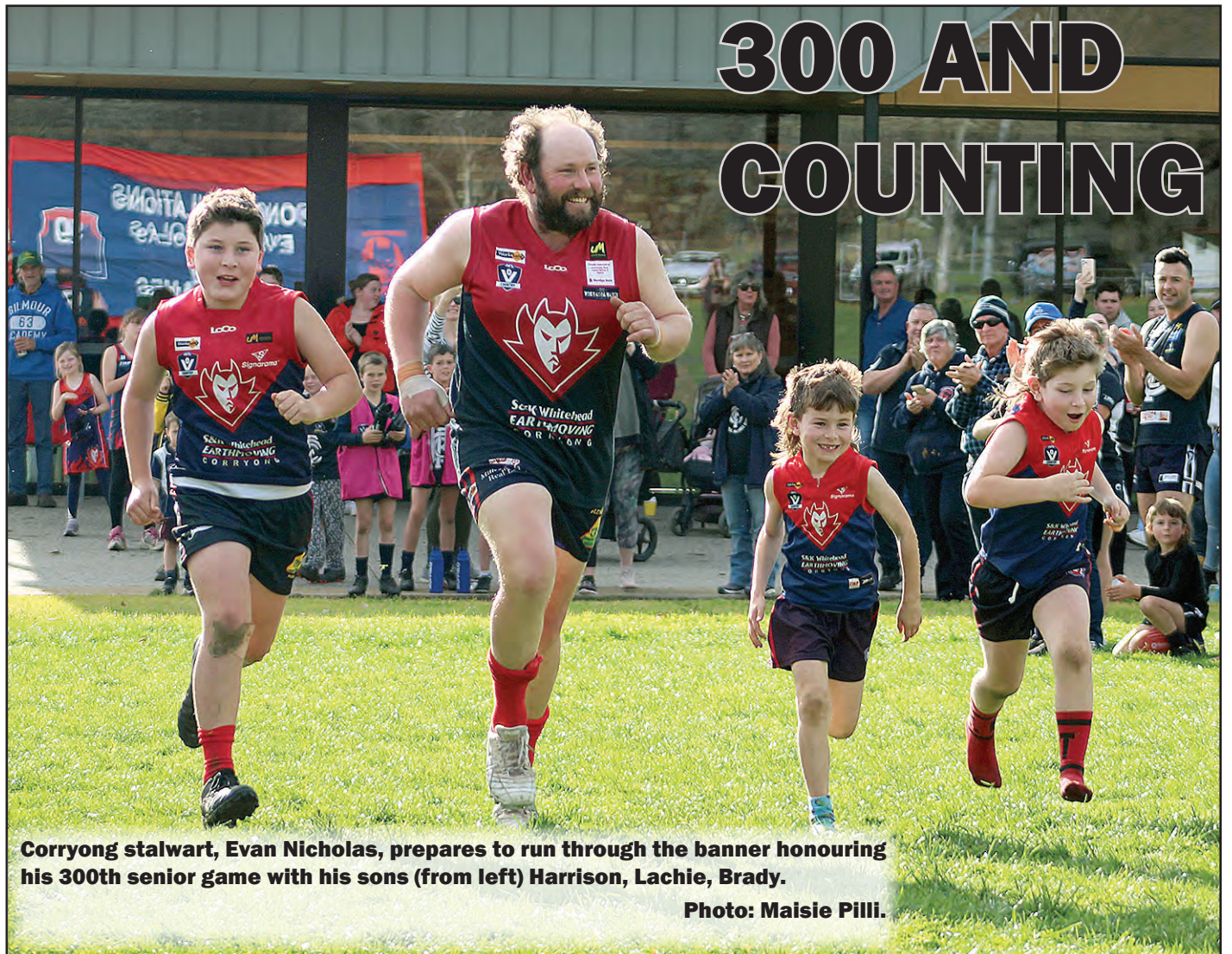

Corryong powers up

Corryong has received the bulk of almost \$18 million in funding that has been awarded to seven projects in Indi to build resilience to natural disasters under the Disaster Ready Fund, Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, has announced.

A staggering \$15 million has been delivered for the only project in the Towong Shire to establish an Advanced Microgrid

that would improve energy resilience to Corryong during natural disasters.

"Indi communities have been severely affected by both the Black Summer bushfires and the 2022-2023 flooding events, which created huge damage to our roads and properties," Dr Haines said.

"These projects will help protect our communities when the next natural disaster

occurs.

"I have worked with communities across the electorate as we have recovered from those natural disasters and had many conversations about how we can be better prepared. These projects will make a real difference in many ways.

"I congratulate all the communities involved in preparing these projects and being awarded funding."

