Maxwell goes to bat for council budget

Tania Maxwell, Derryn Hinch's Justice Party Member for Northern Victoria, has sought state government help for Towong Shire Council to recoup the costs of clearing local roads of ground-slips and debris caused by last year's bushfires.

Last week, she asked Local Government Minister, Shaun Leane, in Parliament to alleviate what have become unsustainable, on-going costs for the council to keep these roads open.

"As we know, plants

Government wants to shoot first

Member for Benambra
Bill Tilley has given
the Victorian Labor
government 177,000
reasons to stop the planned
shooting of wild horses on
the High Plains.

Last week on the steps of Parliament, Mr Tilley - along with Opposition Leader, Michael O'Brien; Nationals Leader Peter Walsh and colleagues - accepted a petition signed by 177,000 people calling for a halt to the shooting and the creation of laws that protect the brumby from eradication.

Mr Tilley said people are outraged at the plan by Parks Victoria to double down on ground and aerial shooting of horses with plans to kill all horses at Falls Creek and 500 a year in the eastern Alps.

"The number of people willing to give up their day to be at this rally along with the 177,000 people who signed this petition are the tip of the iceberg," Mr Tilley said.

"We can show the science is flawed – the counts and the blame for damage.

"I have attempted to find a compromise with the government on so many of these issues but rather than listen to us they want to start shooting indiscriminately.

"Incredibly, they are now on the record as saying shooting is humane but mustering and roping horses, that has been a high-country tradition for close to 200 years, is unsafe.

"They can't guarantee a kill shot from the ground let alone a helicopter."

Mr Tilley said there

were greater threats to the Alpine flora and fauna.

"What we are seeing here is lazy policy, low hanging fruit – picking off horses that are the descendants of those noble animals that took our World War I troops into battle rather than dealing with more significant threats," he said.

"For every horse in the high plains there are more than 300 deer.

"Increasingly, I'm hearing pigs are becoming a significant factor and so this plan would shoot

the horses and leave the carcasses for them and the wild dogs.

"It's bloody-minded ideology aimed at winning over inner city environmentalists — winning Labor seats from the Greens rather than looking at the facts."

Minister for the Environment Lily D'Ambrosio declined an invitation to the rally.

Farm riverfront campers should be registered for safety

The Victorian Farmers
Federation (VFF) has
delivered it's submission
to the Victorian
government's proposed
Regulated Watercourse
Land Regulations and a
major focus was the need
for the introduction of a
registration system.

"Without a means to trace when campers arrive on a property and where they go, both farmers and the authorities will have no way knowing exactly where they have been and for how long," said VFF president, Emma Germano.

"The government has already created an app that we think should include a registration function.

"Under the proposed rules farmers will not be able to meet the traceability requirements under biosecurity quality assurance systems. "We're calling for a simple, easy to use registration system to be introduced to ensure a level of accountability from campers and easier enforcement of rules by authorities when issues arise.

The VFF also harbours concerns about the damage the process has inflicted to the Landcare partnership formed between farmers and the government.

"The VFF played a pivotal role in forming Landcare in the 1980s that has since dedicated an enormous amount of time improving Victoria's riparian environments," Ms Germano said.

"There's little doubt that poor consultation from government and the failure to listen to the concerns of landholders has seriously damaged this relationship."

Dear Corryong and Upper Murray Parents, Families, and Community Members

Re: Responding to Suicide of Young People in our Community

As you may know our communities have been profoundly saddened by a number of suicide deaths. Our heartfelt thoughts and sympathy extend to the bereaved families and friends.

Losing someone to suicide is difficult and complex for any family or community.

We are writing this letter to convey a number of important messages across our town and broader community:

- Services and agencies in Corryong and the Upper Murray have and are committed to promoting and improving the wellbeing and safety of young people, adults, and communities, and continue to do this critical work.
- To this end, an Upper Murray Postvention (Interventions after suicide event) Plan has been drafted by local and regional services to coordinate an effective response; reduce future risks; and strengthen local postvention and prevention systems. The draft plan is open for community feedback and available at www.corryonghealth.org.au
- A Local Response Group has been activated since Monday 3rd May 2021 to support those directly affected and coordinate immediate responses.
- The recent impact has been profound for the entire region and has affected multiple schools, thousands of families and young people, places of work, and community groups
- Every layer of government, Local, State, and Commonwealth are aware of the impact in our area and we are supporting Victorian and National agencies to work in partnership with our local agencies and suicide prevention groups
- All stakeholders are being activated including community services, education sectors, police, health, bereavement services, hospitals, local council, and other critical agencies
- Please know that every agency and sector is working behind the scenes to monitor risk, reduce risk, promote help seeking, connect people to services, and communicate helpful information.
- Key local & regional providers will be offering opportunities to talk, get training, and improve awareness across the community
- Key local & regional providers will also look to address the accessibility and priority of referrals to services for individuals, children, family, and young people.
- It is important that we all work together as parents/carers, families, and friends, and services to play a pivotal role in building resilience, promoting help seeking, and connecting with each other.
- Dr Rob Gordon Clinical Psychologist and expert in recovering from traumatic incidents will be in Corryong on Wednesday 19th May 2021 and Thursday 20th May 2021 to talk to parents; teachers and the broader community in separate sessions. Community members are invited 7:00pm Wednesday 19th May 2021 in the Corryong & District Memorial Hall, Hanson Street, Corryong. Dinner will be provided.

This intensive approach will continue to enhance access to strategies and ongoing supports locally.

Sailor makes museum connection

Coastal officer who served on a restored boat involved in a successful operation against enemy ships during WWII, recently visited the Man From Snowy River Museum in Corryong where the raid is immortalised in a display.

The teak fishing boat named Krait was used in 1943 by Z Force, a joint Allied Special Forces unit, to ferry a 14-strong company of British and Australian army and naval personnel which carried out a daring commando night raid on shipping in the Singapore Roads, damaging seven Japanese warships.

Following the war, Krait was bought by a British sawmiller for the Borneo timber trade and renamed Pedang (Sword). In the late 1950s two Australians recognised the boat while on a business trip and a public appeal followed and the Krait Trust Fund was formed to purchase the vessel and return it to Australia - which it did successfully in 1964.

That was when Ian Hart



as a 2nd Lieutenant, Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol on the Krait which was used for patrols, search and rescue operations, boating courses and school

It was transferred to the Australian War Memorial in 1985 but put in the care Museum to maintain and display until 1988, when it was loaned to the Australian National Maritime Museum which has managed the display, maintenance and restoration of MV Krait since that time.

'Understanding PFA' is a four-hour face-toface workshop designed to give participants an understanding of the principles of psychosocial support and how and when to provide psychological first aid.


