Health services came to the fore

During the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires the health facilities in Corryong and Walwa provided vital care for their communities and they are still dealing with the aftermath of the disaster.

Community leaders detailed the effects of the bushfires to a senate inquiry last week and warned that the region

is no less prepared for a similar event this fire season.

The CEO of Corryong Health, Dominic Sandilands, told the inquiry that there was growing concern in the community that more work had not been done on fire preparedness. "There is widespread

frustration that the emergency management planning hasn't taken into account the improvements and changes that should have happened straight after the fires.

He said it appeared that state government changes to the management plan took the emphasis off councils and placed it onto a group of community respresentatives.

Towong Shire mayor, Cr David Wortmann, said that council was acutely aware of the requirements on it during a disaster.

"If we have another fire season like 2019-20

we are certainly more aware of what would be required but there are still concerns about the level of resources and systems and structure to support the delivery of council requirements."

Sandi Grieve, Walwa Bush Nursing Centre CEO, told the inquiry that when she contacted the Incident Control Centre 24 hours after the initial fire came through the district, she was told that help would not be forthcoming for people who had ignored the order to leave. She was able to crank

up the generator at the centre when power and communications were cut and residents who had been unable to evacuate gravitated to its relative safety.

"I think future disaster planning needs to take into account that, particularly in these remote areas, obeying an order to evacuate is not just as simple as packing up and leaving," she said.



Fire and floods take their toll

A Thowgla couple whose land has been flooded 15 times since the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires are reaching the end of their tether, as authorities search for a way to help them.

Joe and Margaret Elias have spent more than \$80,000 of their own money in cleanup and recovery works over the past 18 months including preventing damage to the Thowgla Road and neighbouring properties. However, it appears

that currently thev are ineligible for any government support or recompense for their efforts. Their experiences

prompted Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley, to put their case before the Victorian Parliament on Tuesday

"I want to remind this House of the 2019/20 bushfires as I continue to hear stories of people falling through the cracks, perhaps even forgotten," Mr Tillev told the Legislative Assemmbly.

"Up and around Corryong there are concerns around mental health, fire preparedness, building approvals and closing in on two years after the event - the recovery itself.

"I highlight the plight of Joe and Margaret Elias from the Thowgla Valley as but one example.

"The Crown Land behind their farm was scorched back in January 2020, the heat of the fire leaving little or no chance of plants and trees regenerating.

"Now with nothing to hold it together, the silt and debris from that Crown Land is washed down in torrents through the Gingalaira Gully Creek after any significant rain event.

"On the first weekend of September Mr Elias's rain gauge topped out at 95mm and the farm was inundated again. It was the 15th time that this has happened since the fires.

"The Eliases have put in their own silt traps to mitigate the damage. They say, left unchecked the silt, debris and water would destroy about one kilometre of the Thowgla Road and flood their neighbours.

"While the silt traps reduce the damage, they also need to be pulled out and replaced after each event," Mr Tilley explained.

"Mr Elias buys the silt traps, uses his own excavator to clean the creek and property and hires a dump truck contractor to put it into his paddock.

"He says factoring in his time it costs about \$5500 each time which is more than \$80,000 so far.

"He says Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning (DELWP), North East Catchment Management Authority and Bushfire Recovery Victoria representatives are sympathetic but 'need a box to tick' to get him help.

Festival goers will need a jab

Organisers of the popular food and music showcase TumbaFest have announced that next year's event will proceed under a 'no vax, no entry' policy.

The TumbaFest committee has confirmed its intention to protect "the health and safety of the Tumbarumba community" by refusing entry to unvaccinated patrons.

TumbaFest committee president, Andrew Rae, said that providing a safe environment for all in attendance was of the "utmost importance".

"We have taken the decision to include the no vaccination no entry policy in consideration fans, performers, volunteers. suppliers, businesses, market stall

holders, our committee and community," Mr Rae said.

The decision to adopt a 'no vax, no entry' policy has divided followers of the TumbaFest Facebook page, with some describing it as a form of discrimination. However, there was

also support for the committee's move, with concerns about the health care available.

"Do people realise that if an outbreak occurs in places like Tumbarumba are inadequate there facilities to cope," Mr Rae explained. It's not being divisive, it's being sensible and caring about our community should the worst happens," one supporter said.

Council spend boosted by disaster dollars

The Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) had an increase of nearly \$14M in additional income in its 2020-21 budget including \$2M for commercial works income and \$9.4M in disaster recovery funding.

2020-2021 The Financial Statements will be presented at SVC's Extraordinary Meeting today, detailing a year of increased income and expenditure as council delivered an unprecedented capital works program and grant funded disaster recovery works.

The Financial Statements show \$76.7M in income including grants and other contributions, and \$69.9M in expenses resulting in a surplus of \$6.8M.

When excluding funding received for capital grants, council recorded a deficit of \$4.9M.

"The deficit, after excluding capital grant funding, demonstrates council continues to secure and utilise grant and external funding for use on capital renewal projects, instead of self-funding this activity," said SVC CEO, Matthew Hyde.

"The aim of council's

Sustainability Financial Plan and current discussions with the community about service delivery is to continue to implement a solid financial management framework to reduce the deficit and Council's reliance on external funding, while ensuring our infrastructure remains in good condition and the appropriate services are delivered to the community," he said.

"There is still work to do, however the improvement of \$576,000 against our original budgeted deficit signals the organisation's commitment to achieving

efficiencies." Council's original budget was adopted in July 2020 forecasting the known operational expenses, works and income for the 2020-2021 financial year, with Mayor James Hayes stating in the Operational Plan "We will continue to identify and assess new opportunities and challenges presented by this unique environment - bushfire recovery and pandemic. This may result in changes having to be made to published goals and impacts to our budget position." Through the Quarterly

Budget Review Process,

council reviewed and adjusted the original budget in order to manage the variations as a result of the significant external funding channelled into the Snowy Valleys during the course of 2020-2021 as a result of federal and state economic stimulus.

"During 2020-2021 nearly \$14M in additional income was accounted for as part of the review process, including \$2M for commercial works and \$9.4M in disaster recovery funding," Mr Hyde said.

"This resulted in an increase of \$11M in expenditure as council worked to deliver the projects associated with that income including clearing more than 350km of bushfire impacted roads, in addition to business-asusual operations.

"The increase from the adopted budget position to the actual budget results is not a reflection of poor budgeting or overspend it reflects council's agility to respond to changing circumstances and maximise opportunities in acquiring significant funding for works and services needed for the Snowy Valleys community that was immediately delivered."

Sport support helps kids play

Vpper Murray Sport Pennant golfers need a shot

The Murray District Golf Assoiation (MDGA) has advised its member clubs - including those in the Hills Zone - that under the current NSW restrictions lockdown (for general area, low risk LGAs) there is nothing stopping clubs allowing non-vaccinated people to play in groups of four.
