Haines welcomes regional housing support

Independent Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, has welcomed the federal opposition's

adoption of her target for 30 per cent of funding housing for critical infrastructure to go to

Dr Haines has been pushing for at least 30 percent of housing funding to be guaranteed to regional areas, through introduction of her own legislation in September 2023 and again in November 2024.

for regional, rural and whether they are paying their mortgage or rent and part of the reason for that is Housing that we don't have enough housing," Dr Haines said.

"A major barrier to opening up new land for housing in regional areas is the enabling infrastructure and amenities such as sewerage and water connections, roads and footpaths and electricity poles. It's not shiny, but it's critically important.

"I'm glad that the coalition have now picked up what I've been talking about for over two years and that's the need for 30 per cent of housing funds to be put aside for regional communities."

Dr Haines added that she would continue to push the government to commit to dedicated housing funding for regional and rural Australia ahead of the election. "I've been really loud about this issue and have worked across the parliament to advocate for a focus on regional Australia," she said. "I'm always there to work with members of Parliament to get what's best for rural and regional Australia, for what is fair and what we need."

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Drink driving danger rises

Victoria Police has issued a zero-tolerance warning as new analysis reveals December is the worst month for drink driving on our roads.

Over the past three years, a total of 2591 drink driving detections were recorded in December.

This is 20 per cent higher than November when 2154 motorists were caught over the limit in the three years analysed.

December also posted the highest number of collisions where the driver was over the blood alcohol limit, with 321 recorded for the month across the three-year period.

It is 18 per cent higher compared with November, which had 272 collisions where the driver was over the limit during the threeyear period.

Victoria Police is warning it will have an increased focus on alcohol and drug testing this month to address the concerning behaviour and Corryong police will be involved in the state-wide campaign.

Assistant Commissioner, Glenn Weir, Road Policing Command said "These figures show what police know all too well, December is a danger

"Not only do we have more alcohol detections, we have more alcoholcharged collisions than at any other time of the year.

"Our message is clear – drinking and driving don't mix.

"We'll be out conducting alcohol and drug testing anywhere, any time - so if you think you won't be caught, think

"You're not only a risk to yourself but to all road users." Corryong police will be ramping up random alcohol and drug testing over the holiday period.

Sergeant Brendan Lampkin said that all officers are now able to conduct drug testing and five drivers had been intercepted in the past two weeks.

"This number is concerning and we will be active in removing impaired drivers from the road," he warned.

Poor decisions have caused a

catasptrophe Nestled in the picturesque Tooma Valley, the Mannus Creek and its surrounding environment have long been a lifeline for the region's farms, families and wildlife.

However, a series of catastrophic decisions spanning decades have turned this once-thriving ecosystem into a disaster zone.

The Mannus Dam was licensed in the 1980s to Ellis Williams. While the licence suggested the dam would support pisciculture, this promise was never realised. Instead, Williams constructed a powergenerating plant, using the dam to sell electricity to the grid.

The dam's operation quickly became a source of tension for downstream farmers.

Williams controlled the dam's release valve with little regard for the impact, flooding the creek at unpredictable intervals. These erratic water flows destroyed fences, drowned livestock, washed away feed, obliterated bridges and made stock crossings treacherous or

impossible

Williams' After passing, Tumbarumba Council purchased the dam, envisioning it as a multipurpose resource for the community. It was meant to serve as a backup water supply for the town; a recreational site for boating, fishing, and swimming; a fire management resource: and even an industrial water source for the Hvne Timber Mill.

Yet, the council failed to address the critical needs of downstream users who relied on a steady and consistent flow of water through their farms.

The fourth disaster struck in the form of a catastrophic spillway collapse in 2010, triggered by a sudden cloudburst upstream. Within six hours, the dam emptied its contents, wreaking havoc on the valley below. Ancient river red gums were uprooted, farms were dest royed and roads and bridges were washed away, cutting off Tooma's residents for weeks.

The environmental destruction was immense, compounded by debris from dead poplars and willows abandoned on the banks.



In the aftermath, disaster funds were allocated to rebuild the dam, now rebranded as a lake. But instead of a solution, this brought new problems.

