Art trio showcase our natural beauty

Artwork born from the ashes of the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires will be on public display in Corryong during the upcoming bush festival.

The exhibition - 'Land and Life' - will be held at Davis Cottage from April 8th -14th of April. It will be an engaging and vibrant show hosted by the local Walwa art group 'Bridge the River Arts' and will feature work by three local artists - Gayle Lee, Gillian Fahle and Ronda Teakel.

All three artists live and work on their cattle farms, which were severely affected by the bushfires. After the disaster the trio met and started painting regularly together and realised they all shared a common love and interest of the land and everything to do with landscapes and nature.

The artists want to showcase a different interest within the Towong Shire, while also portraying the pure joy and beauty of the land on which they live.

Gayle, a landscape artist, has lived her adult life in the Victorian high country and draws her inspiration from the beauty, atmosphere, form and colours of its mountains, trees and rivers. She aims to create landscapes that entice





thoughts and emotions in the viewer, inspiring them to want to take a wander through her landscape and into her world of art.

As a young woman, Gillian went to an art academy in Italy then worked in an art studio in Milan, specialising in restoration and colour selection for silk screen reproduction of contemporary paintings.

This experience influenced her personal work with colour and perspective being paramount in her art works.

Gillian returned to farming in Australia 16 years later and she is an

avid observer of nature, birds, animals portraying them brilliantly in her acrylic, water colour and most recently her oil pieces. Ronda has been associated with the Upper Murray for many years and has been a permanent resident since 2019.

She is considered by Gayle and Gillian as the queen of "rock and grasses" with her ability to focus on the intricacies of the vegetation and monumental rock formations that are abundant in the high country.

Ronda finds the forest floors are a haven for fallen, leaves, twigs

and drying grasses that provide intricate worlds of complex patterns and symphonies of colour that are often the foundation of her practice.

Gayle, Gillian and Ronda are three very different types of landscape artists who all share the common love of the land and life.

Bridge the River Arts has thanked Towong Shire Council and Joe Calvert (Co-ordinator for Recreation, Arts and Culture) for the support they have provided with access to bushfire recovery funding, enabling it to host the exhibition at Davis Cottage.

Corryong CBD Update

Over the last fortnight we successfully completed the installation of a new water main on the Northern side of the CBD, down to the Post Office, and the worksite was demobilised and tidied to prepare for Easter and The Man from Snowy River Bush Festival.

While construction pauses, negotiations are currently ongoing to provide more access for streetscape works to continue after the festival, with plans to commence demolition of the footpath from the Memorial Hall to the Man from Snowy River Arcade.

Recent underground surveys identified six underground fuel tanks across four locations. Two tanks have been exposed during Stage 2 works and additional tanks reported by the community are also being

investigated. This has prompted us to take proactive measures to prioritise environmental and public safety including decommissioning which involves decanting the remaining fuel, filling tanks with stabilised sand, and managing soil contamination. The underground fuel tanks are a legacy from old businesses that operated out of the existing buildings in the CBD area. Planning is still underway and we are arranging the excavation of sample pits to uncover tanks outside the Stage 2 construction area. Soil sampling, testing, and removal of the fuel from these tanks are being planned to commence immediately after the festival.

Cont. from page 1. "The dingo is listed as canis familiaris (domestic dog) by scientific bodies such as the Australian Faunal Directory," Ms Paton said.

"It should not be listed as an Australian native species as there is clear evidence it was brought here from Asia. "Earliest fossil remains

are dated to about 3500 years ago. It contributed to the destruction of the alpha predator at the time, the thylacine and many native species since. "Nor is there any

evidence to support the theory that dingoes keep foxes and cats under control, as claimed by dingo conservationists, she added. "In Victoria, the dingo

was listed as a threatened. protected species around 2012 under pressure from dingo conservationists. A recent study, claims that 87 per cent of all wild dogs in Victoria are pure bred dingo compared with previous data showing one to three percent were pure dingo. This study was based on only 62 dog samples of dubious origin

"This formed the basis for the Victorian government's new policy of dingo protection."

The North East Wild Dog Action Group, a committee of proactive livestock producers, has been attempting to

Minister Dimopoulos has not replied and Minister Spence cancelled her oneday visit at short notice and has not confirmed an offer to reschedule. "We strongly

sheep industry. "In 2020-21, Victoria accounted for 47 per cent of Australia's sheep meat production, making it the country's largest sheep meat producer. The state's sheep meat export was valued at \$1.9 billion representing 43 per cent of all meat exports - making it Australia's highest sheep meat exporter. "The United States is

market for sheep meat export (valued at \$598 million), followed by China (\$206 million) and Malaysia (\$165 million).

"We are asking all livestock producers, landholders and communities that hold the same opinions and fears as our group, to write to both ministers and encourage your networks to do the same.
