Community asked to shape recreation plans

Towong Shire Council is developing a Sport and Recreation Strategy and is seeking input from the community on infrastructure needs and participation initiatives.

The strategy will guide council's decision making on the development and maintenance of sport, recreation and physical activity infrastructure and initiatives over the next 10 years.

It will examine and assess ways that council can positively influence greater participation

in sport and active recreation as well as identifying opportunities for infrastructure development.

Towong mayor, Cr David Wortmann, said council is keen to hear from local community members to help shape the strategy.

"We want to hear from them to understand what sport and recreation activities are important to them and how our facilities could be improved," he said.

"We know that access

to accessible and inclusive sport and active recreation opportunities not only helps our communities improve their health and wellbeing but are a fantastic way to develop social connections with others in the community."

Council will work with communityvibe - a sport, recreation and community planning agency - to deliver the strategy.

"To ensure we know what needs to happen to help you be more active, a range of community consultation activities with sporting associations, clubs and members and the local community will be available," Cr Wortmann said.

Push grows to seal connector

There is a renewed groundswell of support to complete the sealing of the Benambra-Corryong Road and the Victorian government is being urged to make the works a priority.

The route is a vital link between the Upper Murray and East Gippsland for numerous industries and communities, tourism, livestock markets and as a conduit for major events in regional centres and beyond.

Only 67 kilometres of the road is sealed and the remaining 65 kilometres is gravel. The road suffers extended winter road closures which adversely impacts the commercial and community opportunities, advancement and benefits for the region.

The project proposal was promoted as recently as 2018 but little resulted from the considerable advocacy of local government and other stakeholders.

The Benambra Progress Committee (BPC) has since taken up the case and with the support of the East Gippsland Shire Council and its representative on the South East Australia Transport Strategy (SEATS) organisation, it has succeeded in lifting the priority rating of the project from number 14 to number two on the SEATS priority listing for infrastructure projects in the region.

The road was cut by pick and shovel in the 1930s and was the first arterial route between Victoria and New South Wales.

"Some would say we've been waiting for more than 50 years for the road to be sealed," said BPC president, Sharon Firebrace.

"It is a no-brainer. It will open tourism opportunities between the two states, along with agriculture opportunities.

"We look forward to



shared involvement in this exciting community-based project," Ms Firebrace said.

The proposal has attracted strong endorsement from Towong Shire Council, Federal MP Darren Chester and state MPs Tim Bull and Bill Tilley.

The two councils involved are currently engaged in discussions

to devise strategies to advance the project.

Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley, said the road was nothing short of a disgrace.

"It's virtually a goat track," he said.

Mr Tilley was instrumental in having responsibility for maintenance of the road transferred from the East Gippsland Shire to the

Victorian government, under VicRoads administration.

"We need to get the best possible surface for it but we have a metropolitan government that's not funding vital connections in regional areas," he said.

"There's no better time for government to invest in that road. They need to get in there and do some work and make it a priority."

Further fire funding put on the table

Further grants are now available for first responder organisations in places impacted by Black Summer bushfires

Made possible thanks to a significant private donation, the Volunteer Emergency Services Fund provides grants to local volunteer emergency services groups and first responder organisations in eligible fire-affected communities across the Australian Capital Territory, New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania and Victoria.

In the first round of funding, the Corryong Ambulance and Walwa CERT teams received \$17,928 and the Tallangatta SES got \$18,000.

The Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (FRRR) is encouraging local volunteer emergency services groups serving rural communities affected by the 2019/20 bushfires to

apply now for the second round of grant funding to support their recovery needs and/or strengthen their emergency response capabilities ahead of the upcoming bushfire season.

Danielle Griffin, FRRR's Philanthropic Services Manager - Corporate, said that with this summer's bushfire season fast approaching, first responders should feel confident in their preparedness and volunteers should feel supported, especially those in regions that are still recovering from the Black Summer bushfires.

"Grants of up to \$25,000 are available to meet local agencies' needs and we want to encourage groups who may not have a large project in mind to consider making a small grant application of up to \$6,000 to be better prepared with small essential equipment i.e. go-bags that might contain torches, fire blankets and

traffic wands. At least \$100,000 in funding will be provided to meet such essential requests.

