



The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) says an additional \$75M in state government drought support funding is a step in the right direction as parts of the state continue to face record dry conditions.

VFF president, Brett Hosking, said the continued support is sorely needed and testament to the sustained advocacy from VFF, farmers and the wider regional community.

"You can't overstate devastating this drought has been to our regional communities and the only certainty we know is the recovery will take years," Mr Hosking

"Genuine support is what's needed and this announcement is a step in the right direction."

Highlights of additional drought support include:-

- \$35.8m for 12 South West Victoria councils to administer targeted drought relief;
- \$15m investment for the East Grampians Rural

• \$2m for the Country Women's Association to roll out of food and grocery support of up to \$1000 per household;

• \$6.3m to cover the cost of farmer exemptions on government fees and charges, such as livestock transaction fees;

• \$5.5m for standpipes, emergency and private

• \$3.5m towards a SouthWest water strategy; • \$1m for Catchment

Management Authority employment programs; • \$5.9m to continue the

Look over the Farm Gate program and continue funding of Agriculture Victoria's farm technical decision making program. Mr Hosking added it

is the VFF's expectation that the entirety funding allocations to local councils is fully and promptly passed onto drought-hit communities without delay.

"Our communities are hurting right now and it's my expectation that this money goes directly to drought-hit farmers straight away and paid in full. Immediate rate relief is a good example of how that can be done and is something we've been calling for," he said.

"We're in this for the long haul and while we thank the Victorian government for their support, by no means are we out of the woods just

"We have employed a Drought Support Officer to be on the ground speak to speak with farmers and rural communities and we will continue to monitor conditions and ensure government is informed to provide further support to farmers as the season continues.

Water bills set for minor rise

North East Water customers will see a small increase in water and sewerage charges from this month.

Tariffs will increase by 0.45% plus inflation, with the average residential customer bill rising by approximately \$33 per year or 63 cents per week.

General Manager Corporate Strategy and Performance, Nicholas Moore, said despite the adjustment, which is inline with the approved 2018-26 price path set by the Essential Services Commission (ESC), bills remain well below the Victorian regional water corporation average.

North East Water also has the second lowest average bills nationally for water corporations categorised as 'large' and in 2023-24 its bills were as much as \$500 lower than the national average water

"North East Water's average residential

customer using kilolitres of water per vear will now pay around annually," \$1.114 Moore said.

"The tariffs continue to support the delivery of essential water and sewerage services to more than 120,000 people across 39 towns in our service region.

'The increased revenue will help fund critical infrastructure projects across the north-east region aimed at ensuring water security, service reliability. and environmental sustainability in a growing region."

Mr Moore added "At the end of our current price period in June 2026, more than \$300 million will have been invested in new and upgraded water and wastewater infrastructure, which is more than double the original estimate of \$141 million.

"In 2025-26 alone, customer bills will help fund more than \$90 million

vital infrastructure upgrades.

Mr Moore acknowledged that some customers may support with their bills.

'We understand that cost-of-living pressures are rea," he said.





Funding received for two local projects





The Victorian government is creating more local jobs and economic opportunities across North East Victoria and Gippsland by investing more than \$2 million towards several projects as part of Round 2 of the Community Development Fund (CDF) which is designed to create jobs and help former forestry communities thrive long term.

Upper Murray Inc (UMI) will receive a \$500,000 grant towards its Local Development Strategy (LDS), targeting high-impact opportunities to attract investment to the region and deliver a leadership development

program for locals.

UMI will receive a further \$250,000 grant for an agricultural pilot project to collect and share data and knowledge that will help farmers build resilient farming systems and retain and create employment.

Minister for Agriculture, Ros Spence, said "We're helping more businesses and workers transition to new and existing industries like agriculture and tourism, providing employment and boosting the local economy."

The \$250,000 grant to UMI will be used to develop the Upper Murray Producers Plus (UMP+) project - an initiative focused on local onfarm experimentation and shared learning within the Upper Murray region. It aims to enhance producer productivity, prosperity and regional competitiveness by

leveraging local insights, data, and partnerships.

"The UMP+ project has developed from Upper Murray farmers and producers, community and stakeholder insights and input through the Ag Innovation Working Group (IWG) activities," said UMI chair, Jo Mackinnon.


"The project is based on producer involvement and partnership opportunities to benefit Upper Murray producer productivity, prosperity and regional competitiveness."

Other projects funded under round two of the CDF are:-

- Murrindindi Shire Council Farm Forestry project - \$300,000.
- Nowa Nowa Community Development Group Local Development Strategy - \$573,600
- The Future of Heyfield project Adventure Hub pilot - \$251,406
- Yarram and District Progress Association Koala Conservation Centre and Hospital Feasibility Study - \$155,171
- The Swifts Creek Future project Structure Plan - \$100,000.

