Music festival marks a milestone

From a small gathering of like-minded people and curious locals, the Nariel Creek Folk Festival has become the oldest running event of its kind in Australia, continuing a long tradition of old time music and dance which has been a feature of the Nariel Valley for more than 100 years.

The Upper Murray community is invited to celebrate a remarkable achievement this holiday period as the festival notches up its 60th anniversary.

It began in 1962, originating from a picnic of music and dance held on the banks of the Nariel Creek which followed a night of dancing at the Nariel Hall and in Corryong, enjoyed by locals and visiting members of the Victorian Folk Music Club.

The dances and music were of historical significance to the collectors and archivists of music and dance in Australia. The picnic has now become a wonderful family festival, steeped with so many artistic and folkloric traditions.

Everyone is invited to the Nariel Recreation Reserve and the Cudgewa Hall over eight days from December 27th to January 3rd to welcome in the 2023 New Year.

The festival begins with a traditional Nariel dance on the night of Tuesday December 27th, hosted by the Cudgewa community. All proceeds go towards the maintenance of the local Cudgewa Mechanics Institute Hall. A Contra Dance, run by Ray and Jennie Simpson, is held between 5pm and 7pm on Wednesday December 28th. Contra Dancing is easy to learn and a very social dance. All steps will be expertly called by some of Australia's leading dance callers. Beginners and families are all welcome.

The condition of regional and rural roads following severe weather events will be the subject of an inquiry by the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport.

Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, who is a member of the committee, encouraged constituents in the elctorate to make submissions to the inquiry.

"The state of the roads in Indi and across regional and rural Australia following the recent floods has taken things from bad to worse," Dr Haines said.

to increase funding to local councils to respond to the problems they are facing and this inquiry goes further, taking a longterm look at how we can build better roads as the climate changes and the number of severe weather events increases."

Dr Haines said she hoped local councils and people across Indi would take this opportunity to influence policy and funding decisions on regional and rural roads.

"We can't just keep patching and filling holes, without looking at structural issues,' she said. "I want to make sure our roads are safe, and

Fire restrictions announced

The Fire Danger Period (FDP) for municipalities in CFA's North East Region including Towong Shire will begin at 1am on Monday December 19, 2022.

The Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for summer identified potential for increased grassfire conditions for the 2022/23 fire season, due to significant grass growth and delayed harvest activities.

CFA District 24 Acting Assistant Chief Fire Officer, Brett Myers, said widespread rainfall in winter and spring led to high grass fuel loads and the region can expect to see significant grassfires to start the fire season.

"The temperature and wind experienced over the past fortnight has significantly dried the abundance of grass that exists across most areas in North East Victoria." he said.

"In some areas there are wet underlying conditions which may present access issues for firefighters, so we're asking the community to remain vigilant around fire

and items that can cause

fire." While CFA firefighters are preparing for the bushfire season, they are urging the community to use common sense and take responsibility for preventing fires.

Charity walker is passing the test

Dr Prabodh Malhotra, who recently passed through the Upper Murray, is on schedule to complete his solo 1000km charity walk from the MCG to the SCG in support of the McGrath Foundation.

The 70-year-old retiree, began his trek on November 13 in support of the foundation's mission to raise money to fund McGrath Breast Care Nurses in communities right across Australia and increase health awareness.

Dr Malhotra's high country journey has taken him to Jindabyne, Cooma

and Canberra from where he will rejoin the Hume Highway. He is expected to arrive at the SCG in early January to coincide with the opening day of the 'Pink Test Match'.

He told the Courier that the toughest stint of his trek to date was the walk from Murray Gorge to Thredbo.

"My body was starting to feel it but the hardest part of the walk is behind me now," he said.

Dr Malhotra migrated to Australia from India in 1980 and said that "This country has given me so much, now I want to give something back."

He has raised close to \$40,000 for the McGrath Foundation so far.

ANNUAL REPORT 2021/22

From the Mayor

The past year was once again a year of challenges, with the disruption of COVID-19 and ongoing recovery work following the Black Summer bushfires. I am very proud of the way our small team of Councillors and staff have pulled together and delivered some great outcomes.