"Preparing for future disasters and adapting to changing conditions after a disaster are integral parts of the recovery process. In practical terms, preparedness can mean upgrades to infrastructure

and equipment and providing up-to-date training, which can have a big impact on the security and safety of first responders.

"These grants can fund important projects to care for the mental health and wellbeing of volunteers that generously give their time to support and protect

their communities," Ms Griffin said.

Applications close at 5pm AEDT on October 20, 2021 with grants to be announced in November 2021.

Book tells about grassroots movement

It started with a small group, meeting in a side room at the Wangaratta library to talk politics in June 2012.

Now, almost ten years later, the Voices for Indi movement has produced three independent MPs, and 'Voices for' groups in every state across the country, hoping to change the face of politics in Australia.

The story of that meeting of community members to a movement across the country is set to be told in a book, the definitive story of the journey that has led to breaking the shackles of party politics in Indi and beyond.

The book will cover the journey from that first meeting where the local grassroots community group Voices for Indi was formed, determined to improve representation in the Australian parliament and to encourage more people to get involved in their democracy. To have their voices heard.

Today, there are close to 38 'Voices for' groups in electorates across the country, inspired by Voices for Indi and what has been achieved with our two federal independent MPs, Cathy McGowan and Helen Haines. With growing dissatisfaction of mainstream party politics, people are organising kitchen table conversations to share and hear the views of others in a respectful way and for some, to identify community independent candidates to stand for election.

The book, to be published next year, will coincide with the 10th anniversary of the first tentative meeting convened by Cathy McGowan, that ultimately led to a change in who and how Indi is represented. It will go behind the scenes of three successful, history-making federal elections, as well as detailing the campaign ahead of the next election which is due by 22 May next year.

"Voices for Indi has always been a group that involves a community of people contributing and making decisions about

their preferred future," said Rob Carolane, the current convenor of the group.

"This book is being written by a team of authors and contributors with a deep knowledge of what went on behind the scenes. It will be a story that our community participated in over the

last 10 years.

"The contributing authors are volunteering their time to work on the narrative but funding is needed to produce a quality book that does justice to a remarkable story that has changed Australia's political landscape.

"Cathy McGowan wrote a compelling personal story last year,

including her experiences as the Independent Member for Indi but there's even more to share and who better to tell the definitive story of Voices for Indi than the people involved?"

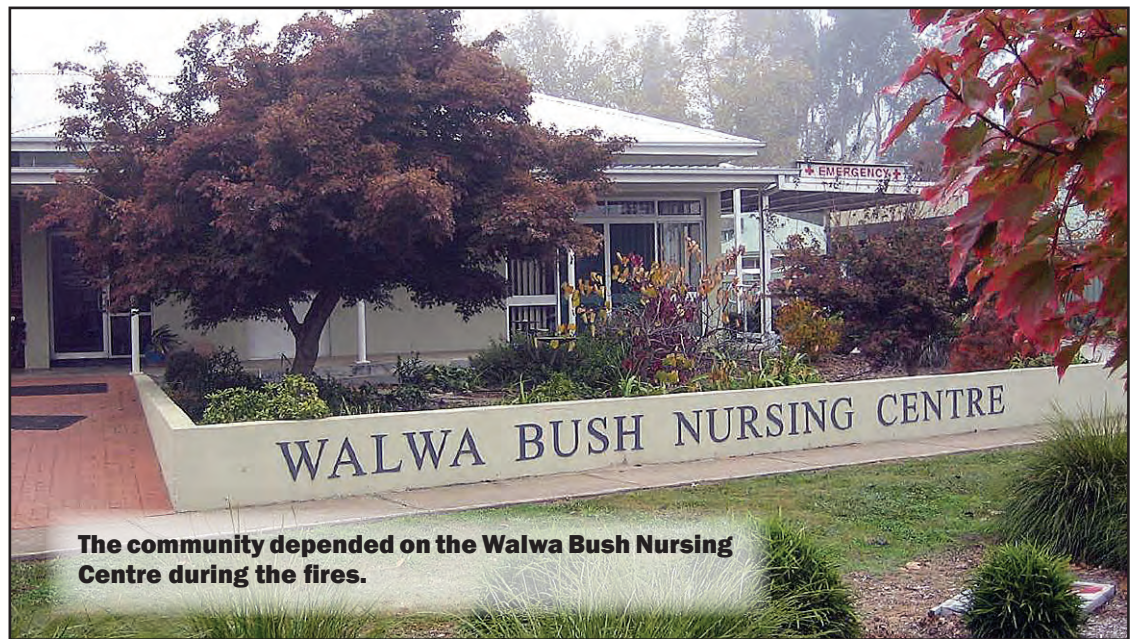
French connection assists with fire recovery