Player airlifted to hospital

Corryong footballer, Riley Holland, had an eventful day on and off the field in the senior match against Cudgewa on Saturday.

After kicking two goals earlier, Holland injured his ribs in a marking contest and then landed on the ball on the ground in the third quarter and was forced from the ground.

He was taken to

Corryong Health for assessment before being airlifted to Canberra at around 7pm that night.

It was confirmed by the Corryong club that he had at least four fractured ribs, blood in his lung as well as a bruised lung.

However, there was more drama to come as after being stabilised Holland was discharged but almost half way back

to his home in Albury he was subsequently recalled to the hospital after a tear was detected in his spleen.

Holland is now recovering at home and reported to be in good spirits.

The club has thanked Maree and Dave Colbert, Cudgewa Football Netball Club trainers and Corryong Health staff for their assistance.

Towong takes its voice to town

The Towong Shire Mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead, along with the CEO, Julian Phelps, recently travelled to Canberra to give voice to particular concerns facing the council.

The pair met with the Minister for Local Government and Regional Development, Kristy McBain, as well as Minister for Early Childhood, Anne Aly.

"Often our advocacy work isn't very visible and since the pandemic, rarely in person so the opportunity to meet face-to-face and discuss the priorities and challenges being faced by our communities was a welcome one," Cr Whitehead said.

High on the agenda was increased funding for road maintenance, the need for additional early years services for the Upper Murray and tourism opportunities with the future development of the Bellbridge Boathouse.

"We also took the chance to brief our local Member for Indi, Helen Haines, to ensure that the voices of the Towong

communities continue to be heard in the corridors of Parliament long after the meetings have ended," Cr Whitehead added.

The delegation emphasised to the Ministers that the condition of local roads is vital to our community.

In this financial year Towong Shire has invested \$1.6 million across its 1183km local road network on resurfacing, repairs and general maintenance and it's planning on increasing this

investment to \$1.8 million for the next financial year.

There is also close to 500kms of road across the municipality which is managed by the Victorian government including the Murray Valley Highway, Great River Road, Benambra-Corryong Road, Granya Road, Dartmouth Road, Omeo Highway and the Shelley-Walwa Road.

"While we welcome the state government's budget announcement of \$50 million for Delivering

Local Roads over four years, we know that there is still a gap," Cr Whitehead said.

"We will continue to advocate to the government for increased funding for rural roads but we can't do this alone and encourage community members to share their concerns directly with the government as well," Cr Whitehead said.

Partnership pays off for learners



Following discussions with the Upper Murray Youth Working Group and an April survey which received 48 votes from local young people, the Corryong Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) has identified that learner driving hours is a common concern for them.

In response to these concerns and with thanks to the Future Proof project, the CNC is launching a Learner Driver Program which will give youth the opportunity to drive with a mentor for just \$5 per hour.

"Some of us at the CNC have felt firsthand the burden of being late

to achieve 120 driving hours and at the time we were able to benefit from a similar program that is no longer offered locally, which is why we're so excited to offer this service," confirmed Gemma Whitehead, CNC assistant co-ordinator.

Future Proof is a collective impact project led by YACVic, in response to the 2019-20 bushfires.

It brings together a range of partners - 10 local government areas, NGOs and ACCOs. It is place-based and applies work principles to support young people in youth-led recovery projects and

community decision-making. The project has a strong focus on training and qualification pathways for young people.

"We aim to empower young people with the necessary skills and knowledge to tackle whatever emergencies or challenges arise in the future," said youth worker, Adele Miles.

"No-one is telling our young people what they need but instead asking."

Film ignites change over suicide

The multi-award winning documentary ‘Solstice’, about survivors of suicide, including interviews with local people who have been impacted by tragedy, will screen in Corryong next week.

The inspiration for the film had its genesis with the Winter Solstice event that happens in Albury for survivors of suicide and those struggling with their mental ill health.

When 15 year-old Mary Baker took her own life after a three year battle with a serious mental illness the stigma and silence that surrounds suicide compounded her family’s grief and isolation.

‘Solstice’ documents the extraordinary story of Mary’s parents, Annette and Stuart, as this personal tragedy propelled them into the public space to confront the challenges of mental illness and help to end the heartbreaking loneliness of those left behind when a person dies by suicide.

However, the story expanded beyond there and includes the loss of several young men to suicide following the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires in the Upper Murray.

The Bakers initially reached out to anyone who would help them in their mission to create the change that may have

saved their daughter.

“The film began as a story of one regional Australian family who had lost their daughter to suicide but quickly became a document bearing witness to the need for urgent and radical change in mental health support as more and more survivors of suicide added their voice,” said ‘Solstice’ director, Helen Newman.

