Whitehead acknowledged the advocacy work of council to secure significant state and federal funding. "As a small rural council, we're very reliant on attracting government funding to provide the infrastructure and services our community deserves," he said. "We worked hard to secure an incredible \$13 million from the state government to support the delivery of our 2021/22 capital works program.

Full recovery will take more time

In response to the 2019devastating 20 Eastern Victorian bushfires. a plan to advocate for and support regional recovery and build resilience was recently launched at the community hub in Corryong.

The Upper Murray Community Recovery Plan was developed by the Upper Murray Community Recovery Committee (UMCRC) and identifies priority areas that address community challenges impacting recovery. Chair, UMCRC

Dominic Sandilands, said in developing the plan the committee identified five key priority areas that highlight the unique challenges faced by communities in the Upper Murray and actions to address these challenges. "The recovery plan - with its focus on

health and wellbeing, telecommunications, energy resilience and reliability, adventure tourism and agricultural diversification - provides the region with direction and a way forward for the region's recovery," Mr Sandilands said.

"Bushfires and other natural disasters are not new to this region.

We have experienced disasters and we have recovered. We have been resilient. We understand good that recovery brings opportunities to enhance local capacity and encourage 'people to support people' and 'communities to support communities'.

"The recovery process will take years and our friends, families, community groups, townships and businesses have been impacted differently and will be on their own journeys of recovery," Mr Sandilands said.

"For some, recovery will take longer and support services and recovery activities must be flexible enough to allow people to reach various stages of their recovery over extended timelines."

The Upper Murray Place Based Power Plan: Energy Resilience and Reliability Project was awarded \$2.17 million through the Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) Local Economic Recovery fund and has been the first initiative from the plan to be actioned.

New fire resilient energy infrastructure solar panels including and batteries are being

installed to ensure people will have access to reliable power, together with backup power in all conditions.

BRV Acting Chief Executive Officer, Carmel Flynn, said initiatives like the micro-grid project are helping build resilient communities to ensure a faster return to normal life after a bushfire

"It's wonderful to see the Upper Murray

Community Recovery Committee bringing communities together to advocate for and support regional recovery and build resilience," she said. "The

Victorian government has and will continue to listen and learn from community members about what they experienced during the fires, about what they need right now and what their

priorities are for the future. "That's what а community-led recovery is all about."

The Upper Murray Recovery Community Committee was established in February 2020 following the 2019-20 bushfires. It's prime purpose is to support community recovery across the entire Upper Murray region.



"While all of these are wonderful achievements, it's important that we also acknowledge the 'business as usual' activities and services that we deliver day in, day out which are significant but often overlooked because it is 'just what a council does'," Cr Whitehead said.

"These include things like parks and gardens maintenance, garbage collection, road grading and maintenance, library services, swimming pool operations, kindergartens, childcare and maternal and child health services, not to mention legislative services such as dog registrations, planning, building and environmental health services.

"These are all backed up by customer service, finance, technology, human resources, occupational health and safety and other administrative staff," Cr Whitehead added.

Snowy makes further inroads

Snowy Hydro has achieved another exciting milestone with the commissioning of the second tunnel boring machine (TBM) for Snowy 2.0, Australia's largest renewable energy project.

The 11-metre diameter TBM Kirsten, one of the most innovative and technologically-advanced machines in the world, is one of three TBMs that will excavate more than 27kms of tunnels for the massive pumped-hydro expansion of the iconic Snowy Scheme.

Snowy 2.0, which is onbudget and due to produce first power in 2025, is fundamental to Australia's transition to a renewable energy future. Its 2,000 megawatts of pumping and generating capacity and 175 hours of storage enough to power 500,000 homes simultaneously will underpin thousands of megawatts of intermittent renewables.

Snowy Hydro CEO, Paul Broad, said Snowy 2.0 was creating 4,000 jobs and significant training and apprenticeship opportunities for workers, while providing a major economic boost for the Snowy Mountains region and beyond.

"Our first TBM, the Lady Eileen Hudson, is already a kilometre into the mountain excavating the main access tunnel and now we have TBM Kirsten continuing the tunnelling and construction progress for this amazing project," Mr Broad said.

"Our growing workforce of almost 1,400 includes hundreds of people from the local region and we have invested more than \$70 million with local businesses so far.