An alliance between the Victorian town of Robinvale and Villers-Bretonneux in France has helped two Upper Murray organisations with their recovery from the 2019/20 Black Summer bushfires.

In February 2020, following the horrific bushfires, the people of Villers-Bretonneux launched a fundraiser for the bushfire relief appeal.

The Robinvale Sentinel reported that an online fundraising page received donations from more than 800 people. The town also organised a solidarity march on February 2nd and approximately 1,000 people braved the winter weather and walked from the town centre to the Australian National Memorial and Sir John Monash Centre. There the local school choir sang a song written especially for the appeal, entitled 'Australia, Stop Burning'.

The late Patrick Simon (Mayor of Villers-Bretonneux) was instrumental in organising the fundraising drive. He spoke of the despair the people of Villers-Bretonneux were feeling as they watched the news come through from Australia. All the residents of Villers-Bretonneux were talking about the fires and everyone was appalled by what was happening.



The community depended on the Walwa Bush Nursing Centre during the fires.

Villers-Bretonneux has never forgotten Australia. In April 1918, against all odds, two Australian brigades helped liberate the town from the German forces, at a cost of 1200 lives lost.

The Australian flag still flies over Villers-Bretonneux. A plaque outside the town hall tells the story of the events of 1918 and kangaroos feature over the building's entrance. The main street is named Rue de Melbourne.

The children of Villers-Bretonneux are especially indebted to Australia. After the war, it was money collected by schoolchildren in Victoria that paid for the rebuilding

of the town's school. It was named Victoria School and a permanent plaque on the school facade recalls the diggers' sacrifice.

Due to Covid-19 lockdown restrictions, it had been difficult for the Robinvale/Villers-Bretonneux Association to meet and discuss the distribution of the more than \$40,000 raised to worthy organisations which have been struggling since the bushfires.

After much deliberation it was unanimously decided that the funds would be distributed equally and donated to the Corryong FoodShare Services and Walwa Bush

Nursing Centre.

Ian Boyd, President of the Robinvale/Villers-Bretonneux Association, said since the fires and then Covid-19, Corryong FoodShare clients have increased by 350 per cent.

Many of the homes lost in the fires still have not been rebuilt due to new construction rules and regulations. Visit www.corryong.asn.au for further information.

The Black Summer bushfires also impacted horrifically on the Walwa community. Literally surrounded by fires that threatened the township on three separate occasions over three weeks, they were without power and

communications of any type. The heat during this time was in excess of 43 degrees each day and the smoke hung so heavily in the air that at times it was impossible to see more than 10 metres.

The community was dependent on the Walwa Bush Nursing Centre for food, news, power to charge much needed appliances and refrigeration. While the centre had a generator, it was too small for the task at hand and required ongoing maintenance and refuelling every few hours.

Mr Boyd confirmed that both organisations will each receive a cheque for \$20,631.09.

Siblings, Jack and Shei McLean, satirised a clip from the movie Norbit on TikTok - and so far it has received more than 2.5 million views!

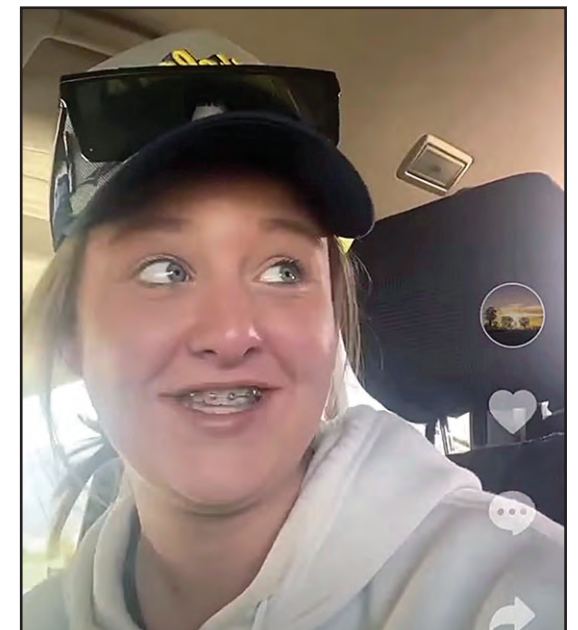

Health services and local governments have joined together to encourage people in the North East to continue their Covid-19 vaccination efforts.