“Traversing a mental health system that is increasingly stretched beyond capacity and unable to respond to crisis leaves families also surviving the grief of suicide,” the Albury-base film maker added.

Her documentaries have screened on ABC TV, ABC iview, NITV and at a range of national and international film festivals. She co-directed the feature documentary ‘Anthem’ which went on to win Best Australian Documentary at ACMI Real Life International Documentary Festival, 2006.

Underpinning the personal stories in ‘Solstice’ are the voices of well-respected commentators Professor Patrick McGarry and Sir Graham Thornicroft, both personal friends of the Bakers and outspoken advocates for greater investment, resources and support for people struggling with mental illness.

Through intimate interviews and archival footage ‘Solstice’ draws together the threads of a world always shadowed by grief yet filled to the brim with determination and surprising hope.

This film is a bold, grassroots voice raised to unite, challenge and change how we respond to our collective mental health crisis now and into the future,” Ms Newman said.

“There are so many elements that feed into the mental health crisis we are facing. The further I went the more I found myself enmeshed in multiple threads that needed to be untangled.

“These include the historical shame and stigma that accompanies mental illness and suicide; the resultant disparity in funding for mental health services compared to physical health services; the impact and cost of collective trauma across communities, cultures and nations; and the latest curve ball, a global pandemic.

“The challenge was to ensure the voices of survivors were clearly heard within the context of these myriad forces.

“Thank you to every person who has trusted us to share their story and every individual and organisation who invested in the vision,” Ms Newman said.

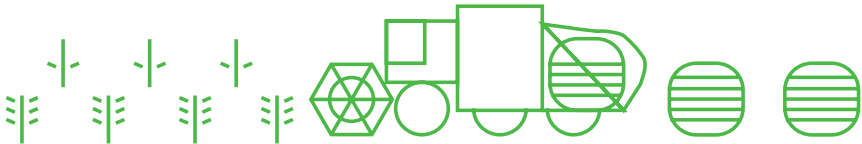

Ignoring road closures can prove costly

Victorian public land authorities are warning off-road adventurers to obey all closed tracks and gates in forests and parks as seasonal road closures come into effect from this long weekend.

The Conservation Regulator (CR) and Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMV) authorised officers are targeting illegal vehicle use and gate breaches on public land during patrols over the cooler, wetter months of the year.

Seasonal closures are in force between June and November every year to protect sensitive environments and to preserve public access tracks when they are most vulnerable to damage. Driving off-road and going around these gates destroys important native plants and vital wildlife habitat, including billy buttons and Clover Glycine.

Between June and November 2022, more than 400 breaches of closed gates and roads across Victoria were recorded with hotspots

in alpine areas, Mt Disappointment State Forest and Lerderderg State Park.

CR officers also fined more than 95 people during the same period for vehicle offences including illegally driving or riding off-road or on a closed road and breaching a closed gate.

In Victoria it is illegal to drive or ride on a closed road on public land.

Anyone caught breaching road closure rules can be fined up to \$925 and the offence carries a maximum penalty of \$9,246 if prosecuted in court.

"Victoria's forests are home to thousands of native plants that need our protection and there is no excuse for people deliberately driving and riding around locked gates or on closed roads," said David McIlroy, CR Acting

Director of Regulatory Operations.

"The damage they cause seriously threatens environmental health and biodiversity."

To find out more information about seasonal closures visit <https://ffm.vic.gov.au/forest-and-road-closures>. Local conditions and weather can affect the timing and locations of road closures, so before

leaving home drivers can check specific tracks via the MapshareVic online tool mapshare.vic.gov.au/webmap/publicaccess/.

If you notice any illegal vehicle use on public land you can report it anonymously to DEECA on 136 186.

Man faces charges over land clearing

A 70-year-old man has been charged with 127 offences after allegedly bulldozing dozens of trees from a one-hectare area of public land in and around the Mount Lawson State Park, in April last year.

The earthmoving business owner is accused of knocking down more than 60 large native trees, destroying wildlife habitat and using a vehicle to damage public land without a permit.

Conservation Regulator Authorised Officers investigated following a report of large machine tracks and alleged illegal land clearing behind private property that adjoins the park.

Environmental experts assessed the site and found the felled trees would have provided significant habitat for native wildlife including the endangered Gang-gang Cockatoo, and the damage will

have lasting impacts on biodiversity values.

"The removal of these habitat trees and clearing of this area negatively affects environmental health and the survival of native species," said Stephen McMonigle, Program Manager Regulatory Operations, Hume Region.

In Victoria, it is illegal to remove native vegetation on public land without authorisation.

Damaging, disturbing or destroying wildlife habitat attracts penalties up to \$9,246 per charge.

"We take any destruction of wildlife habitat extremely seriously," said Kate Gavens, Chief Conservation Regulator.

