Benambra stays blue

Despite a state-wide swing against the Liberals in Saturday's election, Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley, bucked the trend and is likely to be returned with an increase in the primary vote of 10 per cent.

Mr Tilley polled 43.56% of the primary first preference votes compared to his main rival, Independent Jacqui Hawkins, who scored 32.12%. The poll was a lot closer on a two candidate preferred basis with Mr Tilley recording 51.13% and Ms Hawkins 48.87%. "I'm grateful and humbled by the support at this election," Mr Tilley said. "When the count is complete it looks like my primary will be up by more than 10 percent. That's massive and I'll take that as a vote of confidence and approval for the work through the pandemic , fires and the health crisis. Cont. on page 3.

Timber shortage threatens mill jobs

The time for an appeal to be heard against a Supreme Court decision stopping VicForests from harvesting timber could have a significant impact on the operations of a Corryong sawmill.

The Court found the state-owned logging group broke the law by failing to protect endangered gliders when logging in Gippsland and Central Victoria.

Volunteer environment groups King Lake Friends of the Forest and Environment East Gippsland accused VicForests of failing to adequately identify and protect greater gliders and yellow-bellied gliders during its operations.

In her judgement on November 4, Justice Melinda Richards determined VicForests' methods for protecting gliders were "inadequate", "likely to be ineffective" and "not consistent with relevant scientific research."

"At present VicForests does not survey all of a coupe (a small area of forest) before harvesting and so it plans and undertakes timber harvesting operations without knowing where gliders live ... and which parts of the coupe should be retained for their habitat," the judgement said.

"The ecological evidence was clear — gliders that live in coupes that are harvested in accordance with VicForests' current practices will probably die as a result of the harvesting operations."

Greater gliders were recently listed as endangered after a

n significant decline in I numbers.

VicForests is preparing an urgent appeal regarding the final orders and wants it listed for hearing as soon as possible.

However, Corryong mill owner, Graham Walker, is concerned that if the appeal drags on his order of logs from VicForests will be stopped. He estimates that the mill's existing supply of timber will be depleted by March 2023 at which time

he may have to stand down his 22 workers.

"Once they get a court date that might not be until March, so it doesn't give much of a window to get logs in before the wet season, so I'm not putting a lot of hope in it," Mr Walker said.

"I can't see we're going to get an outcome before the end of March or if not later and depending on what logs we can get, we're going to be running low by then."

Timber towns need saving again

I am writing in reference to recent media, coverage about the plight of local timber mills.

This situation takes me back to the early 1980s when the Corryong mill was threatened with a shutdown as it was not allowed take timber out of the forest beacuse some species were being made extinct.

It was before amalgamation of the Upper Murray and Tallangatta Shires in 1984. I was a councillor for the Upper Murray and represented council on the Timber Towns Committee. The meetings were held at Knox in Melbourne every second months and I ended up on the State Committee.

One of the concerns at that time was the possible closure of the mill in Corryong because they were being stopped from getting timber from the forest. The president of the committe was a city councillor in Melbourne. I explained to the committee that when timber is taken from the forest it is replanted to replace the trees taken. Of course, they didn't believe me.

So I said can we get a bus at lunch time and I will take you to see what occurs. As it happened I had passed this area in the Dandenongs on my way to the meeting.

No bus was available but eight car loads of committee members went to see this area. The replanted trees were about eight to ten feet tall. They all said they didn't that happened. It only took half an hour to show them.

When we got back to the meeting I was quick to point out "You folk sit on your shiny seats down here in the city making all the rules and not knowing what is really happening in the country."

It worked out then the mill in Corryong as well as others were able to get more timber from the forest.

I only hope Towong Shire Council will have someone to battle again for our mill as it is one of the main job providers in our area.

Corryong chosen to host emergency event



Corryong has won the bid to host the 2023 North East Emergency Expo, narrowly defeating Tungamah by three points. The Expo is a biennial

event that was originally created by a VICSES volunteer to show rural communities in North East Victoria what information and resources are available to them before, during and after an emergency and to help communities build resilience and understanding of what is in their own backyard.

This will be the fourth time the event has been run which is now managed by the not-forprofit charity North East Emergency Action Group INC. (NEEAG) and was created in August 2020 to maintain the running of the expo, which for the first two events was managed by the Victoria SES and the third one was partnered with Go Fish Nagambie.

