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Batteries boost energy benefits

Home batteries are set to change the energy landscape with household subsidies to solar and storage systems to deliver benefits to household power bills and take strain off the energy grid, according to Member for Indi, Helen Haines.

"My home batteries policy, which was adopted by the Labor government transform how households benefit from their rooftop solar and substantially reduce their annual energy bills," she said.

"The scheme starts on July 1st but batteries can be purchased and installed now and be eligible for the subsidy in the new financial year.

"I spent two years prosecuting this policy to the government, knowing the potential for households to substantially reduce their energy bills if we could increase their access to home batteries.

"I was thrilled when Labor committed to my policy so that home battery

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Community resilience boosted

Community groups and 28 councils and community groups across Victoria will receive close to \$1 million from the second round of AusNet's Energy Resilience Community Fund.

Locally, the Towong Memorial Hall Soldiers (pictured) received \$32,000 to purchase a backup diesel generator to power the hall during outages and emergencies.

"The hall is located in an area vulnerable to prolonged outages and severe weather events and is the only community building in the region providing a central point for community gatherings," said Ausnet's Executive General Manager Distribution, Andrew Linnie.

"The hall will provide access to essential emergency information, shelter, showers facilities, charging devices, medical equipment and cooking and food storage

facilities during emergency events."

The Energy Resilience Community Fund, provides supports projects that will help build long-term community energy resilience and provide support to communities during severe weather events.

"We know how important energy is to our communities and customers lives," Mr Linnie said.

"When severe weather or other emergencies happen, this becomes even more important. We are actively investing in our network to improve reliability and resilience.

"Through these grants, we're pleased to contribute further to help build community energy resilience and assist people to stay connected and safe during prolonged outages and emergencies," he said.

Local man dies in air accident

An Upper Murray man has been identifed as the person killed in an aircraft crash in the north west of NSW last month.

At about 7.15am on April 15th emergency services responded to reports of an aircraft crash at an airstrip at White Cliffs (around 260kms north-east of Broken Hill).

The solo pilot of the microlight aircraft involved, Harry Norman Nankervis (69) of Corryong, died at the scene.

Police secured a crime scene and with the assistance from the Australian Transport Safety Bureau (ATSB), commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident.

A report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

A celebration of Mr Nankervis's life will be held on Tuesday May 20th at the Cudgewa Football Netball Club at 10.30am.



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
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
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Cemetery walk unearths hidden stories

Encouraged by the interest and support shown over previous years, the Upper Murray Historical Society recently held a walk through the old Corryong Pioneer Cemetery.

As it turned out the weather could not have been more perfect and an estimated 35 people attended.

This year the guest speakers were Vicki Kane, Choc Thompson, Bob Herbert, Tom Lebner and his sister Fairlie Joyce and John Murphy.

Vicki was the first speaker at Jack Riley's grave, which had been covered on a cemetery walk some years back but history sleuth Vicki recently uncovered some previously unknown information largely pertaining to Jack's childhood and early life in Australia that certainly helps to further fill in the picture of the man.

Choc Thompson spoke of his own family's interesting history and the events that brought them to settle in Corryong. The Thompsons, headed by Lewis Thompson, were noted saddlers, harness-makers leather workers and first commenced their business in this town near the Corryong Hotel ('Bottom Pub'). Later they moved their premises closer to a new section of the town that was fast developing around the intersection of Towong Road and Donaldson Street. Their saddlery and family home stood for many years on Towong Road opposite the Corryong State School.

Choc said that the actual saddlery (located where the CWA building was later erected) burnt down in the early 1900s and from then on the business was conducted from the home which is still standing.

The Thompson family was very much involved in the early development of Corryong and supported many clubs and causes.

When Lewis died the MUIOOF Lodge paid to erect an impressive headstone over his grave in recognition of his, and his family's work (pictured). Choc added that, as time went on, other family members were interred in the grave and it now contains five bodies.

This grave is surely unique for the Corryong Pioneer Cemetery.

Bob Herbert spoke of one of his ancestors in William Edward Phillips who was born about 1861 and died in 1928, aged 67

William (or Eddy) was a bullocky, one of the heavy haulers of the day and with his team of bullocks he plied the road between Albury-Wodonga and Corryong and later between Old Tallangatta and Corryong.

This was a tough route as Corryong lay east of the Koetong Range and on the Tallangatta side there was the steep pinch known as 'Darbyshire Hill' and on the Corryong side there was the rise known as 'Keelangie' to be scaled. No doubt William did many other cartage jobs as required.

He was also interested in local racing and owned a number of racehorses which he trained and rode himself at both the Towong and Corryong racecourses. The Corryong course was located in the Corryong Recreation Reserve and they raced around the perimeter of the existing

It is from these hardy and interesting personalities that the character of our district is built.

Tom Lebner and his sister Fairlie, with occasional input from older sister Prue, recounted memories of their grandparents George and Hersey Moore who arrived in Corryong in 1919. Before coming to Corryong, George lead a colourul life in and around Melbourne but he was lured away from the

city by local mechanic and businessman Mr J.C. Brown with the promise of higher wages. This was after he met and married the love of his life.

In his old job at Munro Motors in Melbourne he was earning took on a job with £3/-/- a week but in Corryong Mr Brown paid him an impressive £5/12/6. George eventually began his own motor agency, mechanical repairs and engineering business Corryong where the Neighbourhood Centre now stands. He was also agent for the Shell Motor Spirits Co. Many older residents of Corryong would well remember his service station with the red and yellow bowsers out

In 1921 George went into partnership with Alf Venner showing silent movies at the Athenaeum Hall and George's wife Hersey accompanied the showing of these movies with background music on her piano to create the mood. The piano could also be loaded with perforated rolls to give Hersey a rest. In 1930 the 'talkies' made their appearance but it took some years for the silent movies to fade away and put Hersey out of a job.