"Upskilling workers and investing in the future of our youth will be important legacies of this project so it is very pleasing to see Snowy 2.0 apprentices around site learning their trades and local people having the chance to work on the TBMs." Named after NSW

astrophysicist and popular science communicator, Kirsten Banks, the second TBM is set to excavate the 2.9kms emergency, cable and ventilation tunnel (ECVT), which provides alternate access

to the underground power station. The 205-metre-long

TBM will then bore the 1.4kms inclined pressure shaft (IPS) and a 2.4kms section of the headrace tunnel.

"TBM Kirsten is setting a global standard in tunnel boring technology, just as the original Snowy Scheme developed rock bolting techniques that are still used throughout the

wer world today," Mr Broad said.

"It has been especially designed to excavate the IPS on a very steep gradient (to +47% or a 25-degree angle) so all equipment within the TBM can switch to work on the incline and the stairways and walkways pivot to remain horizontal."

TBM Kirsten was named earlier this year by local student Kobe Burnes as part of the Snowy 2.0 Tunnel Boring Machine Naming Competition, which highlighted leading Australian women in STEM.





Local garage leads the charge

The Corryong Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) celebrated the installation of the first public electric vehicle charger in the Upper Murray this week at the Upper Murray Community Garage, the CNC's social enterprise in Walwa.

The opening was attended by CNC staff and committee, community members and Towong Shire Mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead. Two electric vehicles

were brought to Walwa for a demonstration of the new facility - Tony Mimmo from Wodonga Car World came up with an MG ZST and Ken Dale from the Tumbarumba Chamber of Commerce brought a Kia Niro. They both provided a wealth of information on the vehicles, the charging process and what it is like to own an electric vehicle in the country.

Ken is obviously a confirmed electric vehicle (EV) supporter. as the Kia is his second electric vehicle which he says saves him \$1,500 every 10,000km in fuel and service costs.

The charger installed at Walwa is a level 2, 3 phase 22kw EVSE dual Ocular tower which, depending on the capacity of the vehicle, will charge at a rate of approximately one

hour per 100km of range. As expected with the first real live test, there were a few technical hiccups with the first charge of two vehicles at once but it all got sorted out and both vehicles left with plenty of charge to get home.

well "As as opportunities to demonstrate the benefits of EVs to the Upper Murray community, having the charger installed in Walwa allows electric vehicles to travel for the first time directly between Albury/ Wodonga and Thredbo. In particular it allows them to travel along the Great River Road, bringing more visitors to the Upper Murray to access and appreciate the natural beauty of the river and our region.

More EV chargers are planned for installation as part of the bushfire recovery process of rebuilding and improving facilities in several local townships, which will make the Upper Murray experience accessible

for the growing number of EV owners across the country." Communities grant. Sara thanked for being true adv

The charger is also a peripheral component of the Upper Murray Power Plan. The Walwa garage is placed to play a role in providing sustainable power in the district in the future as this very large, important project develops.

Ian Cesa, who is leading the power project on behalf of Upper Murray Inc (UMI) and Heath Shakespeare from Indigo Power were on hand at the opening to discuss local power resilience and reliability.

The EV charger project was funded by The Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewa (FRRR) Strengthening Regional Communities grant. Sara thanked FRRR for being true advocates for regional and rural innovation and growth and great supporters of the CNC for a number of years.

An electric vehicle charge facility is now operating in Walwa

She also thanked Matt Charles Jones from TRY who provided so much of the information for the project planning and application and the connections to the people needed to complete the project and to the garage staff for doing the work to get it done, both physically and the research, follow up and chasing the details.

The charger is located in Walwa's main street and is available for use 24 hrs a day seven days a week at a cost of 32c/kw through the Exploren app.

Artist works magic on walls

Never in Corryong has commemorative painting played such a role in transforming a wall and a fence, as it is about to do in the new carpark at the RSL Hall.

A mural is being painted by artist Simon White on the wall of Ken Bailey Mechanical Repairs and and along a recently installed fence overlooking the RSL and Memorial Halls.

Ken has generously made the wall available to create a reflective space with the mural which has the theme of Walers and 'Banjo' Paterson and the Light Horse'.

It tells the story of the bush horses or brumbies and the stockmen who mustered and brought the horses down from the high country and the bushcovered hills surrounding the Upper Murray before the First World War.

