Council responds to pay dispute

Towong Shire Council has expressed disappointment that some of its outdoor staff have chosen to engage in industrial action regarding the current Enterprise (EA) Agreement negotiations.

In response to last week's industrial action. council said in a statement that it had made a twostage pay offer to staff which would see them on average get a 4.23 per cent increase on current hourly rates and applicable allowances. It also said:-Shire and from 1 February "The minimum pay increases for the past two years for staff have been 2.0 per cent. 4.0 per cent, in addition to the compulsory 0.5 per cent annual increases to the Superannuation Guarantee Contributions paid by council. Council's current pay offer, as it relates to the outdoor staff, will mean that the hourly rate for outdoor staff at 1 Feb will be on average 4.23 per cent higher than it is now inclusive of allowances. In making this

pay offer, council has considered the rates of pay at neighbouring larger councils, with the intention of increasing wages to bring them as close as possible to these for all staff, while staying within the limits of our tight financial position.

The pay increase will be implemented in two stages for affordability reasons - as at 1 August 2025 the hourly rates of pay across the whole organisation will be increased to at least those currently in place at Indigo

councils and applying these consistently across all areas of council's operations will mean that the percentage increase for early years staff will be higher because of the much lower amounts they have been paid previously.

It is our understanding that the union members do not agree with other staff - who are at the same levels in other work areas (e.g., childcare and office staff) - being paid a higher percentage increase.

It is important to note that the increase for

per cent increase to wages and salaries is equivalent to a 1.0 per cent increase to rates, with the cap on rate increases for 2025 set at 3.0 per cent.

In 2025, there will be the added burden of the Emergency Services Volunteers Fund Levy (ESVF) and council is very concerned about the impact on our ratepayers.

The new Enterprise Agreement will also include a new allowance for outdoor staff who are on standby outside of normal working hours.

Council's offer for future annual pay increases is the higher of the rate cap or 2.5 per cent.

Test results show improvement New hospital

Victorian students are leading the nation after achieving their strongest NAPLAN results ever, according to Deputy Premier and Minister for Education, Ben Carroll.

He has announced that Victorian students are top of the class, ranking first or second in 18 of 20 measures and significantly improving on the 2024 results

"Victorian students are smashing records with an average of 70 per cent falling in the 'strong' or 'exceeding' bands while all age groups ranked first or second in all 10 domains," he said. performing "High

"Thanks to our hardworking teachers and education support staff, the 2025 results also show that fewer students are needing additional support with less students in the bottom band than in 2024 on 16 of 20 measures.

Decoy brought chase to an end

Police involved in a manhunt that came to a conclusion with the arrest of a fugitive at Nariel in 1984 were honoured at a formal ceremony in Albury last week.

The saga began after a couple who were held captive for five hours by a gunman at a remote farmhouse near Woomargama freed themselves from their bonds and ran six kilometres in bare feet to a neighbour's house for help.

Their captor, Andrew Joseph Medlock (25) fled the area in a stolen Toyota Landcruiser with a cache of six firearms, activating a full scale manhunt.

Three days later police were alerted by a Corryong Lands Department dog trapper, Wayne Tindle, about the erratic behaviour and appearance of a man he had encountered who had run out of petrol on a mountain track.

Mr Tindle, who had a gun aimed at him by the outlaw, left him in the bush, promising he would return with fuel. Instead, he phoned the police with his suspicions and a 17-strong contingent of police from Albury, Wodonga, Corryong, Khancoban and Tumbarumba were shown to the scene by Mr Tindle.

Wodonga detective, Pat Brear, then acted as decoy by exchanging clothes with Mr Tindle and approaching the vehicle, carrying fuel cans to distract the gunman.

Meanwhile, three specially trained Special Weapons and Special Operations Squad

members from Albury had come up from the rear to surprise the heavily armed fugitive.

The man quickly surrendered when the trio pointed their guns at his head, telling him "Move and you're dead!" Mr Brear and the three

Albury officers - Peter Beacroft, Bert Bennett and Dennis Monk - were recognised for their heroism at a ceremony in Albury last Thursday.