A campaign, known as *Roll Up for Our Region*, has been developed through a collaboration between Albury Wodonga Health, Alpine Health, Northeast Health, Wangaratta and Alpine Shire Council.

Wodonga Council, Albury City, Rural City of Wangaratta and Gateway Health are providing support by sharing the campaign messages.

The campaign has been developed by Wodonga company Dutch Media and includes TV

advertisements, newspaper ads, direct mail, posters, stickers and an extensive social media campaign.

It features regional community representatives including Corryong sports star, Kristy Whitehead, who plays football for the Murray Bushrangers and Wodonga Raiders.

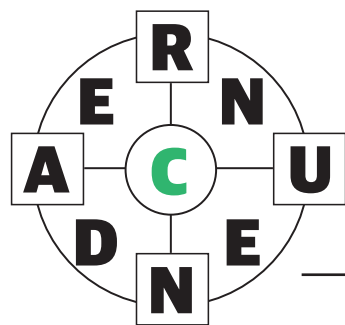

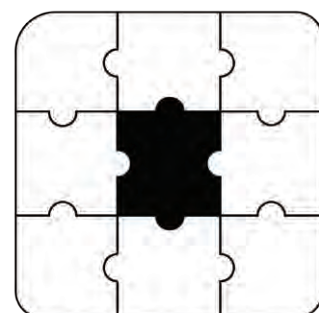

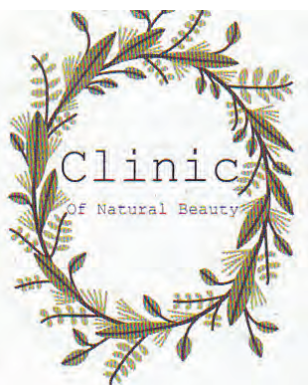

Stoked sub eyes off the future

Melbourne Demons' medical substitute in Saturday's AFL grand final, James Jordon, may not have made it onto the field but he was certainly the hot topic on Melbourne talkback radio on Monday.

The first-year revelation, who played in 24 matches this year after debuting in round one against Fremantle, had been the medical sub in the Dees' three finals matches and talkback callers were querying why he was not subbed on in the last quarter, given the Demons were more than 10 goals ahead late in the game.

However, Jordon was deemed to have played the match and is more than happy to have a premiership medallion hanging around his neck.

It just shows how close the Melbourne players are when midfielder, James Harmes, tried his best to

get his teammate onto the ground for some game time.

AAP reported that Harmes selflessly tried to sub himself off late in the grand final win against the Western Bulldogs in order to give teammate, James Jordon, some game time.

Jordon was the medical sub for the match and he didn't make it out onto the field in the Demons' 74-point win at Optus Stadium.

But if Harmes had his way, Jordon would have been subbed into the game with about five minutes to go.

"Harmsey was trying to have a little cramp there just so I could get on at the end," Jordon told AAP.

"He was just trying to get me on the ground. There was only five minutes left but it didn't end up happening."

Even though he didn't get any game time, Jordon will still be credited with playing the match and as such he was given a premiership medal and

Geelong.

"I'm just stoked I got the premiership medal, that's all that matters.

"The boys are unreal. I feel part of it. It's not just today, it's the whole year as well."

With Melbourne's player group in the prime age bracket for sustained success, Jordon is excited about what the future holds.

"We're still a really young group and we've got a lot of young boys

coming through as well," Jordon said.

"So absolutely, the next four or five years for sure (could be a period of success)."

Talkback callers widely praised Harmes for his gesture but also questioned why fullback Steven May didn't come off the ground to allow Jordon a run, particularly as he admitted later he aggravated a hamstring injury from the preliminary final, in the second quarter.
