#### Haines gives tax cuts and health funding a tick

Independent Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, has welcomed tax cuts and funding to deliver more training places for doctors in regional Australia under key announcements in Tuesday's federal Budget.

Dr Haines' advocacy for a Commonwealth injection of funding the into regional healthcare workforce was substantially reflected in the 2025-2026 budget.

In her Indi budget submission, she requested that the government provide additional funding, including via Commonwealth Supported Places, for regionallybased medicine university courses.

The government announced that 200 rural GPs will be trained every year

by 2028, as part of the \$606.3 million committed in the budget.

In addition to this, the budget revealed that universities wanting to access the \$35.7 million for 100 new Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP) a year in medicine must demonstrate evidencebased strategies that encourage medical students to pursue a career in general practice, particularly in regional, rural and remote areas.

"This is a critical announcement and a win for regional areas facing critical shortages of healthcare workers, with a commitment to 50 percent of additional General Practitioner trainee places being in regional and rural Australia," said Dr Haines.

She also welcomed

the requirement on CSP funding for regionallybased medicine and said she would be following up with universities and government alike to make sure it is being met.

Dr Haines welcomed other healthcare inclusions such as cheaper medicines by lowering the Pharmaceutical Medicines Scheme general patient co-payment from \$31.60 to \$25 from 1 January 2026 and \$7.9 billion to expand eligibility for bulk billing incentives.

"We know Australians are failing to fill their scripts for medicines or failing to go to the GP, just because it costs too much," she said. "These measures will

help alleviate that."


Dr Haines however criticised the government for a lack of dedicated building funding for hospitals in regional Australia.

"Under this budget, once again there is no fund for health services like Albury Wodonga Health to bid into for a new hospital," she said.

"Until federal governments realise that Commonwealth financial support is absolutely necessary, regional and rural health services will keep struggling to provide healthcare their communities deserve."

Dr Haines added that the surprise inclusion of further modest tax cuts was an 'election sweetener' but nevertheless would be welcomed by Australians facing continued cost-ofliving pressures.

Dr Haines said more needed to be done for people on low incomes and to help households and small business electrify.

"Every dollar of relief makes a big difference to everyday Australians right now," she said.

"Almost 5000 people in Indi are on JobSeeker there are no provisions in this budget for Commonwealth Rent Assistance, Job Seeker allowance other Commonwealth support payments.

"What is also still missing for households

and businesses is support to electrify.

"With the cost of domestic gas, Australians know that the best energy cost saver is rooftop solar and electrification.

Dr Haines also said it was disappointing the government had failed to continue support for small businesses to reduce costs through energy upgrades.

government's own budget papers tout the \$56.7 million in grants for small businesses to access energy upgrades, such as replacing inefficient appliances and improving heating systems

businesses can save money on their energy bills but in the fine print it's clear there's actually no new money for this program," Dr Haines pointed out.

Indi was the second most successful electorate in the program, with \$2.25 million awarded under two rounds.

Dr Haines is also angry that regional infrastructure programs like the Growing Regions and the regional Precincts and Partnerships Program, along with regional roads and housing infrastructure funding, had no further financial committment in

the budget.

"The Growing Regions Program exhausted its funding and the Regional Precincts and Partnerships Program is due to expire after this financial year," she explained.

"Regional councils and organisations rely on competitive grant programs like these for key projects and community infrastructure.

"The appalling state of our local roads is evidence that much more support is needed for our local government road programs," Dr Haines emphasised.

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#### Planned burning reduces future risk

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) will take advantage of favourable weather and forest conditions across the state this autumn to reduce the risk of bushfires on the community and environment.

FFMVic Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Aaron Kennedy, said planned burning is one of the key tools firefighters use to reduce the size, intensity and impact of bushfires.

"Reducing fuels such as grass, leaves, bark, shrubs and small fallen branches means fires are less intense, slower to spread and safer for firefighters to control," Mr Kennedy said.

"Autumn is generally the best time of the year to undertake planned burns as the weather is more stable and fire behaviour is manageable and predictable.

"Given the limited opportunities to undertake planned burning, it is important that we commence this work as soon as weather and forest



conditions are suitable."