The Nariel Valley was once again in the news in June of 1984, after the disappearance and subsequent murders of Roy and Sonya Naylor . The case still remains

largely unresolved with few leads and limited prospects for charging anyone with the crimes, despite some investigative efforts.





Trail receives international recognition

The Sculpture by the Sea project, incorporating the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail, was the recent recipient of the prestigious Gratias Agit award in Prague.

Founding CEO and artistic director, David Handley, travelled to Prague as a guest of the Czech government to receive the award on behalf of Sculpture by the Sea.

The Gratias Agit award is presented by the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs in recognition of work "for the benefit of the whole society, for the promotion of friendship among nations and for spreading the good word about the Czech Republic abroad."

The award was presented to the notfor-profit organisation Sculpture by the Sea for its work through the exhibitions in Sydney and Perth and the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail.

In 2022, the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail was launched and has since grown to 64 sculptures by artists from 17 countries around the world, three of which are by Czech artists.

Milan Kuzica's sculpture 'Green Life' is in Batlow and Václav Fiala's 'Universum' and 'Phantoms of Corporality - Urban Islands' by Vojtěch Míča are located at Pilot Hill. Each of these artworks has received funding from the Czech Consulate in Sydney in a gesture of international friendship to the people of the Snowy Valleys in response to the Black Summer fires.

"Having the Snowy Valleys enhanced by the sculpture trail with artworks from around the world has led to a whole new group of people discovering the delights of our area," said Snowy Valleys mayor, Cr Julia Ham.

"The recognition of the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs with the prestigious Gratias Agit Award highlights what has been achieved by the vision of bringing Czech and other international artists to the region. This is something we can all be proud of." Prague is a city close

to Handley's heart after he first visited Prague in early 1990 shortly after the revolution, before moving to the city in 1993 where he lived for two years.

During this time, w Handley curated and s produced the art exhibition 'The World in Praha' in s Obecní Dům, reflecting a Prague's place in the M centre of Europe heading

itself after the twentieth century. He set up a film sales agency selling the early Peter Weir, Bruce Beresford and Fred Schepisi movies, such as 'Picnic at Hanging Rock'; set up a wine sales agency arranging the first sale of Australian wine into the Czech Republic on behalf of Penfolds and others; and worked as a consultant to a Czech law firm.

Most importantly, while living in Prague in 1994, Handley visited a sculpture exhibition in the ruins of the castle of Klenova of artists who had not been allowed to exhibit during the communist years.

It was this exhibition that inspired Handley to choose sculpture as the art form for the free to the public cultural event he had thought about producing in Sydney, which would become Sculpture by the Sea, Bondi.

Handley received the award on behalf of the organisation. "From the very first

years of Sculpture by the Sea one aim was to invite artists from around the world to Australia,' he said.

"It is a wonderful surprise to receive this award from the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

"Prague is a place very close to my heart and over the last 21 years we have greatly enjoyed exhibiting many Czech artists in Sculpture by the Sea at Bondi and Cottesloe.

"More recently the three sculptures by Czech artists in the Snowy Valleys have also delighted many visitors from near and far with Milan Kuzica visiting Batlow Technology School as part of the Snwoy Hydro School Zuzana Slováková, Czech Consul-General to Sydney, said "The

to Sydney, said "The Consulate General of the Czech Republic is thrilled to have the opportunity to continually support Czech artists, who have had a long tradition of exhibiting in Sculpture by the Sea and now Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail.

"Sculpture by the Sea is truly one-of-its-kind and has long been a platform

bringing works for from all over the world, including our country, to the Australian public. It has given space to many Czech artists over the years, acting as a cultural bridge between our two counties through the universal language of art and the deeply experiential nature of sculptural practice.

"It seems only fitting

that the founder and artistic

director, David Handley,

accepted this award on behalf of Sculpture by the Sea and Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail, given that the idea behind the festival came to be in the Czech Republic, where he was living in the beginning of the 90s.

"It is my hope that Sculpture by the Sea will continue to inspire and connect and that Czech artists will continue to be a part of its story."