The event is scheduled for 14th October 2023 and will bring something for everyone. There will be a range of emergency service organisations, support groups, service animals, interactive activities (emergency related), workshops, static displays, equipment and vehicle displays, food and

drink and much more. There is also a fundraising component

Independent gave it a shake

Independent candidate for Benambra, Jacqui Hawkins, conceded defeat in the race for Benambra, with her vote count on Sunday morning trailing the incumbent, Bill Tilley, by 671 votes.

Ms Hawkins spent election day travelling to each polling booth across the electorate, where her Team Yellow volunteers were out in force in a final push to secure Independent representation for the first time in Benambra's 145year history.

Ms Hawkins said she and her volunteer team celebrated their achievements in Wodonga on Sunday night, watching the vote count teeter on a knife's edge for much of the evening, however despite "giving the electorate a good shake," she recognised the result

didn't fall in her favour. "I congratulate Bill Tilley and his team on their campaign and on retaining the seat for Benambra," Ms Hawkins said.

"I also congratulate the other candidates this election for the work they and their volunteers have dedicated to their campaigns and this community.

"This has been an incredibly close race.

"In 2018, when I first ran, 2000 votes separated myself and the incumbent and this year, I've narrowed that to 671 votes between us

between us. "It's amazing to have increased my first preference share from 16.14 per cent in 2018 to 32.2 per cent this year."

Ms Hawkins said she was proud of the outcome and of the volunteer efforts that drove her campaign during the past four months.

"We have attracted the attention of the entire state this election and were noted as being one of the seats to watch." who put their hand up to run — it's a tough gig.

However, Mr Tilley said that based on reports he had received from his volunteers it appeared supporters of the Independent candidate, Jacqui Hawkins, "must thought they were above the rules."

"I've seen Labor has already submitted a complaint against the independent campaign and in time we'll do something similar. The rules around signage and the actions of those handing out how to vote cards were abused at any number of polling stations.

"Passion and ignorance is not an excuse. This was a tactic and I'll be asking the Victorian Election Commission to be more proactive, issue fines for breaches and in the future, cap representation at polling booths," Mr Tilley said.

War nurse commemorated

The recent spate of fine weather has allowed artist Simon White to complete a mural of trailblazing and hitherto largely forgotten WWI nurse, Ivy Bartlett, right of the main entrance to the RSL Hall in Donaldson Street, Corryong. Staff Nurse Ivy Bartlett, is one of Corryong's unsung heroines. She enlisted in the Australian Army Nursing Corps on 20 July, 1915 and was believed to be the only nurse from Corryong who had volunteered for active service.

She thus became one of more than 3,000 Australian civilian nurses who volunteered and was one of 130 Australian nurses who served in the Australian General Hospital on the Greek Island of Lemnos during the Gallipoli campaign.

Obituary:- Ruth Coulston She instilled her family with creativity and passion

Ruth was born just before Christmas 1939 into the home of Doug and Jean Embery. Born just four years after Jim and two years after Agnes, the house and children took all of Jean's energy.

Doug was away for large chunks of time during the war years running a sawmilling business. It was in these years that Jean's character was formed. The selflessness and resilience required by the times meant everyone was expected to do their bit and not make a fuss. As a child Ruth could

be stoic and stubborn meeting life head on. When trouble brewed, as it so often did, she never ran for cover. After the war, Doug

and Jean's family was completed by the arrival of Bruce, Joan and Joyce. The younger siblings

gave Ruth the opportunity to practice her caring skills. She valued the capacity to care for others with generosity to the end of her life. Even as her energy levels slipped lower, she preserved her energy to keep in contact with long term friends, feed visitors, bring in the

neighbours washing and get seedlings started in the greenhouse.

Summer was never her favourite time of the year. She hated the heat in her later years but as a young woman she loved the opportunities to get in the water. A strong and confident swimmer the family photo album shows Ruth and her siblings loaded on to one of Doug's trucks for trips to the river. When the grandchildren were tiny she was the first one in her bathers - making sure that they picked up this important survival skill.

Ruth left school at the end of Year 10 and began working at Kaighin's General Store. She enjoyed the contact with women who phoned in their orders every week and kept in contact with some of them for many vears.