This year more than 100 planned burns across an area of 46,300 hectares are prepared and ready for ignition in north east Victoria.

Priority burns are planned in state forest, parks and reserves around Koetong, Mitta

Mitta, Tallangatta
Valley, Marysville,
Toolangi, Kinglake,
Glenburn, Woods
Point, Tatong, Howqua,
Bright, Beechworth and
Yackandandah. While
planned burning is our
most effective tool to
reduce bushfire risk, in
locations where planned

burning isn't suitable, we mulch, mow, slash and spray, build fuel breaks and upgrade and maintain the public land road network to keep Victoria safer," Mr Kennedy said.

"We work with the Bureau of Meteorology to assess weather conditions such as humidity, temperature and wind speed and will only carry out burns when the conditions are suitable, and it is safe to do so."

FFMVic works with emergency sector partners including the Country Fire Authority, Fire Rescue Victoria and Emergency Management Victoria to manage bushfire risk, prepare communities and respond to bushfires and other emergencies.

## Advertising Pays Dividends

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#### Farmers feel powerless



Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley, says the Tallangatta Valley Dog Fence needs to be switched on before more stock is lost to predators.

During the parliamentary sitting week, Mr Tilley called on Environment Minister, Steve Dimopoulos, to remedy the situation that has seen the electric fence unplugged through a lack of manpower.

The 75-kilometre exclusion fence runs on a north–south alignment along the private land and public land interface from the Murray River to the Tallangatta Valley.

During a protracted debate over the future of managing wild dogs last year the fence had a dedicated worker to prevent shorts and other threats to its integrity.

Mr Tilley said he understood that person had been redeployed.

"This government has been red hot on non-lethal methods of controlling these dogs and here we have a 75-kilometre one that they've turned their back on," he said.

"The fence keeps the dogs at bay and ensures dingoes are safety kept in the national park.

"But instead, the department pulls the plug."

Tallangatta Valley farmer, Emma Nankervis, said it would be tragic if the fence fell into rack and ruin.

"It's proven to keep pigs, deer, dogs and other pest species out of private property when working effectively," she said.

"It's always been an unwritten rule among farmers that we're responsible for keeping our animals out of our neighbours' farms - why isn't the government doing the same?"

Mr Tilley pointed to the Environment Department's own stats to highlight increased attacks.

"Figures from the DEECA invasive species program shows a 30 per cent increase in livestock either killed and maimed and a 53 per cent in the number of wild dogs seen and heard," he said.

"Locals say it is a direct reflection of the fence being out of action."

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#### Turn plastic waste into opportunity

The agricultural industry is making a monumental stride toward sustainability with the opening of the first bagMUSTER collection sites.

This pioneering, notfor-profit, industry-led program addresses plastic waste from single-use woven polypropylene (PP) bags.

Spearheaded by
CropLife Australia and its
not-for-profit subsidiary
Agsafe, in collaboration
with the Australian Seed
Federation, bagMUSTER
provides farmers,
growers, and the broader
agricultural sector with a
practical and responsible
recycling solution -

transforming waste into opportunity.

The program's first phase is happening in Victoria, with collection sites now operational in the Macedon Ranges Shire Council.

Farmers and growers can currently drop off eligible PP bags such as those used for fertilisers, seeds, grain, stock feed and pet food at collection sites in Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend.

The bagMUSTER initiative is more than just a recycling program, it is a vital step towards creating a circular economy in agriculture, where waste is repurposed rather than discarded.

The program offers a range of benefits including reducing plastic waste, preventing pollution and protecting ecosystems.

Also, there is no fee for dropping off eligible bags at participating collection sites.

The remainder of Phase 1 of the program will see collection sites established across western Victoria.

Phase 2 will expand the program to the rest of the state, with plans to roll out nationally as infrastructure becomes available.

#### Producers are missing out on fair farm gate prices

Last week's release of the competition watchdog's inquiry into supermarket pricing lays bare the power imbalances, tactics and transparency issues faced in the dairy industry, according to the Australian Dairy Farmers (ADF)

It says the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission's (ACCC) inquiry shows more must be done to strengthen safeguards for Australian dairy farmers and the agriculture industry more broadly.

