



Views sought on old school site

Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) is encouraging the Upper Murray community have its say on the future of the former Corryong Consolidated School site.

In February 2020 the junior campus on the land at the intersection of Towong Road and Donaldson Street was closede.

The former primary school represents a part of Corryong's rich history and many people have personal connections to the site, which is why BRV wants to know your thoughts on how it should be developed.

Corryong State School first opened in 1874, about 1.5kms west of the junior campus. This site proved difficult for many students to access and in August 1877 a new school building and residence was opened on the current site. In 1917 Corryong State School was gazetted as Corryong Higher Elementary School (HES).

In April 2002 Corryong

Consolidated School and Corryong Secondary College merged to become Corryong College, a P-12 school.

In February 2020 the junior campus was closed and a P-4 building was built on the senior campus. BRV is conducting

a community survey which will gather input on development of the former primary school site in general and the future of the Corryong Primary School building.

Based on input received

from community and other key stakeholders, Towong Shire Council will present a consolidated overview of feedback to help inform planning by the Victorian government.

This program is about transforming local buildings and spaces, celebrating local culture in new and creative ways to increase visitation, and potentially become tourist attractions.


The latest round of the Creative Activation Fund offers grants of between \$40,000 and \$300,000 to develop new artistic attractions across Victoria.

Corryong campus will help close the education gap

A new educational facility will open in Corryong next year to address the imbalance

between rural and city tertiary standards.

The number of Corryong residents with a university degree is just half the regional and rural average, according to federal government figures.

Country Universities Centre (CUC) Ovens Murray is determined to close that gap when it opens in Corryong next year.

Yesterday was World Access To Higher Education Day and Department of Education and Training figures show 44.6 per cent of people in Australia's major cities have a Bachelor degree but only 11 per cent of people in Corryong do -

well below the regional and rural average of 22.7 per cent.

"Corryong residents face many barriers when it comes to higher education including the cost of relocating to university, the isolation of remote study and poor internet connectivity," CUC Ovens Murray Centre Manager, Mark Van Bergen, said.

"CUC Ovens Murray helps overcome those barriers by providing free access to reliable high-speed internet, computers, printing and video conferencing facilities as well as an on-site Learning Skills Advisor to make sure students' are supported every step of the way."



There's strong evidence for the benefit of higher education to individuals and the broader community. The 2019 Napthine Review found that if the gap between city and country was halved there would be an estimated \$11 billion increase to the GDP.



Dairy course takes careers to next level

The next generation of Australian dairy farm managers will be able to advance their careers with the Masterclass in Dairy Farm Management.

Developed in partnership between the University of Tasmania and Dairy Australia, the Masterclass aims to boost the capability of Australia's dairy sector and address a current national shortage of professional training pathways for dairy farm managers.

In its second year, the Masterclass will provide practical management skills that participants can apply to their businesses from day one, including financial management, leadership and human resources, business development and farm systems.

The course is delivered online with face-to-face learning and networking opportunities also available. For those participants who are already working in the dairy industry, it offers flexible pathways of study to fit around their current roles.

Tasmanian dairy farmer, Cheryl McCartie,

said she has seen farm size and structure change significantly since her family moved to Tasmania and sees opportunities to better manage farms and people through the Dairy Masterclass.

Cheryl said the Masterclass fills the gap farmers have been asking for regarding education, training and qualifications.

"The fact that it is a collaboration between Dairy Australia, the University's Tasmanian Institute of Agriculture and other farmers means that we are all on the same page," she said.

"It is pleasing to see a qualification like this has come about and I'm excited that the University of Tasmania is offering it.

"People can acquire certificates and diplomas, but this is the next level and represents the high level of capability needed to run a dairy farm business. It presents an opportunity for farming businesses to offer quality training at management level."

Understanding the broader context around global reach and systems are key components of the Dairy Masterclass along with developing best-practice management skills and understanding people, culture and workplace.