As a small council, securing financial support is essential for us to deliver projects and to remain financially sustainable. In 2021/22 we secured \$13 million for projects including:

- The Lake Hume Masterplan;
- Corryong Circuit Trail Stage One;
- Great River Road Stage Two; and
- Walking track upgrades in Eskdale and Bellbridge.

It was exciting to see the completion of some longterm projects including

- Stages 1 and 2 of the Georges Creek Road upgrade - resulting in improved connectivity between the Talgarno and Bellbridge areas through to the Murray Valley Highway and Tallangatta;

- Renewal of the Cudgewa and Bullioh Netball courts; and

Our 2021/22 Budget included a rate increase of 1.5%. This rate increase helped us to keep delivering services and infrastructure for our communities. Services like our parks and gardens maintenance, garbage collection, road grading and maintenance, and library services.

"The draft was predominantly Angus calves from 7-10 months and heavy 14-18 monthold steers," said principal, Justin Costello.

"While the top weight was 590 kilograms liveweight, most steers were between 290kgs and 385kgs.

"Most of the competition came from Wodonga district and three volume buyers purchased steers and heifers to go north of the Riverina and into the Cooma district.

"The sale was firm on

said. Compared to 2022, the

average price of \$1740 was \$500 cheaper. Steers sold to a top of \$2240, with most pens

selling between \$1520 and \$1950. The consistent quality

meant most steers equalled between 520c and 594c/ kg liveweight. Only a few pens of young steers sold over 600c /kg liveweight. "Most producers were

generally happy with their prices considering the market had softened due to supply constraints at the kill side of the ledger," Mr Costello added.

Some of the results included:-

H C Auchinleck, Towong sold quality Merridale blood Angus steers, 291-356kgs, to a top of \$1925. Wilson, Keith

Tintaldra, sold 99 Angus steers, 12-18 months between \$1790 and \$2420. These weighed from 335-573kgs lwt.

G & B Costello, Tintaldra, sold 90 Angus steers, RAFF & Merridale blood, from \$1550-\$2040 270-398 kgs lwt.

AJ & MJA Jarvis, Cudgewa sold 45 Angus cross steers to a top of \$1980 which were predominantly Angus calves 7-10 months and heavy 14-18 month-old steers.

Nurse's story revives memories

Honor I enjoyed Auchinleck's recent two-part article in the Corryong Courier on nurse Ivy Bartlett and it prompted memories of my maternal grandmother, Constance Ivy Jarvis.

She was a local girl, the daughter of Norman Richard Jarvis and Isabelle Newell Goldspink who were married in 1892.

She obtained her first nursing certificate from Williamstown Hospital. Being about twelve years younger than Ivy Bartlett, she may have been spared the worst part of the war.

I have a letter from the Repatriation and Demobilisation Depart-

ment of the A.I.F. in Belgrave Square, London SW1, dated May 5th 1920, signed by the Matron in Chief, AANS, AIF giving my grandmother her details to be at Tilbury

Dock on May 17th for her passage back to Australia. I haven't found any information on her from the AIF service records so far.

I do remember her home two bringing German helmets which she said she picked up on a battlefield. These were used by three generations of the family until very recently, as plant pots!

On her return, Constance obtained further nursing certificates from other Melbourne hospitals and eventually she started

her own nursing home in Oakleigh. I believe quite a few

people from the Upper Murray came down to her for nursing care, often for very little cost. Her son (my uncle

Bruce Hamilton) inherited a farm at Wabba from the White family as a result of her kindness. Bruce ran the farm for a few years and played football for Cudgewa until he developed polio in the late 1940s and the place was

sold. Constance enjoyed carting her grandchildren all over the Upper Murray to visit cemeteries, meet relatives and develop a great affection for the area. Bill Jeans. Brighton.

Great fires spark mystery novel

Hot on the heels of Janice Newnham's successful book, *From The Inside*, comes her second offering *White Lies* - *Where There is Smoke*.

Both books are set in Walwa in the period after a devastating bushfire.

From The Inside described Janice's family's experiences during the first nine weeks after the 2019/2020 Black Summer bushfires had ravaged their farm. *White Lies* is a true crime / mystery set in Walwa just after the trauma and devastation of the Black Friday Fires of 1939.