Persistent blooms of toxic blue-green algae have plagued the waterway, placing the dam and creek under frequent Red Alert. These blooms have rendered the water unsafe for recreation, fishing, firefighting and even as a backup water supply for Tumbarumba. Worse still, the health

of residents has suffered severely.

Families downstream are battling illnesses linked to algae exposure including chronic inflammatory conditions

and neurological disorders. Many have been forced to abandon their homes, leaving behind the land their families farmed for generations.

This string of disasters has devastated Tooma's community, its farms and its wildlife.

The endangered Macquarie Perch, once a resident of Mannus Creek, struggles to survive. Platypuses, fish and other aquatic life are suffocating in the toxic waters.

It's time for action. The solution is clear return Mannus Creek to its natural state.

Restoring the creek would allow wetlands to form, enabling nature to heal itself. Families could return to their

homes, farms could thrive again and wildlife could recover. This would mark the end of an era of mismanagement and the beginning of a sustainable future for Tooma.

The story of Mannus Dam is a cautionary tale about prioritising short term goals over long term environmental and social health. It's time for the authorities to acknowledge their mistakes and take bold steps to restore the balance. Only then can Tooma begin to recover from decades of harm.

To the people of Tooma, your fight for a healthy and sustainable future is one worth amplifying.

Levy claims are scaremongering

I want to set the record straight on reports regarding the CFA's funding. I know it has caused some fear and anger in our regional communities.

Reports of an almost \$70M cut from the CFA are wrong.

Every year, a certain amount of money within our emergency services' budgets is earmarked for specific projects and services - like funding for the rollout of 18,000 new Motorola radios to brigades.

Setting aside these funds isn't a cut. Every dollar of these quarantined amounts is spent on CFA, directly benefitting the CFA and their volunteers. Government depart-

ments manage many of

these projects and they pay the bill. It streamlines administration and takes the burden off emergency services so they can focus on what they do best keeping Victorians safe.

This year, more than \$337M in CFA base funding has been allocated, an increase of almost \$17 million on the comparable figure last year.

This doesn't include the money we invest on top of this on new trucks, uniforms and upgrading stations.

The Fire Services Property Levy funds almost 78 per cent of the CFA's total funding needs - not 25 per cent.

I know National Party members are out there with their negativity trying to spin a false narrative about cuts. They should support, not scare country communities and stick to

the facts.

Labor has delivered 80 new tankers since 2018, 22 are being built and 15 pumpers are on order. The Nationals didn't fund a single truck in their last few years in government and they slashed \$66M

from the CFA budget whilst in office.

It's disappointing that I must correct this unhelpful misinformation but it's a further opportunity to recognise and thank our amazing CFA brigades and all emergency services.

I want you to know our government will always give you what you need to continue keeping Victorians safe.

Summer's not a silly season

An open letter from Chris Hardman, Chief Fire Officer, Forest Fire Management Victoria:-

Last week you might have noticed a pickup in news articles and broadcasts forecasting a hot, dry summer and high potential for fire in some areas of the state. That news has come from the seasonal summer outlook distributed on 28 November by the Australasian Fire and Emergency Services Authorities Council (AFAC), the national council for fire and emergency services in Australia and New Zealand.

The Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for summer gives a picture of the likelihood of fire over the summer months, at both a state and national level. This year's outlook for Victoria predicts higher potential for fire for most of western Victoria as well as southwest Gippsland, Mornington including Peninsula, greater Melbourne and north-east Victoria.

The potential has been assessed this way because of the dry conditions in those areas, the availability of vegetation (e.g. grass, leaves, bark, shrubs and



We are prepared and ready to respond on public land this year, FFMVic carried out risk reduction works across more than 138,000 hectares and because it isn't just about this summer or this season, I'm happy to tell vou that we also carried out works on more than 90,000 hectares the year before. The impacts are cumulative.