Soil grants support carbon project

The value of native vegetation for storing carbon is well accepted by farmers as a form of greenhouse gas mitigation on their farms but its capacity to increase soil carbon is largely unknown.

A project undertaken by Rutherglen Landcare Group has seen North East farmers conduct a series of detailed soil tests to determine the effects of different forms of native vegetation and exotic pastures on soils in the area.

Project manager with Rutherglen Landcare Group, Philippa Noble (pictured), said more than 200ha had been revegetated around Rutherglen in the past 22 years. Reintroducing perennials including native trees and shrubs, back into the landscape, is important for improving our wildlife, water quality and climate change mitigation but the effect of revegetation on our soils is not known," Ms Noble said.

compare the soils of our native bush areas, that is, the original soils with soils under revegetation, agroforestry and pasture areas in close proximity to see what changes have occurred from clearing to reintroduction of native vegetation." The group chose four locations around Rutherglen - two in grey box country, one in native pine and one in red gum country. All four sites - which had bush, revegetation, agroforestry and pasture within 100 metres of each other were soil sampled to a depth of 10cms and tested for pH, nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen, soil carbon and cation exchange capacity.

Ms Noble said preliminary results from testing in September found the soils were mostly acidic (pH 5-6 in water), with no real trend from bush to pastures except where pastures had been limed.

Organic carbon levels in the bush ranged from 1.5 to 2.5 per cent. Plantations had a little less organic carbon and the highest value was a pasture site at 2.7 per cent. The native pine country sites tended to have the lowest organic carbon and the redgum country the highest.

The testing found zinc was deficient at most sites. Most samples of bush, plantation and shelterbelts had very low levels of phosphorus but fertiliser had again lifted levels in some pastures.

All four sites had high iron, potassium and copper levels, with other elements at satisfactory levels.

Election is the path to change

We would like to take this opportunity to point out to the voters in the upcoming Snowy Valleys Council election that there is an opportunity for change in the way council relates to and acts on behalf of the people of the community - that there is a better way. After all the business of council belongs to you, the residents.

If you want a council that will listen, interact, engage and take the people on the journey you need to change the ethos and the players - unless you want more of the same contempt, disregard and belief that council is not an extension of the people it purports to represent, then you have to vote for change

What you the ratepayer is expected to pay by way of an increase in rates amounts to a 38.1 per cent and when harmonisation and rate pegging is taken into account in the southern part of the council area some farmland is up by 52 per cent, equating to approximately \$7500

per year for medium size farms in some instances and rural residential up by 69 per cent.

There is potential for Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) to change the way it relates to the people it is meant to represent. There are a number of candidates standing at this election who can provide a different style, a different focus and who bring a wide and diverse range of skills in local government, business and financial management who have a record of being able achieve outcomes

that grow communities, who hold management accountable and can work with others to achieve a better place for all

One definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting a different outcome each time. This applies to a council as much as any other organisation, so if you want a different outcome from your council, that will not be achieved by repeating more of the same

For four years in a row SVC under present management have run at a loss totalling \$23.1 million and still can't stop the bleeding. People need to remember council doesn't really have its own money to lose, they are simply charged with the responsibility of managing the community's money on their behalf, so a \$23.1 million loss isn't councils -it yours!


We haven't felt the pain of this loss of cash in our pockets as yet but we sure will if the Special Rate Variation (SRV) goes ahead and we get nothing for it! Not a brass razoo. Their solution is a special rate variation of 38.1 per cent over two years with no increase in services or improved amenity. In fact, service levels will still have to be reduced under the present scenario to try and minimise the losses

There is no evidence that existing councillors standing for re-election have the skills to run the business. They have no idea of what their role or responsibility are or the ability to turn the situation around as demonstrated by their performance over the last four years.

There should not be any SRV imposed on the ratepayer until such time as the new council has been able to conduct a full review of its operations.