For a time she ran a confectionery business and 'fast food' business across the road at the Oriental Café which later became the Crystal Café across the road but younger residents would

know it as the recent site of the Craft Shop.

The 'fast food' referred to above was Hersey's homemade pies. People would travel many miles to purchase them and they disappeared very quickly.

Like the Thompson family, the Moores were heavily involved with the community and Tom and Fairlie gave an often humorous account of their life.

John Murphy spoke of the Evans sisters from Thowgla, the daughters of Joe and Grace Evans - Margaret (1876) and Millicent (1883). Both died in 1942. The focus of this talk was to highlight the load that fell upon

mostly women when a member of a family in those days required full time care. Millicent (or Milly as she was better known) was not capable of looking after herself and as her family aged, her care fell on her older sister Margaret. It was a full time job but done with love and care. When Milly died in 1942 her sister Margaret survived her by only 26 days.

The above is only a snapshot of the talks given. Copies of the full talks are being preserved by Margaret Jarvis in the hope that they will be useful for future generations to learn something of their ancestors.

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Community to celebrate park recovery

Parks Victoria and hard-working local volunteers are celebrating the end of a long journey back from the 2029-20 Black Summer fires at Burrowa-Pine Mountain National Park.

On Sunday May 25th, Parks Victoria and the Friends of Murray Mountain Parks is inviting the community to attend a grand opening of Bluff Falls to showcase the new lookout and facilities.

Located in the scenic Upper Murray, the national park protects two picturesque mountains with very different microclimates and vegetation home to a wide variety of native species.

Popular with the local community, the park received more than 10,000 visitors a year before the

Bluff Falls, spectacular waterfall plunging 30 metres through the forest, is particularly beloved.

The bushfires of December 2019 and January 2020 burned 95 per cent of the park, destroyed almost all the visitor facilities and left major safety issues in their wake including unstable slopes and hazardous

The park was reopened in 2021 but the sheer scale of the damage and ongoing severe weather events hampered efforts to

rebuild the facilities.

Thanks efforts of contractors, community volunteers and Parks Victoria rangers, campgrounds, walking tracks, viewing platforms, steps, signs and toilet blocks have all been replaced, once more enabling visitors to enjoy the magic of this special place.

At the celebration, visitors will be able to enjoy a barbecue and refreshments provided by the Friends of Murray Mountain Parks with funding support from the Corryong Community Recovery Committee.

"We will be celebrating everyone's hard work over the last five years and showcase what has been achieved," said Parks Victoria Ranger Team Leader, Kelton Goyne.

"It was important we took the time and effort to make sure Burrowa-Pine Mountain has a better and more resilient visitor experience.

"It's been wonderful to see the native trees, plants and animals in the park recover from the fires over the last five years and visitors will get to see how much has changed."

Access on the day is via Cudgewa Bluff Road and Bluff Falls Road. Parking is limited at the falls and a small bus will be available for transport from Bluff Creek up to the



lookout. Visitors should arrive at 11am and bring a hat, water and something to sit on.


















It's been raining goals

The first three rounds of local football are reminiscent of the halcyon days of the 1970s and 1980s with key forwards dominating the scene.

The 23 goals kicked by Cudgewa sharpshooter John Spencer against Corryong on Saturday sparked speculation that it might have been the largest individual haul in the league's history.

The Blues were a major force in the 1970s, premierships winning in 1970, 1971, 1979 and again in 1981 with prolific sharpshooters such as Merv Ward, Mark Fitzpatrick and John Chitty who all kicked more than 20 goals in a match.

The current Cudgewa and Bullioh forward lines boast several players capable of kicking a swag of goals against lesser opposition in Corryong and Tumbarumba.

This has set the scene for an 'old school' shootout for the Corryong Courier goalkicking award with Spencer and Bullioh ace, Ash Murray, both capable of getting 'the magical ton' by season's end.

A desperately undermanned Corryong had no answer to a Blues' blitz on Saturday as the ball was constantly swept out of the middle by the hard working Mitch Pynappels, Darcy McKimmie and Jake Vinge to deliver the Sherrin into the safe hands of Spencer who was just too big for the Dees' defence to handle.

The Demons scored their sole score - a goal - in the first quarter and from then on it was one-way traffic as Spencer feasted on the silver service provided to boot 23 of his side's 39 majors.

the doldrums and win a game this season.

Bullioh brought Tumbarumba back to earth with a 186-point thumping after the Roos defeated Corryong by 173 points in round one.

The Dogs piled on 33 goals to the Roos' four, capped off by a 10-goal performance by Ash Murray and the support act of Cooper Ried with six.

The Roos were clueless against the slick Dogs as Joel Heiner, Luke Rafferty and Jake Curran ran amok to set up their attack.

Saturday sees the completion of round one when Cudgewa hosts Tumbarumba.

The Blues are out to prove a point after losing last year's grand final as favourites and speculation that they could drop off the pace with several key preseason departures but so far they have made every post a winner.

The Roos are an enigma after demolishing Corryong and then suffering the same fate at the hands of Bullioh. Given Cudgewa beat the Dogs by just two points the maths says the Roos are staring at another belting this week.

In A grade netball, unbeaten Cudgewa should keep its record intact with a victory over the Roos.

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
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