Ruth married Fred Coulston in autumn 1959. Theirs was a long and fruitful marriage. They were quickly surrounded by five children - Linda, Kaye, Jim, Judith and Gordon. Ruth and Fred settled at Lucyvale where they continued the family



dairy. Ruth always loved a system and coached by her mother-in-law, Susan, she thrived at 'Rosebank'.

She managed the garden, fed calves and poddied lambs and preserved the excess produce. She sewed baby outfits from Enid Gilchrist pattern books.

Fred encouraged Ruth to be self-reliant. When she developed a powerful craving for fish while expecting Linda, Fred proposed an excursion. He collected rods and a picnic basket and took Ruth down to the creek. Dad was no great fan of fishing, so the plan was to get Ruth set up so she could catch her own! When the fishing trip was unsuccessful and Ruth was still in the grip of the craving, Fred's brother Jack – a dab hand with the fishing rod - stepped in and regularly bought Ruth fish. Not much was known

about Ruth's early education but she made

sure her family all had every opportunity to thrive at school. This included moving Judith and Gordon to the Catholic School when she felt Gordon was not being supported at the State School. It's hard to imagine now that this was controversial but even in the 1970s the move was not popular with her parents but Ruth's determination carried the day.

As the family grew, Ruth had a ready-made army of willing - and sometimes, not so willing - helpers on hand for whatever tasks needed completion. The long school holidays would often involve a day trip to Batlow to collect cherries or blackberrying at Nariel and the next day they would help preserve the results of the previous day's harvest. Ruth always had a list of jobs and home maintenance tasks ready to go when a willing

worker came by and yes, the family found the notes about what still needed to be done!

The family moved to Corryong in 1967. Fred worked as an earthmover and when time allowed, extended her Ruth creative sewing skills to commercial dressmaking. She purchased a heavy Singer sewing machine to assist with these items and it remained a prized possession. Her commercial dressmaking extended to making several wedding dresses. The photos of these were proudly kept in the family album.

Ruth loved sharing her creative skills. When the grandchildren reached secondary school, Ruth offered her sewing skills to produce costumes for the school drama production 'Bats'. There were happy days sewing outfits that included 14 lederhosen complete with braces and hats!

Ruth took dressing up seriously, planning outfits for special occasions as soon as the new event was announced. She loved strong colours and patterns and hats! It's always important to "make an effort" she would say. Ruth freely gave wardrobe advice to all her children and their partners and grandchildren. She would describe an outfit or shoes "glorious, as simply glorious."

Algae alert issued for farms

The recent flooding event combined with warmer weather conditions has produced favourable conditions for blue-green algae to thrive in farm water supplies and standing flood water.

Veterinary Senior Officer with Agriculture Victoria, Dianne Phillips, said livestock owners need to remain alert as ingestion of blue-green algae can result in the poisoning of livestock.

"As there is no specific treatment for blue-green algae poisoning, producers should check standing bodies of water and farm water supplies daily for blooms, as this remains the most effective way of preventing stock deaths," she advised.

"Blue-green algal blooms typically appear as surface scum that looks like a suspension of green paint, often with an earthy smell. However, the colour may range from pale green to dark brown."

Deaths can occur when stock drink toxins produced by the bluegreen algae, often when it is concentrated on the down-wind side of a water supply and has formed a dense, surface scum.

that don't Those die immediately, often suffer from severe liver damage. This may lead to the development of jaundice (the yellows) or photosensitisation over the next few days. Livestock that recover from these ailments often suffer from chronic ill-thrift.

If a suspicious bloom is noticed, the water supply should be isolated as quickly as possible and a safe alternate water supply provided.

"Where possible producers should identify an alternative water supply, prior to their primary source of livestock drinking water being affected by a bloom," Dr Phillips said. "There may not be time

to identify an alternative water source once the primary water supply is affected. We recommend laboratory testing of the water supply for the presence of blue-green algae and a post-mortem Animals that have or examination of dead blue-green or sick animals by a

Contaminated water should not be used to irrigate vegetables and fruit or come in contact with plants being grown for food, particularly fruit and vegetables that are mostly eaten raw such as apples, grapes, tomatoes. strawberries, cabbages and

Victorian Fisheries Authority CEO, Travis Dowling, said the Murray cod closed season during September, October, and November each year gives the species a chance to breed in peace.
