"I'm hearing from businesses and everyday people that they had hoped for a broader easing of restrictions in regional areas where there are no active cases of Covid-19 and haven't been for some time."

Red Cross further extends grants

Walwa school life goes on

Despite lockdown restrictions, staff and students at Walwa Primary School are coping as best they can.

Principal, Steve Lynch, reports:-

Helen Haines' visit

It was great to have a visit from member for Indi on Wednesday 5th August to see how we were doing after the bushfires and COVID-19 and also how we were affected by the border closures.

Helen also visited the Walwa Bush Nursing Centre (WBNC) and Walwa Store before also attending a meeting of the Walwa Recovery Committee which has been recently formed for the community.

Helen then mentioned the Upper Murray and Walwa Primary School in Parliament and praised the community for their efforts in overcoming the Black Summer Fires and COVID-19 to forge ahead and recover.

Towong Bushfire Recovery Grants

Walwa Primary School has been successful in obtaining a grant from the Towong Shire Bushfire Recovery Grants program. In round 1 of the program we have received \$5000 towards new readers, to help the students keep up with their learning after being stressed by the bushfires. The grant is also going towards building a bird hide in the school grounds so we can watch all of the lovely birds that visit us regularly.

WBNC has also applied on our behalf for a paediatric defibrillator for the school. It will be placed outside so it can be used by the community as well at any time. Sandi Grieve, CEO, is also a member of our school council and successfully applied on our behalf. We are lucky to have such support in the community.

Remote/home learning

Walwa students have been back in remote learning at home for five weeks again. This will continue until the end of term and first week back of term 4. After that, the students will return to school again. The children have been checking in more regularly online this time and have been doing very well, all things considered.

Some students have been attending the school occasionally. This has helped them socially to feel connected after the disjoint year we have had.

Generous donations

Avenel Primary School and Rotary Club of Preston have each donated \$1000 to the school in relation to the bushfires. Avenel principal, Ross Davis, said students will email the school outlining how they raised the funds.

The Cann family, related to Nankervis's in this area, have also donated \$500 in memory of their late mother. We will be working on various environmental and gardening projects with these funds and looking to upgrade our tennis courts.

Tough fencing tasks made easier

Eight months after the summer bushfires, most property owners in the Upper Murray have made progress with clearing and replacing their fences but many still have small sections of inaccessible areas such as steep, rocky segments, creek gullies and heavy bushland which remain uncleared and a real barrier to finishing their fencing and moving forward.

Freemasons Foundation Victoria has now come to their aid by funding a Difficult Access Fencing project to assist with clearing remote areas.

Project initiator,
Bob Johnstone, was
accompanied by Phil
Coulston, Ernie Cole
and Neville Wiggins

from Freemasons Victoria in Corryong last week to present a cheque for \$99,880.00 to Corryong Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) co-ordinator, Sara Jenkins.

"The CNC is donating its time and resources to administer the project while the Freemasons Victoria representatives will be doing the leg work," Sara said.

"They'll be assessing the properties and organising the contractors and equipment and overseeing the clearing work. All the funds will be going directly to the contractors doing the work"

The 40 property owners who put in an expression of interest for the project in May have been contacted by email or text asking for an update on their difficult access fencing situation.

"We ask them to get those responses back to the CNC as quickly as possible so we can complete the planning and get the clearing started," Sara said.

"There have already been delays and we would like to get things moving as quickly as possible, while it is still relevant to those who need it.

"We also want to hear from anyone who did not put in an expression of interest but would like assistance with difficult access areas which need clearing.

"They should contact

us as soon as possible through Facebook, on 02 6076 2176 or email sara@ corryongnc.org.

"We are trying to keep the paperwork to a minimum and streamline the processes so we have excavators and dozers on the ground in the next few weeks.

"A huge thanks goes to Bob and his team and Freemasons Victoria for making this valuable contribution to the Upper Murray recovery process," Sara added.

The funding will be administered by the CNC through the Upper Murray Innovation Fund (UMIF) - FRRR Bushfire Donation Account. UMIF is the Community Foundation branch of the CNC.

"I am fully aware of the health risks that the coronavirus presents," Dr Haines said, "however the very restrictive roadmap presented by the government is devastating for thousands of regional businesses, many of which have been just holding on for the last six weeks.

The Member for Northern Victoria, Tim Quilty, said the roadmap to recovery was more like a highway to hell.

Rural Councils Victoria (RCV) is calling on the government to take into account the reality in rural areas and to immediately begin easing lockdowns in rural communities where no Covid-19 is circulating.

Never has it been more important to ask, "RUOK?"

You don't have to be an expert to keep the conversation going when someone says they're not but by knowing what to say, you can help someone feel supported and access the right help long before they're in crisis.

You can make a positive difference in hopelessness," she said.

someone's life, just by showing you care.

Last week, Jessica Davison from the Red Cross, joined the local Bushfire Recovery Team and took them through psychological first aid training. The training provides tools to help people to know the signs when someone is not okay and what to say when someone acknowledges they are struggling.

Ms Davison said there were common emotional and physical distress reactions that could be experienced in the days, weeks, months and even years after a crisis event.

"People may experience guilt, sadness, relief, anxiety, confusion, uncertainty and

"Even physical symptoms like feeling numb, increased heartbeat, sweating, shaking, trembling or shortness of breath are not unusual.

"Making decisions, comprehending complex information and communicating clearly can be difficult and it's common to feel completely overwhelmed."

Stress is a normal part of everyday life but when it becomes 'distress' and people are not able to cope with everyday life, it can lead to physical and emotional suffering.