"Our public land estate is important for native flora and fauna to survive and thrive. It is the responsibility of businesses and individuals

to know the law and work with authorities to ensure they have the legal authority to undertake any work on public land."

The charged man will appear before Wodonga Magistrates' Court on 11 July, 2023.

Anyone with information about illegal land clearing or other environmental crimes is urged to contact DEECA on 136 186. Callers can remain anonymous.

End to forest harvesting brings new problems

Blanket bans of native forest harvesting will not improve our carbon balance or recover biodiversity according

to the professional association for forest scientists, growers and managers, Forestry Australia.

President Dr Michelle Freeman said the consensus position of independent scientific experts, forest managers and researchers is that active management of forests is required to maintain forest health, mitigate fire risk, conserve biodiversity and maximise carbon outcomes.

"Although on face-value decisions to end native forest harvesting may appear to be a win for the environment, Victoria and Western Australia are now facing a range of unintended negative consequences," Dr Freeman said.

"These decisions have been made without clear alternate strategies

or funding for the active management and monitoring that is required. Passive approaches will actually risk our forests at a time when their key threats – bushfire, invasive species and climate change – are still increasing.

"Additionally, the rapid exit of specialist skills, experience, knowledge and equipment from the forest management space is reducing our capacity to implement effective forest management plans and mitigate or respond effectively to bushfire emergencies.

"The serious implications of this cannot be overstated and urgent investment in strategies to retain these people and implement strategic management programs is needed.

"In addition, a significant increase

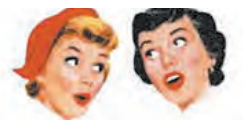
in imports of timber from overseas is already occurring – representing increased carbon emissions, reduced oversight of the sustainability of management practices yielding those products, and a shirking of our moral and ethical responsibility to meet local demand locally.

"Simply ending native forest timber harvesting will not act to solve the complex challenges facing our forests, nor act to meet society's needs," Dr Freeman emphasised.

"These issues are too important to let politics and ideology drive decision-making.

"We need a strategy for the ongoing management of forests – one that is based on genuine science, the aspirations of Aboriginal

and Torres Strait Islander people and the collective knowledge and lived experiences of the people who have dedicated their lives to evidence-based care for our forests."

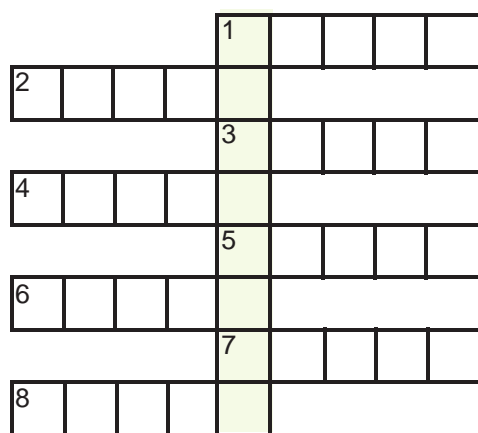

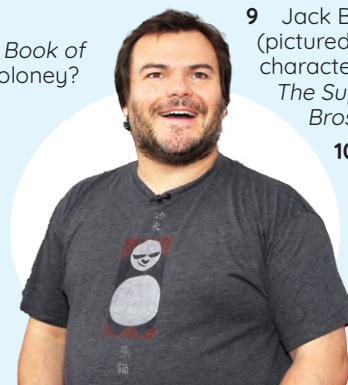

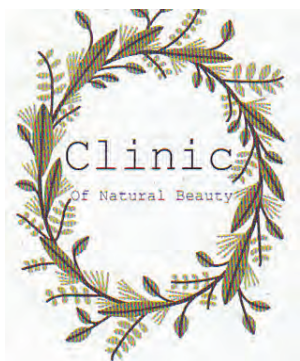

Having a key forward is a ‘must-have’ ingredient for success in local football, as evidenced by the weekend’s results.

Tumbarumba was without leading goalkicker Dan Hitchens in the loss to Bullioh, whereas Ash Murray kicked eight goals in his first appearance for the Bulldogs in 2023.

Despite it being Corryong stalwart Evan Nicholas’s 300th game, the Demons just did not have the personnel to combat the ‘blue wave’.

Bullioh took another step in securing second spot and the double chance come finals with a heart-stopping four-point victory over Tumbarumba.

The Dogs skipped out to a 34-point break at half time with the Roos’ defenders struggling to curb the influence of Ash Murray who posted eight goals in his return.

However, the tables turned in the third term with Blake Ryan, Steve Hoffman and Connor Clayton leading the charge for the Roos who reduced the margin to eight points at the last break but the effort took its toll as the Dogs held sway in the final stanza to fall over the line.