The inspiration for this book was the "ghost story" she was told by the late Verd Brindley soon after she arrived in Walwa in the late 1990s:

"I arrived in the Upper Murray in November 1995 – just me in my ute, with a few belongings. I was accompanied by my Kelpie 'Spider' and my horse, 'Sizzle'.

"I was wrenched out of familiar surroundings in a semi-rural area of a major Australian city and relocated hundreds of miles away to an old farmhouse in the small township of Walwa," she recalled.

"I was isolated from a familiar close network of friends and busy social life and found myself in a small, tight knit, remote rural community."

Janice moved into Thelma Hunt's house, an old farmhouse on Shelley Road, which was partially furnished and filled with mementos and echoes of past residents.

"Too many echoes!" she says.

"At times, my kelpie refused to enter the room on the southeast corner of the house and he was often startled and stared intently at nothing in particular. He stuck with me like a shadow!

"I had the feeling that objects in the house seemed to move on their own accord when I wasn't looking. I became a little spooked. Yes, I admit, I have a fertile imagination!"

One of Janice's new neighbours, Verd Brindley, a charming old fellow, born and bred in the magnificent house on 'Avondale', took her under his wing. One day, the poltergeist.

Verd fuelled a desire in Janice to find out more about Dickie White, the shadowy protagonist of his ghost story and over the subsequent years, she spoke to a plethora of actual and second-hand witnesses to the Walwa Tragedy. She trawled the Trove website (hosted by the National Library of Australia) and the archives of the Public Records Office of Victoria and accumulated a mass of research material.

In addition, she pored over the grainy black and white images and deciphered the smudgy old newspaper articles and archaic documents. She tried to read between the lines and fathom the depth of the stories and details of the characters.

"Yet, I procrastinated and the book remained firmly lodged in my brain for years," she added.

In December 2019, just short of the 80th anniversary of the final event of the Dickie White Saga, the Black Summer Bushfires stormed through the Upper Murray and the house, centre stage to the saga, was destroyed. It was a profound echo of the past as in January

1939, the Black Friday Bushfires - fires of a similar magnitude and with similar disruptive impacts on individuals, property, the environment and community bonds - ripped through Walwa and the rest of the Upper Murray.

1939, In the repercussions of the disaster led to the sudden and tragic demise of Elizabeth White first. (nee Brennan) and subsequently, her husband, a man known to the Walwa community as Raymond/ Richard/Dickie White. He was a man with a mysterious past and who

was the focus of smalltown rumour and gossip.

The similarity of events and fractured community bonds in the aftermath of a massive bushfire disaster in 1939 and then again in 2019/20, caused Janice to look on the mystery of Dickie White with fresh eyes. She took it as a sign to stop procrastinating and turn the history and folklore into a novel.

"White Lies is my interpretation of the Dickie White Saga or Walwa Tragedy, as the newspaper journalists of 1939 dubbed the sequence of events,' she explained. *"This novel is based on*

facts but re-imagined with dialogue and descriptions which may often flagrantly deviate from reality and venture into creativity in the interests of flow and colour."

It is a complex story of perhaps a post-traumaticstress-disorder-tortured WWI veteran who attempted to run from a difficult past and reinvent himself in a rural setting but who was ultimately hounded to death by misinterpretations of his actions and circumstances and pursued by enthusiastic investigators who amassed a lot of 'evidence', although much of the evidence was unsubstantiated. Overall, he was the victim of vicious small-town gossip.

Alternatively, it might be the story of a cunning, scheming individual who manipulated situations to his own advantage but who came unstuck when his web of lies was unpicked through the persistent, dedicated investigations of police, utilising innovative forensic techniques and insightful deductions.

Of course, it might also be somewhere between... it is up to the reader to decide. The book includes historical photographs and maps to illustrate the tale and to provide the reader with the basis of a DIY ghost tour of Walwa.

Len Johnson, author of Love Letters From The War and many other historical manuscripts mentored Janice during her writing journey and has provided her with a resounding endorsement of her storytelling ability and commitment to detail.

The author is also the marketing manager, distribution agent and retailer, so enquiries to purchase a copy of the book are most welcome! – It's a bargain at \$25 for