Risk reduction works include planned burns, mowing, mulching, slashing and spraying. Collectively, we call these works 'fuel management'. They reduce the amount of vegetation available to fuel a fire, thereby reducing the likely speed or intensity of a bushfire. These qualities can help fire crews to respond and put out fires while they are still small and efore they can impact on communities, assets, infrastructure and the environment. You can find out about planned burns happening near you at plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov. au In November we saw some of the reward for those efforts, with a fire in the Great Otway National Park - the Chapple Vale-

Colac Tree Road fire showing reduced spread in the footprint of one of our planned burns back in August. Thankfully, the fire was able to be contained before hotter temperatures set in just days later. Our crews remain in the area to gov.au

manage hot spots and reinforce those control lines. Recent weeks have

also shown how we work together with and alongside our emergency sector partners. On the frontline, FFMVic has close to 1800 personnel, including full-time and seasonal firefighters, fire is lookout observers and fire support officers. In recent months, many of them have completed training and accreditation to make sure they are equipped with the skills and knowledge they need to be safe and help keep communities safe this summer They are supported by of fire hundreds of emergency and incident management staff, including 'surge staff' who have a fire and emergency role in addition to their day job, as well as firefighting equipment.

This includes tankers, earthmoving equipment and aircraft positioned across the state as well as additional aircraft that can be called upon when needed.



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Ride follows early horse route



The old Tallangatta-Corryong road was an arduous journey.

Cont. from last week

The end of the First World War and the opening of the rail link between Tallangatta and Cudgewa ended an era for those who rode through the bush with the horses over Keelangie to Tallangatta.

The route over which they rode more than 110 years later has become overgrown. Road building, fires and forestry have also changed the landscape and there is nobody left to tell us about the ride.

The expansion of Hume reservoir the in the 1950s and the eventual inundation of Old Tallangatta have wrought further changes with Tallangatta Railway Station being moved to the new township just under 10kms further towards Wodonga. Now the rail route and bridges over which the men and their mounts would have travelled on the next leg of their journey lie beneath metres of water. Drought years when the water levels recede reveal them like tough old ghosts from

another era. Some of us think of them as the memorials to our pioneering ancestors journeys further into the bush in the Upper Murray.

Experienced rider and Light Horse re-enactor, Pat Leary, along with seven other horsemen plan to ride the 700km route of the Chauvel Border Trail, beginning in Shepparton in March next year - the 80th anniversary of General Sir Harry Chauvel's death.

The ride is scheduled to finish in Tallangatta on April 16th, 2025 - the 160th anniversary of Chauvel's birth.

Rather than following stretches of the Hume freeway, the commemorative group plans to take some of the back roads, visiting some of the small towns and schools before rejoining the main trail.



The troop will include Ross Smith from Tallangatta, the president of the Sandy the War Horse committee (statue pictured).

They will blaze a new route and new experience crossing bush-covered Mount Keelangie from the Upper Murray to Tallangatta.

Ross has already done a

reconnaissance along part of the route from Bullioh to the pub at Koetong. Once the riders have ridden the whole 75kms they will be able tell us all what it must have been like for the men and their mounts who rode through the hills to catch the train to go to war.

While the ride could start at Khancoban or even from Bringenbrong, the Commemorative Ride will begin at Cudgewa.

The General Sir Harry Chauvel Foundation first linked the Upper Murray and Tallangatta in Light Horse Heritage when it produced the map of the trail.


This will set a new and special Tallangatta and Upper Murray benchmark for commemoration as the riders and the Chauvel Foundation and local historians begin to tell the stories of a special stretch of the Chauvel Border Light Horse Trail.

It is about the men who made history and the Chauvel Foundation hopes that the Commemorative Ride will ensure that it is no longer a forgotten part of our heritage.

Highlights of the market included:-

• More than 25 per cent of the cattle were sold online, demonstrating the increasing reach and demand for Upper Murray cattle.

• A large consignment of steers and heifers was secured by Tasmanian buyers for the Greenham Never Ever Program, highlighting the premium quality of the offering.

• Graham Costello of 'Wabba House' was awarded the Sheepy Jeffries Memorial Trophy for the Best Presented Pen with a standout line of 71 Angus steers, averaging 340kg. They were purchased by a Tasmanian grass finisher from Greenham heartland. Top results included:-

· Nariel Pines achieved top prices with 40 Angus steers (9 months) selling to \$4.40/kg.

 Baringa Towong offered 120 Angus weaned steers, averaging \$4.10 kg and 29 heifers, reaching a high of \$1,230 per head.