"Don't be afraid to ask RUOK?," Ms Davison

Bank blackmailed after documents find

A former Corryong real estate agent has pleaded guilty in the County Court to a charge of blackmailing the ANZ bank after he found boxes of customers' financial records in the vacated building.

After finding the cache of documents, the co-owner of the former bank branch in Corryong, Scott Burgess, decided to demand \$25,000 from ANZ in exchange for not exposing the security breach to the media.

documents The were scheduled to be shredded but the bank inadvertently left them behind when it vacated the building.

Mr Burgess, 42, emailed the former branch manager on February 19, 2019 saying "If you would like them destroyed, then ANZ would need to pay \$25,000."

The court was told that Mr Burgess had not been happy with how the bank had left the state of the lawn and what he said were unsolicited alterations to

the building.

The blackmail plan backfired when police and the bank arranged a sting, emailing the defendant with an offer to pay the \$25,000 in exchange for the documents.


The swap took place on February 28 but when Mr Burgess left the bank's Wodonga branch, ANZ reversed the transaction and he was arrested.

Bizarrely, a day later he contacted the bank again to say he had found more confidential documents and would have to pay a "holding cost" to get them back. The bank refused.

Judge Gerard Mullaly will sentence Mr Burgess later this month.

Health technology increases safety

Corryong Health is residents. improving its telehealth services to ensure that people do not need to unnecessarily come to the hospital.

"This does not replace the need to provide face-to-face medical, mental health and allied health services to the community," Corryong Health CEO, Dominic Sandilands, said.

"However, we also must reduce people coming to the hospital where ever possible to keep people safe from COVID-19 - particularly staff and

Card holders can get cut on water bill

North East Water is putting measures in place to assist customers who may be experiencing hardship.

"We aware customers many are experiencing significant financial hardship as a result of the coronavirus pandemic," said Manager Customer Services, Deb Mackinlay.

"Since the start of the outbreak, the corporation has seen a steady rise in the number of people applying for assistance in paying their account.

"For those experiencing financial difficulty, we want their water bill to be the least of their concerns.

"Many people who are new to unemployment might not know that concession card holders are entitled to reduced utility bills.

"A concession reduces a water bill considerably, however it needs to be registered on the account before it can be deducted.

"It's an easy process - it can be done on our website or by calling our contact centre.'

Ms Mackinlay added "We also have a number of other ways we can help through our hardship programs.

"For instance, the Utility Relief Grant scheme is funded by the Victorian government and allows customers to access up to \$650 to go towards their bills.

"The scheme available to concession card holders customers can also apply if they're part of a lowincome household.

"Additionally, we may be able to offer flexible payment plans or put people in touch with free, locally based financial councillors.

"During this period we have also stopped all supply restrictions measures for customers who cannot pay their bills," Ms Mackinlay added.

"The most important message for customers is to let us know if they are having difficulty paying their account so we can work out the best way to help."

Portrait proceeds support fire recovery



In the aftermath of the January fires prominent Melbourne graphic artist George Petrou's donation of his portrait of Banjo Paterson to the Man from Snowy River Bush Festival (MFSRBF) is the very stuff of generosity that warms hearts in a year from hell.

George has used his talents to paint a series of portraits commemorating Australia's Victoria Cross recipients. Further demonstrating his deep

historical interests, he painted twelve prominent Australian citizens who were all linked by the WWI Australian official war photographer, Sir Hubert Wilkins MC & Bar.

Brilliantly supported by his wife Zola and photographer daughter Grace, George has taken his exhibition out into regional Australia displaying it in regional centres such as Albury, Dubbo, Townsville and Cairns.



His sensitive portrayal of Banjo Paterson was a part of the exhibition of the Twelve Prominent Australians including giant figures such as well-known humanitarian surgeon and prisoner of war, Sir Edward 'Weary' Dunlop AC CMG OBE; early aviator Sir Charles Kingsford Smith MC AFC who bought the fated Fokker Southern Cross from Sir Hubert Wilkins; and cattleman Sir Sidney Kidman. George gave his extraordinary likeness of the 'Weary' Dunlop to be auctioned to raise funds for the Totally and Permanently Incapacitated (TPI) Ex-Servicemen & Women's Association of Victoria Inc.

George brings his own remarkable story to his art. George and his wife Zola's origins lie in Greek-Cypriot heritage. Perhaps it is their deep rooted experience of Cyprus with fires and some of the terrifying political problems that have plagued the island, have given George and his family a heightened ability to see suffering and need in their adopted county.

In this year's Queen's Birthday Honours, George was awarded an OAM for his services to art and to

returned servicemen.

The proceeds from Michael C Madden's fine accompanying volume The Victoria Cross: Australia Remembers are being donated to the TPI Association of Victoria Inc. As the TPI state president wrote in the foreword of Michael's book 'the need for TPI Victoria is as important now as it was when it was founded over 90 years ago' in 1926.

In 1932 renowned landscape painter and WWI official war artist, Sir Arthur Streeton, visited the Upper Murray where he painted the view the Murray Valley and the snow-covered Australian Alps from Farran's Lookout. About three years ago the painting was auctioned in London for a huge sum.

Archibald Prize winner and official WWII artist,

Ernest Buckmaster, is also reputed to have drawn inspiration from the Upper Murray and some of his works are said to hang in local houses.

Where George Petrou is different is his ability to use his art to respond to human need and never has such a good news story been as important as in 2020. Big Sky Publishing, the publisher of The Victoria Cross: Australia Remembers has commissioned George to produce a book about the twelve prominent Australians featured in his exhibition.

The proceeds from sales of the book at the Man from Snowy River Bush Festival will go to bushfire victims.






