led, producer-informed Drought Taskforce to oversee implementation of the summit's recommendations.

The taskforce would bring together local farmers and producers, rural support services and government agencies to ensure that policy and action reflected on-the-ground realities.

"There is no time to wait," Cr Ham said.

"The recovery from drought is painfully slow and precarious.

"We need immediate relief of emergency feed and water, support for medium-term recovery of restocking, debt management and supply chain issues and investment in long-term drought resilience for our farming communities

including breeding herd restocking and policy reform.

"A failed spring would be catastrophic, further delaying the replenishment of critical fodder reserves and compounding already severe financial and mental health strain. Producers face the brutal combination of soaring input costs, potential declines in commodity prices and the emotional toll of rebuilding with no guarantee of stability.

"The summit made one thing clear - producers have done all they can. The current drought has exposed systemic gaps in how we support rural communities before, during and after drought. Government leadership is now essential.

"Support must be timely, coordinated and practical and rooted in the experience of those on the land."

Farmer voices must be heard

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is urging farmers and regional Victorians to have their say on the biggest issues and opportunities facing their communities through the first ever State of the State: Farmer Priorities Survey.

VFF President, Brett Hosking, said the VFF-led survey comes at a time when frustration in farming communities is reaching boiling point.

"We know that our members are coping it from all sides, whether it's the drought, conflict over land use or new taxes," Mr Hosking said.

"The feedback from communities I visit is that they're not being heard.

"We know we have a big task ahead to cut through with decision makers. This survey is about getting the data to support our advocacy for the next 12 months as we head towards a state election.

"We want the facts and figures to demonstrate where there's widespread concern to help us focus the minds of decision makers. We also want to make sure our advocacy is on-target and delivering maximum impact for members."

Mr Hosking urged people across regional Victoria to take a moment to share their thoughts and share the survey through their networks.

"Five minutes is all it takes to share your thoughts on issues that could well and truly shape our industry for decades to come," he said.

The survey is open now until 14 August and survey participants have the opportunity to win a Combo Smart Antenna and Telstra GO bundle prize pack valued at more than \$1600 from generous partners, Zetifi and Telstra.