Applications are now open for Round 3 of the program which will make a further \$5 million in funding available to eligible organisations in and around the townships of Corryong, Noojee, Alexandra, Taggerty, Buxton, Marysville, Yarra Ranges, Heyfield, Yarram, Nowa Nowa, Swifts Creek, Orbost, Koondrook and Benalla.

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Recruits boost capacity Rare anniversary reached



Firefighter roles provide rewarding career opportunities.

Applications now open for seasonal firefighter roles across Victoria.

Victoria Management (FFMVic) is employing 500 seasonal firefighters prior to the summer bushfire season.

FFMVic Chief Fire Officer, Chris Hardman, said seasonal recruits boost Victoria's firefighting capacity in the lead-up to summer and during the peak fire season.

"New recruits will train and work alongside our permanent firefighting staff, responding to bushfires rapidly to keep communities safe this summer," Mr Hardman

"They will be part of a team of close to 1800 frontline personnel and 1200 accredited incident management staff this bushfire season."

Last year Forest Fire Management Victoria firefighters responded to more than 1265 bushfires across the state and delivered priority planned burns which will help

reduce the impact of bushfires this summer.

"Emergency response deployments can occur anywhere across the state, providing opportunities to travel and work in different locations," Mr Hardman said.

"In previous seasons, some recruits have also been deployed to support firefighting efforts across Australia and internationally."

Hume Region Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Aaron Kennedy, said seasonal firefighter roles provide rewarding career opportunities for those with a passion for the outdoors, learning new skills and making a difference.

"In addition responding to bushfires and helping to deliver planned burns, new recruits will also undertake pest and weed control works and maintain recreational reserves, strategic fire breaks and forest roads," Mr Kennedy said.

"They can also be called on to support other emergencies such as biosecurity incidents.

Price changes impact on care capability

Independent Federal Member for Indi, Dr Helen Haines, is calling on the Australian government to pause NDIS pricing changes and undertake regional consultation, following a recent meeting with allied health providers.

Haines with a host of NDIS providers who expressed serious concerns about controversial changes to NDIS pricing, which came into effect on 1 July, 2025.

The changes, which include a freeze reduction in price caps and

travel costs, could make it unviable for providers to continue delivering services in areas which Dr Haines says are already stretched.

Dr Haines said she would push for changes when Federal Parliament resumes on 22 July.



Building Snowy 2.0 takes a lot of concrete. It is used for the intakes, tunnels and of course, the massive underground power station itself.

Like a classic Aussie damper, it only takes three ingredients to make concrete: cement, water and aggregate. Providing structure and strength to concrete, aggregate is a complicated way to say 'filler', but it's pretty important.

Snowy 2.0 deserves nothing but the best aggregate for its concrete, which is why we're sourcing it locally from the Mount Mary Quarry, owned by Schmidt Quarries, near Nimmitabel. Considering the sheer volume required, Snowy 2.0 has concrete plants across the region to combine the three ingredients, including the locally produced aggregate.

Snowy 2.0's Elisha Sahota-Bhuller said: "Having batch plants so close to where the concrete is used means it doesn't have to be transported far, and won't set too soon.

"Once it's ready to be delivered to site, it could form one of the 130,000 concrete segments needed to line the tunnels, foundations for buildings, or the walls and roof of the intakes."

STEM FUNDING FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

Snowy is helping to boost the STEM superpowers of thousands of students in the Snowy Valleys, Snowy Mountains, and Towong communities through our Local School STEM Fund.

The program, which is now in its third year, will provide more than \$211,000 to 4,270 students in 28 schools across the regions, with most going to public primary and secondary schools.

SNOWY HELPS PERCH PERFECTION

It's not every day you release 300 fish on a mission to diversify their gene pool, but that's exactly what NSW Fisheries did in April, thanks to funding from Snowy Hydro as part of Snowy 2.0's environmental initiatives.

The endangered Macquarie Perch were released at various locations along the Murrumbidgee River where the genetic diversity of the species will benefit from a boost. The fish were transferred from Cataract Dam, just south of Sydney. This population of fish are descendants from the Murrumbidgee River back in 1915, so it was a bit of a homecoming.

It was a team effort from a few aquatic champions, including the Monaro Acclimatisation Society as well as local landholders.

The Macquarie Perch is native to the southern reaches of the Murray-Darling Basin and several rivers along the eastern seaboard.

Snowy Hydro Environmental Scientist Lizzie Pope said this was an initiative delivered as part of Snowy 2.0's environmental approvals.

"Developing Snowy 2.0 has created the opportunity for us to fund a range of initiatives for Macquarie Perch and we're proud to be involved in improving the resilience of this iconic species in the Murrumbidgee River."