ADF President, Ben Bennett, said farmers are the most vulnerable participants in a supply chain dominated by big players.

"This report backs up what we've been saying for years - that the big supermarkets have increased their product margins over the past five years at the cost of our industry," he said.

"With the exception of homebrand milk, which the big supermarkets use as a loss leader, we consistently see the retail price of dairy products rise. Yet, right now, dairy

farmers are struggling to juggle high input costs with declining farm gate prices.

"The big supermarkets directly sourcing milk from farmers is further eroding market competition, compounding the issues our industry faces."

Mr Bennett welcomed the government's support for the report and called on leaders to adopt and enforce the recommended reforms.

"We also want the government to look beyond these recommendations and consider how they can ensure retail price increases flow to farmers," he said.

"Government must also implement policies that promote local dairy products and counter the rising levels of cheap dairy imports."

With one major supermarket now a dairy processor in its own right and a review of the Dairy Code of Conduct underway, Mr Bennett hopes the government will seize the opportunity to strengthen provisions and protections for farmers dealing with processors.



#### Fake news sites slammed

association of independent newspapers has supported calls for the Australian Commission (AEC) to review a number of online publications allegedly funded by Climate 200 supporters.

Country Press Australia (CPA) president, Andrew Schreyer (pictured). says this serves as a timely warning about the increased risk politically funded propaganda being passed off as independent news in the upcoming election campaign.

"The AEC has an excellent record of strictly monitoring and regulating political advertising but now there is a new threat where fake 'news' sites can become a loophole for political advertising donations to be redirected to fund 'journalism' that mainly produces political propaganda," Mr Schreyer cautioned.

"There are concerns from our organisation's more than 240-strong membership that the level of trust readers had for local papers was being compromised following the recent emergence of a number of online publications produced by Gazette News."

He said claims by Gazette News to be

high-quality local journalism to communities where local news has declined or disappeared were both misleading and wrong, given there were dozens of independently owned mastheads that have existed in many cases for more than 150 years in some of the same areas where Gazette News now operates.

"It's all too easy now to set up a 'news' website that publishes political propaganda dressed up as journalism and amplified through social media campaigns," Mr Schreyersaid.

"Such sites are a threat to the integrity of our political advertising regulations and to the public trust in truly independent news publishers who are reporting objectively and holding the powerful to account.

"Most of our member newspapers have news websites and a history dating back well over 100 years. In addition, many local radio and television services across rural and regional Australia have a proud history of supporting and serving local communities.

"Independently owned, place-based public interest journalism providers such

committed to providing as our member newspapers work hard to earn the respect and trust of the communities they serve."

> Mr Schreyer said it can take years to earn that trust but it can also be easily put at risk by entities whose actions can undermine what local papers have fought so hard for, and for so long.

> "Our members produce balanced and accurate journalism underpinned by the integrity and respect they share for community," emphasised.

> "We are concerned that the actions of this single organisation could undermine the respect readers have for authentic public interest journalism."

It has been revealed that the three major funders of Gazette News have also donated more than \$1.7 million to environmental lobby group Climate 200 and associated candidates, according AEC to disclosures.

"The revelation that Gazette News online publications are funded by top teal donors damages the reputation of independent regional, rural and local mastheads," Mr Schreye said.

"Consumers of content produced by Gazette News publications need to be made aware of their



funding sources and view their content through that

"Balanced, independent and professionally produced public interest iournalism such as that produced by our members is the democratic infrastructure that holds communities together."

Mr Schrever said as members of the Australian Press Council, CPA publications are required to abide by a code of ethics that stresses the importance of fairness and balance in their reporting and for journalists to

not be influenced outside influences organisations.

Mr Schreyer welcomed Nationals leader David Littleproud's intervention in this matter and thanked him for his strong representation of local, rural and regional newspapers and the work they do in thousands of local communities across the nation.

#### Light horse skills will be on display

An exciting contest showcasing the mounted military skills of old such as tent pegging, skill-atarms and stand-to-horse will get spectators' blood racing when the 8th Light Horse Indi Upper Murray hosts the Lt Col Leslie Maygar Memorial Trophy at Walwa on Sunday, April

As well as the equestrian competitors, members of the 9th/14th Prince of Wales Regiment will be in attendance and the 8th Light Horse Indi VMR will have a static display at the event.