The mural's narrative is about the stockmen who became Light Horsemen and the bush horses that became the Remounts and Walers. The scenes resemble the narrative in Banjo Paterson's poem 'The Man from Snowy River' and Simon depicts some of the words from the following verse as if they are written in the sand in Egypt and on the Sinai Peninsula:-

He was right among the horses as they climbed the further hill,

And the watchers on the mountain standing mute,

Saw him ply the stockwhip fiercely, he was right among them still,

As he raced across the clearing in pursuit.

Then they lost him for a moment, where two mountain gullies met, In the ranges but a

final glimpse reveals, On a dim and distant

hillside the wild horses racing yet, With the man from

Snowy River at their heels. When project patron, Honor Auchinleck, asked Simon for his permission to use his concept drawing for publicity, he said "Go for it!"

In Simon's concept drawings the rectangles represent windows on the building's wall.

"Ken Bailey needs his sources of natural light in his workshop so three windows are being left untouched," Honor said.

"Now that the mural's narrative is to be extended along the fence behind Ken Bailey's workshop, other scenes from the Palestine campaign are being depicted, incorporating tanks being used for the first time in the Palestine campaign at Gaza. "While the Palestine

while the Patestine campaign saw the Light Horse's role at its zenith, it was the tanks and the fledgling Army Air Corps' planes that symbolised the increasing mechanisation of warfare," Honor explained.

"Paterson's publisher produced compact anthologies of his and C J Denis's poetry, designed to fit in the tunic pockets of the Anzacs. Many of these booklets went with their owners to the Western Front and to Palestine and are likely to have been read and recited by Light Horsemen and thus the artist's suggestion that the words were written in the sand. Mountain men loved a hard ride and it wouldn't really have mattered whether it was 'the colt from Old Regret had got away' or the need to muster the 'Walers' for the buyers for the British Army in India and for the Australian Imperial Army (AIF) in preparation for

"The scenes would have been very similar to scenes Paterson may well have witnessed during some of these brumby musters in the late 1880s and 1890s when he was staying at Bringenbrong Station, just over the

service abroad.

Murray River in New South Wales. These musters may have formed part of his inspiration in his writing of his poem 'The Man from Snowy River' more than 20 years before the First World War broke out.

"Being an excellent rider and experienced horseman, Paterson would have taken a keen interest and perhaps even taken part in some of the Waler musters - being part of the energy, hearing the hooves and the cursing and seeing the manes and tails flying along with family members and the stockmen. The Upper

Murray was renowned for its horses combining strength and speed usually found in thoroughbreds," Honor said. "These qualities were

prized in stock horses, Remounts and Walers and racehorses alike. As the journalist 'Milroy' noted in the Sydney Mail (1908) 'Cattle experience makes them quiet, handy and hardy.'

"With the coming of the First World War it is likely that some Light Horsemen might have been among those selecting the horses or even taking part in the musters. horseman Talented and tracker, Skerry, the aboriginal stockman from Bringenbrong is likely to have been among the stockmen in the muster. Skerry was said to have been one of the best riders among them and never known to miss a challenge. "The horses were

gathered and then driven in a mob with three or four horses that had already been broken taking the lead to the railhead at Tallangatta (Old Tallangatta). They were then taken by train to Maribyrnong where the majority were broken in before shipping, often to the 2nd Remount Unit at Moascar in Egypt in readiness for use in the Palestine Campaign.

"Banjo Paterson was commissioned into the 2nd Remount Unit (Queensland and New South Wales) on 18 October 1915. The Remount Units were formed in September 1915 to care for and train the horses while the 1st Light Horse Brigade was serving on Gallipoli.

"Major Andrew Barton Paterson commanded the 2nd Remount Unit at Moascar. He may well have had bush horses brought down into the Upper Murray in his unit.

"In the local community there is a feeling that we need to pass the torch to the forthcoming generations in our commemorative artwork and our stories," Honor said.

"Many of these stories encapsulate events, experiences and the qualities that make the Upper Murray different and give it its identity.

"Banjo Paterson and the Light Horse are at the centre of Upper Murray and High Country heritage.

"It is hoped that in future the mural will be incorporated in an Upper Murray and High County Banjo Paterson Trail and putting Corryong on the developing Light Horse memorial trail. Simon is hoping the weather will be kind between now and Christmas in order for him to complete the art installation.

Funding for the mural project was provided through a Department of Veterans Affairs 'Saluting their Service' grant to acknowledge the contribution of citizens and animals during all conflicts. Appropriately, the mural is situated within the RSL carpark precinct.

The new carpark has been funded through a Bushfire Recovery Victoria community facilities grant