There will also be a Bush Market on the tennis courts adjacent to the oval.

The day starts at 9am and entry is a gold coin donation (BYO seating). refreshments will available at the Walwa Store and the Walwa Hotel.

The competition is named in honour of Lt Col Leslie Maygar VC, DSO, VD who served with the Victorian Mounted Rifles in the South African War Victorian Mounted Rifles.

It was during this conflict that Maygar was awarded the Victoria Cross for the rescue of a fellow soldier under heavy fire.

When WWI started he once again volunteered for military service, enlisting with the Australian

Imperial Force as part of the 4th Light Horse Regiment.

While serving on Gallipoli in 1915 Maygar was promoted to the rank of major and in October that year was appointed to command the 8th Light Horse Regiment. He was in command of the last party to withdraw from the trenches at Anzac Cove and rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel.

The Light Horse troopers will stay on in the district after the Maygar Trophy to participate in events at the Man from Snowy River Bush Festival three days later, commencing with a commemorative wreath laying at the Anzac Park cenotaph at 5pm on Wednesday, April 9th.

Members of the Australian Light Horse Association (ALHA), who

festival since 2011, will also be on show at the arena and at the street parade.

Members of the ALHA attend Anzac Day and other commemorations throughout Australia at their own cost, taking pride in presenting themselves and their horses in a manner that would have made the original Light Horse proud.

The following excerpts from the Anzac Portal of the Department of Veterans Affairs describe the activities of the Light

".....The advantage of mounted military units in early conflicts was that they were more mobile than infantry and could travel faster over long distances.

The Light Horse in the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) mostly contained recruits who served in the regiments of the Citizen Forces.

Many young men from rural areas of Australia volunteered for the Light Horse regiments but they had to pass a riding test to join. The test was easier for men from the bush because horses were still the main method of transport on farms and in country towns.

The army did not officially accept First Australians into the AIF until May 1917, when enlistment standards were relaxed to include 'mixed heritage' with a parent of European origin. Indigenous soldiers served as valuable members of the Light Horse.

Many possessed excellent horse-handling skills and specialist tracking knowledge.

Australia shipped more than 120,000 horses overseas during WWI. Only about 29,000 served with Australians and other Allied troops in Egypt and the Middle East. Most were sold to the Indian Army.

During the Commonwealth purchasing officers bought many horses from breeders and graziers. The army preferred station horses, referred to as 'Walers', because they were well suited to the desert conditions in Egypt and

have been attending the Palestine. Walers had been used by stockmen and mounted units in Australia re-enactment, in the main for many years. They had also been exported from Australia and sold to the British Indian Army as mounts.

Occasionally, Light Horse recruits brought along their own horses and the government would purchase them. All AIF horses received the government hide brand.

Light horsemen camped in bell tents close to their horses. Each tent would fit eight men with their feet towards the centre like the spokes of a

Light horsemen mostly fought dismounted. They were considered to be 'mounted infantry' instead of 'cavalry'. The soldiers rode horses to a battlefield where they engaged with the enemy on foot and then left quickly on horseback when disengaging. The use of horses made the force more mobile and faster than infantry units and horse-drawn artillery.

During combat, they rode in sections of four light horsemen. One soldier held the reins of all four horses. The other three men in his section dismounted and went forward to fight on foot. The horse handler had a dangerous job because enemy aircraft could target

Sometimes the light horsemen fought from horseback, like cavalry. In the Battle of Beersheba. the light horsemen rode in with their bayonets. Their rifles were slung over their backs.

1918, In regiments were issued with sabres so they acted like cavalry but mostly they dismounted to fight. Each regiment contained 25 officers and 400 men, of whom around 100 performed horse-holding duties during combat. The regiment was organised into three squadrons (A, B, C), each with four troops that had 10 four-person

It was a great competition all through and we all enjoyed the handicap format.


Both 100 Up events have been completed with Col Smedley defeating Noel Blake in the men's final.


